EPIDEMIC OF MEASLES CLOSES PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

Cattle Buyers Offer 4 Cents for Fat Cattle to Be Delivered February 15—Growers Refuse to Contract, Believing That the 4 Cent Mark Will Be Reached Before That Time—Butter Creek Farmers Install New Feed Chopping Plant at Cost of \$1200.

Echo, Jan. 19.—The epidemic of measles in the neighborhood still continues, and the city marshal is busy enforcing the quarantine law. In consequence of the great amount of sickness the public school has been ordered closed for the present, by the board of directors.

Mr. and Mrs. Frank Shipley, who have been visiting Mrs. Shipley's mother, Mrs. Grant Buchanan, on Butter creek, have returned to Trail, R. C., their home. Mr. Shipley may locate in this country, if he can find a ranch that suits him.

The cattle market is looking up, and buyers are offering to contract for February cattle, to be delivered February 15 to 20 at 4 cents. No contracts have been made, the cattle feeders figuring that the cattle market will advance to this price before that time.

Echo, always to be counted for its progressiveness, will, as soon as the weather permits, fly from its new school house, an American flag, secured for the purpose by popular subscription.

James Means is having the front of his saloon remodeled. Mr. Bullock has charge of the work. A glass front will be put in, and up-to-date fixtures installed.

A. Pierce has taken a two years' lease on the hotel building of Mrs. Webb, and will, as soon as the house has been put in first-class repair, open up as a restaurant.

A. C. Crawford and wife have taken up their residence among us, and has moved into the house vacated by R. R. Lewis. Mr. Crawford is actively interested in irrigation projects near Echo, and expects to make this his permanent home.

The farmers have had considerable trouble with the power of the gasoline engine in connection

with the chopping machine, and the power of this engine is guaranteed. Complete, the engine will cost between \$1100 and \$1200.

TO PROTECT WATER FOWL.

Senator Pierce Introduces Bill Suggested by Pendleton Sportsmen.

Following is senate bill No. 55, protecting water fowl, and introduced by Senator Pierce of this county:

A bill for an act to amend section 2014 of the codes and statutes of Oregon, as compiled by Charles B. Bellinger and W. W. Cotton.

Be it enacted by the legislative assembly of the state of Oregon; and, be it enacted by the people of the state of Oregon:

That section 2014 of the codes and statutes of Oregon, as compiled by Charles B. Bellinger and W. W. Cotton, be amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2014. Except in the counties of Jackson, Klamath and Lake, it shall be unlawful at any time between the first day of March and the first day of September of any year to take, kill, injure, destroy or have in possession, sell, or offer for sale, barter or exchange, any wild goose, wild swan, mallard duck, wood duck, wildgeon, teal, spoonbill, gray, black, sprigtail or canvasback duck. In the counties of Jackson, Klamath and Lake, it shall be unlawful at any time between the first day of January and the fifteenth day of September of any year to take, kill, injure, destroy, or have in possession, sell, or offer for sale, barter or exchange, any of the wild fowls or game birds mentioned in this section. And it shall be unlawful at any time for any person to kill or destroy any greater number than 50 of the hereinbefore enumerated ducks in one week, or more than 25 in any one day. It shall be unlawful at any time to shoot at, or take, or kill, or attempt to take, kill, injure or destroy by any means any wild goose, on any island or sandbar, in or along the Columbia river, and within the state east of the Cascade mountains, on which wild geese habitually rest or roost; provided, however, that in the county of Coos, the season during which it shall be lawful to take or kill the fowl mentioned in this section, shall be from the first day of August in each year to the first day of February in the following year, and it shall be unlawful in the
