### GENERAL NEWS.

The territory within a radius of 10 miles of Hudson, Summit county, Ohio, produces more maple sugar than is produced anywhere else in the world on five times that space.

Tom Carney, of Matawan, N. J., aged 65 years, apparently died, and had been "laid out" 36 hours, when he revived. The doctors say he has a good average chance to live 20 years.

Bill "Crow Catcher" Lang, one of the greatest long distance runners the world has ever seen, is an inmate of the almshouse at Salford, England, a decrepit, withered old man. His record of 9:11 1/2 for two miles, made in 1862, is still the professional record.

City Marshal Tillman, at Wilson, Kan., shot and killed Samuel Hutchinson, postmaster and editor, and then committed suicide. Several days ago Tillman whipped Hutchinson's boy and Hutchinson scored the marshal in his paper. Today they met and quarreled.

Robert Waters, W. M. Drinkwater and Ellis Waterhouse engaged in a fight at Collins, Ga., which resulted in all three being badly hurt, but no one fatally so. They were separated by two constables named Beers and Alehouse and a bystander named Tippler.

Investigation discloses that in a high school class of 48 in a Connecticut school, 19 girls and 26 boys smoke cigarettes. The principal of the school testified to the commission (members of the state board of health) that the cigarette users average 20 per cent lower in their studies, are untruthful, dishonest and untrustworthy.

### NORTHWEST NEWS.

The Lewiston Foundry company has increased its capital from \$20,000 to \$50,000.

Donald McLean Brown, president of the Seattle Bridge company, is dead of exhaustion caused by overwork.

A broom factory was recently built at Roseburg and a \$6500 plant installed. January 23 it was entirely destroyed by an incendiary fire.

In the Oregon house the bill to increase marriage license fees has been effectively defeated. Not even a reconsideration vote could be secured.

J. C. Baker, aged 50 years, a comparative stranger in Portland, was found lying in the mud on a back street, saturated with rain and beslobbered with mud, and nearly unconscious. Though alive and conscious, he cannot talk, and will die.

The trustees of the George Peabody education fund, have unanimously voted \$1,000,000 for the Peabody school for teachers at Nashville, Tenn.—an institution for normal training of colored teachers and those who will teach colored people.

Frank Ray, a colored porter, slipped and fell while cleaning windows on the upper story of the Delmonico restaurant at Seattle. He came down through a skylight feet foremost into a 15-gallon pot of hot soup stock in the kitchen. He was not injured further than to scald the skin off his feet and his legs to the knees.

A San Francisco judge required a bond of \$25,000 of Chan Cheung, a Chinaman accused of murdering Tom Tick, member of a rival highbinder organization. It was believed the bond was prohibitive and would keep Cheung safely in jail until tried. On the other hand Cheung dug up \$25,000 cash, deposited it and is at liberty.

Mrs. Oscar Mitchell, accompanied by her daughters, Mrs. John Weatherford, and Mrs. John Oliver, left for Seattle on Monday morning's train. They went to attend the funeral services of Mrs. Mitchell's sister, Mrs. Mitchell had lost all her other sisters in the recent Heppner flood.

Mr. Will Moore, of the Pacific Coast Warehouse Co., was in Echo Saturday.

Ralph Stanfield came up from Portland Saturday afternoon. He had been there on business for the past week.

School was reopened on Monday morning, having been closed for a week on account of the great amount of sickness. However, the measles seem to be not abating and every few days another family is reported with this disease. No fatalities have resulted, and the quarantine is quite rigidly enforced. The local doctors are kept busy, but seem equal to the occasion.

The city council of Echo is planning to arrange for meetings of the council in the near future in some public place, where it will be convenient for the public to attend. This will prove a wise and acceptable move on the part of the council, because when the council has its meetings in a private dwelling, the public hesitates to attend.

H. E. Stevens, who has been in the employ of the Echo Lumber Co., has succeeded A. W. Robinson, as manager of the same company. Mr. Robinson is moving to Pendleton to accept the position as manager of the lumber yards formerly owned by J. A. Borie, and lately sold to the Wind River Lumber Co.

## BIGELOW ON LABOR

CINCINNATI PASTOR SCORES  
PRESIDENT ELLIOT.

Conditions of American Labor Are Pictured by Pastor Bigelow—President Elliot Is Criticized for His Narrow Views on Labor and Its Surroundings—Comparisons Are Drawn From the Statistics of the Labor Commissioner.

Cincinnati, Jan. 25.—President Elliot's stand on the labor question was the subject of some comment by Herbert S. Bigelow, in his pulpit at the Vine Street Congregational church Sunday night. President Elliot was quoted as saying:

"I have lately had occasion to think a good deal about the conditions of labor in our American society, and the saddest thing that I have learned is the lack of the happy spirit of labor in American industries. That is a most pathetic and lamentable thing. \* \* \* What is the cure for this prodigious evil? It is the bringing into American industries of the method and spirit of the artist. The artist rejoices in his work; it is the chief satisfaction and happiness of his life."

Remarkable.  
"Not a prodigious remedy," said Mr. Bigelow, "for so prodigious an evil. There is a lack of happiness in the work of the American people. This is a prodigious evil. The cure for it is to introduce happiness into the work of the American people. A truly remarkable suggestion. "With this kind of reasoning, what problem need stump us? Poverty is a prodigious evil. The cure for it is riches. Intemperance is a prodigious evil. The cure for it is temperance. Sickness is a prodigious evil. The cure for it is health."

What Labor Is Paid.  
If the American workman is not happy, why not? The last bulletin of the labor bureau furnishes some official statistics which have a bearing on the subject.

In Indiana, the wages of 48,225 employees were investigated, and the average was found to be \$8.77 a week. \$494 carriage workers were found to receive an average of \$6.98 a week. The average for nearly 2000 paper mill hands was found to be \$6.57 a week. Conditions were better in Illinois. The average weekly wage of 89,881 employees in this state was found to be \$9.70. In Missouri the average for over 10,000 investigated drops to \$8.76 a week. In this state, there were three free employment bureaus that received over 15,000 applications for positions. They were compelled to send 6000 of these applicants away into enforced idleness.

In the same report the labor commissioner informs us that the employees of the woolen mills of New Jersey get \$6.43 a week. The factory hands in Pennsylvania were found to get \$9.28 a week. The anthracite coal miners made \$9.53 a week. And the men who have not the privilege of mining coal but who are able to get jobs as helpers merely, made an average weekly wage of \$5.98.

Now, suppose we take one of these \$5.89 a week men. Call up a picture. A miser's hovel. Six small

children. Why not? Eight mouths to feed. Flour, shoes, clothes, school books to buy. Rent to pay. Five dollars and ninety-eight cents a week. Just slip into his boots. How would you like to put your hand on that man's shoulder and say:

"My man, I perceive you do not go about your work happily. This is a prodigious evil. Now the cure for this is simple. You should become a kind of artist.
