Reappoints Old Commission.

Governor Chamberlain yesterday afternoon reappointed the members of the old text book commission to compose that body for the next four years. This commission was named by ex-Governor Geer four years ago and is composed of William Colvig, of Jacksonville; P. L. Campbell, of Eugene; C. A. Johns, of Baker City; and H. W. Scott and W. M. Ladd of Portland. JONES TAKEN TO THE ASYLUM.

Stranger Who Was Taken in Custody at Echo.

Last evening Deputy Sheriff C. P. Davis left for Salem, having in charge Frederick Jones, the insane man who was brought here from Echo several days ago.

Jones was a transient laborer and arrived in Echo about a week ago, and immediately showed signs of insanity. On being brought here he was examined before County Judge Beun and declared insane. But as his misfortune was apparently caused largely by too much drinking, he was held in the county jail for several days by Sheriff Taylor, in the hope that he would improve. There being no change in his mental condition, it was decided yesterday to send him to the asylum.
