Levee Work Suspended.
 Work has been temporarily suspended on the levee which is to connect with the bridge on the north side of the John Day. The work has been completed according to contract but the contour walls along the side of the fill continue to cave out in places. The failure of the walls to stand is not thought to be due to any fault of the contractor, but the plan for the levee seems to be faulty in some particular that comes in the engineer's line of business. The contractor has decided to consult the county judge before the work is resumed.—Spray Courier.

 The Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph linemen were here Sunday. They went to John Day Monday and will commence repairing the line from that place to Heppner. They stated work on the new line between Heppner and Parker's mill has been discontinued until spring on account of inclement weather, but will be resumed in the spring, and when completed will have two wires which no doubt will improve the service.—Monument Enterprise.

He went to Cottonwood Tuesday where he expects to get a few head. He intends taking them to Walla Walla, where he finds a good market.—Monument Enterprise.

A BOOM FOR HORSES.
 Demand for Cavalry Stock Will Stimulate Prices.
 A big boom in the horse market is expected shortly or as soon as the contracts for furnishing the American army in the Philippines with 1000 horses are awarded, says the Walla Walla Statesman.
 Word has been received in Walla Walla that these contracts will be awarded at Seattle some time the latter part of January and local horse dealers are expecting a recurrence of the boom in the South African war.
 It was then the despised cayuse jumped into favor and instead of being the scum of the horse industry it was soon found that the little Indian pony was best adapted for cavalry purposes and consequently commanded as good a price as the American-bred horse.
 "As soon as the contracts are awarded we are expecting a horde of buyers to invade the local horse market," a well known dealer said yesterday. "The government wants 1000 horses for the use of the army in the Philippines and about the only place to get them is in the Oregon and Washington horse range. Horses are worth money these days and contractors will find that they will have to pay a fair price or go further east, in which event transportation will have to be figured in."
