According to the late press dispatches a new line of railroad is to be built from Butte, Mont., to San Francisco via Boise, a distance of 1600 miles, which will place these towns 300 miles nearer each other by rail. The new road will be known as the San Francisco, Idaho & Montana Railway company, and has been incorporated with a capital stock of \$50,000,000.

The officers of the new railroad company are: William Payton Mason, of Minneapolis, president; C. H. Fleming, of Minneapolis, vice-president; G. T. Popper, of Boise, secretary; W. E. Forak, of Boise, secretary. These four officials with J. A. McGinty of Boise, constitute the board of directors.

The new road will be of standard gauge and will pass through Jordan valley, Oregon, and McDermitt, Nev., and a vast territory which hitherto has not been traversed by the iron horse.

It is claimed that J. J. Hill of the Great Northern, is financing the new road. Plans have been maturing for the past two years and all of the right of way has practically been secured.—Ontario Democrat.
