## CONTEMPT OF COURT

EXPLAINED THAT HE WAS NEVER BEFORE IN COURT.

Old Man Introduced Some Statements on the Side Which Were Not Called for and While Pertinent Were Badly Out of Order—He Had Testified That Brummett's Reputation for Truth and Veracity is Bad.

"I said he was a thief and a liar and the truth is not in him," explained H. Morteorman, a witness in the state circuit court yesterday afternoon, when brought before Judge W. R. Ellis, on a charge of contempt. Morteorman was called as a witness in the trial of R. A. Dunn, charged with larceny from the person, for the purpose of impeaching the testimony of William Brummett, the prosecuting witness.

Morteorman was not allowed to testify, and as he walked from the stand last District Attorney G. W. Phelps, he remarked:

"I don't like no man what beats me out of \$250, and now you have got it straight." Then as Morteorman and his wife left the room he mumbled something, and Phelps jumped to his feet and demanded that the witness be brought before the court for contempt. A deputy sheriff overtook Morteorman in the corridor and brought him back.

"You are an old man," remarked the judge, when the offender had frankly admitted what his last utterance had been, "and you should be fined for contempt. A sentence of 30 days in jail would not be too severe for such an act."

Morteorman explained that he supposed he had a right to talk and it was the first time he had ever been in a law court. The judge allowed him to go and to report this morning at 9 o'clock, at which time his fate would be determined. Judge Ellis this morning allowed Morteorman to go after administering a severe reprimand.

### KLAMATH PROJECT ASSURED.

Reclamation Service Doing Extensive Preliminary Work.

That the Klamath government irrigation project will be carried to completion is now almost an assured fact.

Chief Engineer Newell of the reclamation service has assured Oregon's delegation in congress that every phase of the project is favorable.

It is one of the largest government irrigation projects under consideration, and will reclaim about 312,000 acres of semi-arid land.

The major portion of this large tract lies in Oregon, a small portion extending south of the line into California.

Engineer Newell suggests that the Oregon irrigation law should be changed to conform to the suggestion of the government. The present irrigation code of the state is crude and disorganized and conflicts with the demands of the government.

In order to study the water systems and streams of the Klamath project, gauging stations are now being established throughout the district by the reclamation department.
