GENERAL NEWS.

Dr. S. R. Beckwith, who was Pres-
ident Garfield's family physician at
the time of his assassination, is dead
at his cottage at Atlantic City, after
a long illness.

The bodies of five Americans who
were murdered in Sonora, Mexico, by
Yaqui Indians, have been brought
into Nogales, Ariz. The dead men re-
cently came from Illinois.

Two men and one woman, all liv-
ing in widely separated parts of Den-
ver, Col., drank muriatic acid Janu-
ary 20, mistaking it for whiskey. All
were rendered dangerously sick, but
will recover.

Dr. Obelia Blynn, for 30 years a
practicing physician in Chicago, is
dead. Her professional standing was
high, and she spent the larger part
of a large income in philanthropic
undertakings.

The South Dakota legislature is
wrestling with various measures de-
signed to amend the divorce laws of
that state so as to conform more
nearly or quite, with the divorce laws
of most other states, and so eliminate
the "easy divorce" odium.

Captain David B. Milliken, 27th in-
fantry, recently tried at Fort Sheri-
dan on the charge of making false
statements, was found guilty by court-
martial and dismissed from the
army. Milliken, it is alleged, married
a Filipino, but reported himself un-
married.

A movement is on foot to stop the
exportation from Canada of all logs
and wood suitable to be made into
pulp for paper. The animus is a pos-
sibility of cornering the paper out-
put within a few years—at least to
the extent of enormously advancing
its price.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

J. Court Hall, a saloonkeeper at
Gold Hill, struck G. Lane over the
head with a billiard cue during a
quarrel. Lane will probably die.

John Dunert was awarded \$2500
by a federal court jury at Seattle for
the loss of an arm, which was cut
off by a Northern Pacific train last
June.

Seattle will at once put upon the
market bonds of the face value of
\$425,000 for the building of a new
jail and construction of a municipal
lighting plant.

The Seattle Civic Union, entirely
regardless of the politics of its mem-
bers, is working hard for the enact-
ment of a direct primary law by the
Washington legislature.

John Roberts, president of the
miners at Silverton, B. C., has been
committed for trial on the charge of
attempting to murder Montague
Davis, a mine manager.

A man named Taylor was badly
burned in the face and eyes by a
blast which hung fire in a stump near
Woodburn, on a piece of land he was
clearing. He will lose one eye.

Joshua Ferguson, a colored cook
in the employ of J. T. Callender and
wife, also colored, of Oakland, Cal.,
became enraged at Callender and his
wife and shot and instantly killed the
latter and barely missed Callender.
He then shot himself dead.

Hagsdale & Reddy, P. B. Theiss,
Selsby & McGill and yet another man,
all saloon proprietors of Medford,
are under arrest charged with selling
liquor in a precinct which went "dry"
at the last election. Only a portion
of Medford voted to exclude the sal-
oons.

AID OLD SOLDIERS

BLAKELY BILL WOULD PAY INDIAN FIGHTERS.

Legislature of 1903 Appropriated
\$100,000 for this Purpose. But it
Was \$30,000 Less Than the Amount
Needed — These Veterans Have
Waited 50 Years for Their Pay—
Many of Them Have Died Unpaid.

Following is house bill 145, intro-
duced by Representative Blakely of
this county, for the relief of the vet-
erans of the Indian war of 1855-56.
The bill provides for an appropriation
of \$30,000 to pay the veterans.

A bill for an act to provide for
compensating volunteers for the ser-
vice of the territory of Oregon dur-
ing the Indian wars of 1855 and 1856
who were not provided for by an act
of the legislature of the state of Ore-
gon which passed the house February
18, 1903, and which passed the senate
February 20, 1903, and filed in the
office of the secretary of state Febru-
ary 24, 1903, and appropriating
money therefor.

Whereas, The people of Oregon,
and of the whole Northwest, are
greatly indebted to the volunteers
who served in the Indian wars of 1855
and 1856; and

Whereas, Those brave veterans
have not all been compensated for
said services, by reason of the insuffi-
ciency of the appropriation made by
the legislature of the state of Oregon
by an act of 1903; therefore,

Be it enacted by the legislative as-
sembly of the state of Oregon; and,
also, be it enacted by the people of
the state of Oregon:

Section 1. That there be and
hereby is appropriated out of the
general funds in the treasury of the
state of Oregon the sum of forty-five
thousand dollars (\$45,000), or so
much thereof as shall be necessary
to pay the balance of the claims al-
ready found due by the secretary of
state, and those that may yet be filed
for service in the Indian wars of
1855 and 1856, who served under and
by virtue of the directions of the of-
ficers of Oregon territory for their
said services under the conditions
and upon the terms hereinafter pro-
vided.

