SEVENTH SESSION

NATIONAL LIVESTOCK ASSOCIATION MEETS.

Has a Large and Representative Attendance—Constitution and By-laws Will Probably Be Amended so the Membership Will Include Side But Correlative Industries — Convention Will Be in Session All This Week.

Denver, Jan. 10.—The annual convention of the National Livestock association was formally opened here today, the initial session being devoted to the exchange of greetings and the work of organization. The roll showed a large and representative attendance.

The convention, which will be in session during the remainder of the week, promises to be the most important held by the association since it was organized in this city a dozen years ago. While legislative and other public questions in which the stock-raisers are interested will be discussed, the principal business of the convention will be to revise the constitution and by-laws of the association so as to admit to membership others than those actively engaged in stock-raising. Heretofore the membership has been strictly confined to the stock-raisers themselves, but it is now felt that the interests of all concerned could be better subserved by taking in all who are concerned directly or indirectly in the livestock industry. To this end it is possible that the by-laws will be changed so as to admit not only the breeders of all kinds of livestock, but commission men, packers,

IN OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE.

Republicans Are in Control of Both Houses.

Guthrie, Okla., Jan. 10.—The Oklahoma legislature met today with the republicans, for the first time in many years, in control of both houses. In anticipation of early statehood for the territory, it is expected that the present session will consider little or no new legislation. Instead, it will confine its efforts to the betterment of existing statutes and other matters.

Governor Ferguson, in his annual message, calls particular attention to the necessity of establishing the territorial cattle quarantine line so that it will embrace the Osage Indian nation and the extension of the herd law so as to include Beaver county, the only county in the territory in which the herd law is not now operative.

DEMOCRATS TO FRAME POLICY.

Radicals of the Party Propose Lines of Reorganization.

Lafayette, Ind., Jan. 10.—In the spacious polo rink here tonight several hundred loyal democrats will sit about the banquet board and listen to opinion expressed by democratic leaders of national prominence regarding the future policy of the party. The affair, which has been arranged by the Tippecanoe Democracy, has attracted more than ordinary attention as it is the first demonstration of national importance that the democrats have held since the presidential campaign with an idea of formulating a policy for the future of the party.

William J. Bryan is to be the guest of honor and chief speaker at the banquet. Other invited speakers of note include Mayor Harrison, of Chicago, Elliott G. Stephenson, of Detroit, and John W. Kern, the late democratic candidate for governor of Indiana.

To Fight Speculators.

Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 10.—Pursuant to the call of R. R. Poole, state commissioner of agriculture, mass-meetings of cotton-growers are to be held throughout Alabama today to discuss the situation in regard to the cotton industry. The purpose is to agree upon an effective mode of disposing of the crop now on hand and for concerted action in making the new crop so as to baffle the attempts of speculators to control the market.

New Jersey Legislature Meets.

Trenton, N. J., Jan. 10.—The New Jersey state legislature met and organized today. From all indications, the session will confine itself chiefly to business of a routine character, no measures of striking importance being scheduled for consideration. During the coming week the two houses will meet in joint session and re-elect United States Senator Kean.

BUTTER AND CHEESEMAKERS.

Illinois Dairymen's 31st Annual Convention.

Rockford, Ill., Jan. 10.—Prominent dairymen from Illinois, Wisconsin, Iowa and several other states filled Germania hall today at the opening of the 31st annual convention of the Illinois Dairymen's association. The attendance is the largest in the history of the association's conventions. Mayor Jackson welcomed the visitors and D. W. Wilson, of Elgin, responded. President Joseph Newman delivered his annual address, and other speakers at the opening session were Prof. C. D. Smith of the Agricultural College of Michigan, and H. A. Hoppey, of the dairy department of the University of Illinois. This evening Prof. E. H. Harrington, of the Wisconsin Dairy School, is to deliver an illustrated lecture and Prof. J. W. Hart, of the University of Illinois, will tell of the ways in which the agricultural college can help the butter and cheesemaker.

Colonial Products Exhibition.

Liverpool, Jan. 10.—The Colonial Products exhibition, which, as its name indicates, is intended to illustrate the resources and industries of the British colonies, opened in Liverpool today and will continue for one week. A similar exhibition was held here last year, but the present affair is much larger and more comprehensive in its scope. Canada is well represented, as are also Australia, South Africa and other parts of the British empire.

Texas Swine Breeders.

Waxahachie, Texas, Jan. 10.—The convention of the Texas Swine Breeders' association begun here today is the largest meeting of practical hog-growers ever held in this state. During the two days' sessions the convention will discuss feeding, inbreeding, the prevention and cure of hog diseases, and other practical questions of interest and importance to those engaged in swine breeding. In conjunction with the meeting there is being held a large exhibit of pure-bred swine.

Winter School of Agriculture.

Lafayette, Ind., Jan. 10.—The winter school of agriculture of Purdue University opened today and will continue for two weeks. The school has been materially strengthened by important additions to the teaching force, subjects taught and equipment. Three entirely distinct courses of study are offered—agriculture and horticulture, animal husbandry and dairying.
