MEMBERS LOSE NO TIME

INTRODUCING MEASURES.

One Provides for a State Library Commission — Another Prohibits Riding on Passes — Licenses From Hunters Is Proposed—Bill Creating the New County of Jefferson — Cooper Would Protect Employees of Manufacturing Companies — Bill Introduced by W. G. Cole to Build a Dormitory Annex to the Weston Normal.

The committee for the selection of clerks met after the adjournment of the legislature, but will not report until after the general committees are announced by the speaker.

For a Girls' Dormitory.

W. G. Cole introduced a bill for the appropriation of \$25,000 from the general fund for the erection of suitable buildings for a girls' dormitory of the Eastern Oregon State normal school at Weston. The bill also has a provision for the furnishing of the buildings when erected.

Flat Salary Law.

Representative T. B. Kay of Marion, introduced in the house yesterday morning his "flat salary" bill, calling for a stipulated regular compensation for certain officers of the state, and requiring that all fees be paid into the state treasury.

The governor would receive \$5000

per year; the secretary of state \$4500; state treasurer \$4500, and the attorney general \$3600.

Under the constitution of the state the governor received a stipulated salary of \$1500. This in addition to the salary he receives from different boards of which he is a member, brings his total compensation up in the neighborhood of \$5000.

This is the same as the measure introduced by Mr. Kay two years ago, but which failed of passage then.

The Dalles City Stove In.

A message from Stevenson this afternoon says that the Dalles City bound for Portland ran on a hidden rock about two miles east of that place this morning at 11:30 o'clock, knocking a hole almost the full length of the steamer.

There were about 70 passengers on board, beside horses and some freight.

By some means, which we failed to learn, the steamer was beached and the passengers taken safely ashore.

When the Regulator passed these were taken to the Locks.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Gardiner Resigns.

F. T. Gardiner, the deservedly popular station agent in Sumpter for the Sumpter Valley company, has resigned his position and will leave shortly for Prineville, Crook county, where he has accepted a responsible position as land agent for the Deschutes Irrigation & Power company, one of the biggest institutions in Central Oregon.

Mr. Gardiner has been one of the most popular agents for the S. V. ever stationed at Sumpter. His family will remain here until spring.

JAPS GOING HOME

MANCHURIA AND KOREA

WILL BE FUTURE MECCAS.

If Japan Wins in the War With Russia the Japanese People in the United States Will Return Home to Settle Manchuria and Korea—Very Few of the Mikado's People Go to Foreign Countries Expecting to Become Permanent Citizens.

"If Japan wins in the war with Russia and takes over Korea and portions of Manchuria, every Japanese in the United States will return to those countries," said an educated and intelligent Japanese to the East Oregonian today.

"The Japanese are overflowing into the United States, because there is no nearer country that offers any opportunity. Scarcely a native of my country comes here with the intention of remaining permanently. Every one who comes expects to make a stake and return home to live in his own country and in his own way.

"Korea offers many inducements to active, intelligent Japanese, as the natives of that country, although Mongolians and really second cousins to the Japanese, are sluggish and inactive and lack energy. Their mines are not worked, except by Americans, Japanese or Englishmen; their farming lands are not highly cultivated, and one Japanese can do more work than five Koreans, on an average.

"Manchuria, also offers especial inducements to the Japanese. It is near his native land, and the environment is similar. If that country is opened to the Japanese, by some arrangement with China, it will be the Mecca of the overflow population in Japan. Its wheat lands, pasture areas, manufacturing opportunities and large streams reaching far inland, offer exceptional inducements.

"Notwithstanding the great promise of America to the Japanese citizen, yet if a new country nearer home were opened to him, he would gladly turn to that country. It is a fact, that very few Japanese naturalize in any foreign country, their traditions and faith causing them to cling to the mother country. Their invasion of foreign countries is for the purpose of making money—they will all be gathered in Japan at the last."

Washington, Jan. 11.—The appointment of Thomas Gader Powell of Oregon, as United States marshal of the Nome district, will go to the senate tomorrow.