Sec. 2. That each non-commissioned
officer and private who have not
already been paid by reason of the
act of 1903, who served the territory
of Oregon in the Indian wars of 1855
and 1856, shall be entitled to receive
for such services the sum of two dol-
lars (\$2) per day for himself, and all
commissioned officers shall receive
such sum as was paid to officers of
the same rank of the army of the
United States at said time; provided,
that any amount paid on account
thereof by the United States shall be
deducted therefrom.

Sec. 3. The claim for such ser-
vices, verified by the claimant, shall
be presented to the adjutant general,
who shall, without additional cost to
the state, examine and pass upon the
same, and may require additional and
corroborative evidence in support
thereof; and he shall prepare, certify
and file with the secretary of state
proper vouchers showing the amount
payable to the claimant under the
provisions of this act and the act of
1903. Thereupon, the secretary of
state shall issue his warrant for the
amount found due to the claimant.

Sec. 4. This act, so far as the
same relates to the pay of volunteers,
shall be so construed as to apply to
all who have been in the service of
the territory of Oregon during the
Indian wars of 1855 and 1856, and it
shall also extend to the services of
the ninth regiment of the Oregon mil-
itia, while the same was in actual
service during said war.

Sec. 5. The claim for services ren-
dered by said volunteers shall only be
made by the volunteers themselves,
and in no event can the claim be filed
by his widow, heir, or estate; and in
no event shall the claim for said ser-
vices of said volunteers be payable or
due to any person except the volun-
teer who shall have actually served in
said Indian wars, except in the event
that the volunteer in said Indian wars
has died since the filing and proving
of his claim before the adjutant gen-
eral and secretary of state, in which
event the amount found due shall be
paid to the widow of said deceased
volunteer, if any; but in no event shall
said amount be payable to the heirs,
either direct or indirect, or the estate
of said volunteer, and should the de-
ceased volunteer leave no widow, then
the amount found due said volunteer
shall revert to the state of Oregon.

Sec. 6. Whereas the state of Ore-
gon by an act of the legislature of
1903, appropriated the sum of one
hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000)
to pay the volunteers serving in said
Indian wars, and said amount has
been found insufficient to meet the
claims filed and there are now claims
aggregating the sum of thirty-nine
thousand dollars (\$39,000) from vol-
unteers who have never been paid for
said services, and many of said volun-
teers are now in great need of said
compensation, therefore an emergen-
cy exists and this act shall be and re-
main in full force and effect and af-
ter its approval by the governor.

RATES ARE REDUCED

O. R. & N. COMPANY EN- COURAGES IMMIGRATION.

Charges on Emigrant Shipments From
the East to the Northwest, Are Re-
duced From 75 Cents to 50 Cents
Per 100 Pounds, or \$50 Per Car—
This Action is Taken for the Pur-
pose of Encouraging Settlement, as
the Reduced Rate Will Enable
Many Homeseekers to Ship All
Their Goods by Railroad Lots.

Taking effect on February 15, and
expiring May 15, the O. R. & N. will
have in effect a special rate on house-
hold goods in railroad lots from the
East to the Northwest states.

This reduction amounts to \$20 per
car and will induce many homeseek-
ers to come west with all their house-
hold goods. Following is a circular
just issued by General Freight Agent
R. P. Miller to all agents of the O. R.
& N.:

To all Agents: Taking effect Febru-
ary 15th next, and expiring May 15th,
rate of 50 cents per 100 pounds on
emigrant moveables in railroad lots, min-
imum 20,000 pounds, will be estab-
lished from Union Pacific Eastern
terminals and west thereof to all
points on the lines of the O. R. & N.
in Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

The present rate is 75 cents per 100
pounds. The reduction is, therefore,
33 1-3 per cent, or \$50 per car. It
is made for the purpose of encourag-
ing immigration. I suggest you take
occasion to promptly advise your
commercial bodies and others inter-
ested in that cause, and at the same
time see that the information is
given to the press in order that the
facts may become widely known and
the greatest benefits to your commu-
nity realize from the concession.

at the South.

Just now there is a pretty brisk
demand for hop roots for setting new
yards, owing of course, to the fair
market for the past few years, says

acres of hops, the ground of which
was so badly washed by high water a
few years ago that further cultivation
was not profitable, even if possible,
and he turned them wild. Already
he has shipped 100,000 settings to
California points and has orders for
more. He gets \$5 a 1000, half or
more of which is profit.
