

### IN MEMORY OF LEE

OBSERVE THE BIRTHDAY OF THE GREAT COMMANDER.

In All Places Where Practicable the Exercises Were Arranged and Conducted by Confederate ex-Soldiers and Affiliated Organizations—Public Schools and Many Business Houses Closed Throughout the South.

Richmond, Va., Jan. 19.—The birthday anniversary of Robert E. Lee was generally observed throughout Virginia. Banks and state offices were closed, and the customary memorial services were held under the auspices of the Confederate veterans' organizations.

Jacksonville, Fla., Jan. 19.—The birthday of General Robert E. Lee was celebrated throughout Florida today by the closing of the banks and public offices not controlled by the federal government.

Charleston, S. C., Jan. 19.—In honor of Lee the public schools, the banks and the courts were closed here today.

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 19.—The celebration of Lee's birthday today was more general here than ever before. The occasion was also celebrated to pay suitable honor to the memory of John B. Gordon. Interesting exercises in honor of the memory of the two great leaders were held in the state capitol this evening under the auspices of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

Savannah, Ga., Jan. 19.—The birthday of Robert E. Lee was celebrated today by a parade of all the white military of the city.

Houston, Texas, Jan. 19.—The birthday anniversary of Gen. Lee was observed throughout Texas today by the local chapters of the Daughters of the Confederacy, who prepared and carried out elaborate programs, the features of which were Southern songs and readings relating to the life of the great Confederate leader.

Mobile, Ala., Jan. 19.—Banks and public offices were closed here today in observance of the birthday of General Lee. Anniversary exercises were held under the auspices of the local chapter of the Daughters of the Confederacy.

**Against Oregon's Interest.**  
The 2000 registered voters of Baker county, who 18 months ago protested against and attempted to repeal by the referendum the portage railway appropriation are not much chagrined or surprised that Chairman Burton of the rivers and harbors committee of congress has ruled against the appropriation by congress immediately of funds for the building of the canal at Celilo on the ground that the portage road now secured by the state is sufficient and congress has all it can do in other directions. Many business men who have given the matter any attention are earnest in their demand for the canal, believing that the portage road never was anything but a makeshift and a graft; others say, "I told you so."

It may be said in a general way that the majority of the business men of this part of the Inland Empire are for a canal now, as they have been all the time.—Baker City Democrat.

**Big Sheep Ranch Sold.**  
J. G. Edwards, C. M. Cartwright and J. P. VanHouten came up from Portland yesterday, where an important deal was consummated, Edwards having purchased the interest of Cartwright and VanHouten in the Baldwin Sheep & Land Company at Hay creek.

This ranch is 35 miles from Shaniko. It is surrounded by many miles of fence, and contains 20,000 acres of deeded land. Between 200,000 and 300,000 pounds of wool are clipped from its herds annually. In the dull season 50 men are employed and at clipping time as many as 100. Raising thoroughbreds is the chief aim of the company, which owns 25,000 to 30,000 head of sheep of the Rambouillet, Delaine and Spanish varieties. Many cars of these are raised and shipped out each season for breeding purposes.—The Dalles Chronicle.

**Everybody Badly Disappointed.**  
Rev. David Swackhammer, who the colored traveling lecturer, was announced to preach at the Adventist church on Sunday, explains that the pastor in charge agreed to his appointments, but did so without consulting with the trustees of the church. That when he appeared to fulfill the morning appointment he was informed that he would be permitted to talk 15 minutes, a time too brief to enable him to deliver the lecture prepared for the occasion, and he declined. He very much regrets that he was thus compelled to disappoint those who came to hear him.—Lewiston Tribune.

**Will Hold Regatta.**  
The question of holding a regatta in Astoria this year, first suggested by the Astorian along different lines from those heretofore held, is meeting with general indorsement and approval, says the Astorian. The leading merchants of Astoria are evincing an interest in the project, and several have signified their willingness to take charge of the affair. The fact that thousands of visitors will come to Oregon this year to the Lewis and Clark fair, many of whom will visit Astoria, is an incentive which actuates a large number of citizens to be willing to lend their aid and assistance to the regatta.

### ROAD LAW

shall appoint three judicious freeholders residing within the bounds of said road to be viewers of such road, who, by the name fixed by the county court, shall be a body corporate for the purpose of laying out and establishing a road of whatever material and construction the resident land holders of the given district shall elect between the points within such county named in the petition; and the county commissioners shall appoint such persons to be special commissioners of such roads as may have been recommended by the petition of a majority of the land holders; the petition, and appointment of such road commissioners, shall be entered (in) the minutes of the proceedings of the county court, the said entry to be made by the county clerk to become a matter of record in his office; the said special commissioners shall hold their appointments during the whole time of the construction of such road and to act instead of a board of county commissioners or county court, and they shall receive for their services a sum not to exceed \$3 per day for such days actually spent upon this road and no time shall be spent except at the call of either the county court or the general road superintendent.

### AMEND LOCAL OPTION LAW.

Representative Jaynes of Wasco, has introduced the long expected bill amending the local option law. Many important amendments are offered, the chief being a provision that an election on the prohibition issue may be called in any precinct only on petition of 40 per cent of the registered voters. It also provides that the law shall not be applicable to precincts in incorporated towns except residence precincts and shall not apply to the sale of liquor by wholesalers.
