### NORTHWEST NEWS.

F. Wooley, of Roseburg, has sued the Plaiddealer for \$10,000 for libel in charging him as a member of the school board in improperly handling the funds of the district.

Frank Hawkins is dead at Wallace, Idaho, as the effect of an operation to remove a broken leg. He was one of the most famous stage drivers of Northern Idaho and the Coeur d'Alene district generally.

The body of Thomas O'Connor, cashier of Percival's dock at Olympia, was found in the bay January 10. He had been missing since New Year's day. He was once consul to Belgium.

There have been two acetylene gas explosions in Northport, Wash., within a month, in the business part of town. Both caused considerable damage to property, but no person was injured.

The largest volume of business ever done by Latah county, Idaho, (Moscow county seat) in three months through the recorder's office, was from October 1, last, till January 1. The office took in \$1724.

There are three 'crabberies' on Yaquina Bay. William Toner, the proprietor of one of them during the last year shipped 185,000 pounds or 32 tons of crabs. Exact returns could not be had about the output of the other catchers.

# ON BEET CULTURE

F. F. BRAMWELL EN-COURAGES ECHO FARMERS.

Gives Statistics of Beet Growing in Grand Ronde—On 40 Acres of Land He Cleared \$1154.79 on a Crop of Beets in 1904—Represents a Clear Gain on Rented Land as the Renter Does Not Pay Taxes, or Lose by Depreciation of Land and Improvement.

F. F. Bramwell, field superintendent of the La Grande sugar factory, writes the Echo News an interesting letter on beet culture, urging the land owners of Echo to continue growing beets.

He declares that the first crop raised on Echo land was far over the average on new land, and expressed the belief that next year's crop would increase at least 50 per cent, and perhaps 100 per cent over last year.

Among other statistics Mr. Bramwell tells of the result of a 49-acre tract which he farmed last year, and which yielded as follows:

I have made personal experiments each year so that I can intelligently reply to the question so many times asked of me, and that is "How much does it cost to produce an acre of sugar beets?"

I will now give the data of this year, as the same appears on our office books, and which can be seen by any one interested.

I had five acres of land of my own and rented 35 acres more for which I paid as rent the sum of \$282.50; beet seed cost me \$2.30; labor, such as thinning, pulling and topping and loading, cost me \$561.20; besides this labor I had a man hired for four months at \$1.25 per day, and furnished my own team, excepting the plowing, which is represented in the above.

I sold the entire crop of beets for \$2249.79. Allowing the man four months wages would amount to about \$150, which yet leaves me the snug sum of \$1154.79.

The matter of rent alone is high and represents as much per acre as generally had from an acre of land and even more than can be had year after year.

You will note that I received for absolutely nothing the sum of \$1,154.79. These are not inflated figures, but are on the book here representing the several charges for labor as the same has been performed.

In addition to the foregoing my team hauled beets during the harvest time for something like \$75.00, which really represents a gain.
