W. and Would-Be Poolers at War. The Koshland company, which has been buying the entire clip of Baker for the coming season, but which is disputed by a number of growers who claim that the Baker clip should combine and be a raise on the price to that they should have 15 cents per clip as well, and to this end they are attempting to form an impromptu force a raise on the price offered the buyers. Yesterday the price was raised to 15-12 cents and those who are holding off and waiting will in a day or so reach 15-cent mark. Those who have yet sold have counted noses and are sure they have a sufficiently large number of clips to make it an easy matter for the buyers to come up to limit.—Baker City Herald.

Dayton Telephone Improvements. The Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph company is to expend \$4,000 in increasing the efficiency of its system, work to be completed as soon as material can be secured. There will be no change in the present system, but the expense will be made in replacing old leads and in cables to protect the lines from trees and obstructions. By new improvements the Dayton line will be brought up to a high degree of efficiency.—Walla Walla Herald.

Lewiston Paper Quits. The Lewiston Advertiser, which was recently by Messrs. J. J. Addis and Horace Addis, failed to appear yesterday on the regular day of publication. Relative to the sus-

pension of publication, Mr. Addis stated that while they had found the Lewiston field a hard one in which to make headway, the prime cause of the paper's suspension is that the postoffice department had refused them admission to the mails as second-class matter, owing to their free distribution in the city, and that they could not afford the extra expense of third-class postage.—Lewiston Tribune.

"Great Expectations." At the meeting Tuesday night Messrs. Weyerhaeuser and Turrish assured the meeting that within the next three or four years they would construct a mill at Lewiston of sufficient capacity to employ between six and eight hundred men, and in addition to the mill they would improve the Clearwater river by the construction of a cement dam and thus afford all persons desiring to use the river for logging purposes an opportunity of saving their logs and running no risks in logging on the river. It was explained that by the construction of the dam that it would give Lewiston a water power equal to if not better than that enjoyed by Spokane.—Lewiston Tribune.

To Reorganize Department. One of the bills to be introduced early in the legislature is one to reorganize the present state land department. The bill has not yet been drawn, although it is understood a rough draft of it has been prepared. The question is being carefully considered by those familiar with the needs of the department and its requirements. One of the changes contemplated is to abolish the office of chief clerk and create two commissions, one for office work and one for field work.—Boise Capital News.
