Reclamation Service Doing Extensive Preliminary Work.

That the Klaamth government ir-rigation project will be carried to completion is now almost an assured

Chief Engineer Newell of the reclamation service has assured Ore-gon's delegation in congress that every phase of the project is favora-

It is one of the largest government irrigation projects under tion, and will reclaim about 312,000

acres of semi-arid land.

The major portion of this large tract lies in Oregon, a small portion extending south of the line into Callfornia.

Engineer Newell suggests that the Engineer Newell suggests that the Oregon irrigation law should be changed to conform to the suggestion of the government. The present irrigation code of the state is crude and disorganized and conflicts with the demands of the government.

In order to study the water systems and streams of the Klamath

tems and streams of the Klamath project, gauging stations are now being established throughout the district by the reclamation department.
