GENERAL NEWS.

January 31 three men were accidentally killed in Fall River, Mass. in different cotton mills.

Mrs. Anne Jane Gilbert, the actress who died December last, left property to the amount of \$10,000.

Mrs. Eleanor Campbell, aged 40, of Riverside, Cal., and a millionaire widow, has married a hotel bellboy, who is barely of age.

Jose Matia Lopez is dead at San Roman Epitaph, Mexico. He was 129 years old and had served for 95 years as foreman of laborers.

Mrs. Janet Cottrell, of Pleasantville, N. Y., has been the mother of 15 children during the 14 years she has been married. She is 37 years old.

During January 1905 there were 75 "violent crimes," of the murder, hold-up and burglary class in New York City, as against nine during January, 1904.

Mamie Rayburn, an actress, was burned to death in a Cincinnati theater by her clothes catching fire just as she was about to go on the stage in the second act.

At Eschenthal, Germany, a tree was cut down at 7:35 in the morning and at 9:45, just 2:15 later, it reappeared as a roll of paper, and 26 minutes later was being sold on the streets as a newspaper.

The new agreement entered into by a majority of the lumbermen of Humboldt county, California, to charge all men employed in the camps \$15 per month for board, was the cause of a general walkout in all the camps of that county.

Chauncey B. Hotelling, convicted of manslaughter in the second degree in the burning to death of his blind child, was sentenced at Binghamton, N. Y., to 15 years in Auburn prison and to pay a fine of \$1000, the maximum penalty.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

During 1904 there were 57 births in Carson City, Nev., of which 56 were girls.

Five steel bridges will be built over Prickley Pear creek, near Helena, Mont.

The pupils at the Chemawa Indian school publish an interesting weekly paper.

The average annual precipitation on Coos bay is about 50 inches, of which there has been 24 since last summer.

During 1904, 18,607 boats passed through the steel drawbridge at Portland, which was swung 14,229 times without an accident.

At Everett, Wash., Scott Hively has been sent to the penitentiary for 12 years for trying to kill his wife, whom he shot through the neck with a pistol last December.

At Coquille, Or., J. O. Christie, aged 60 years, was run over and killed by a switch engine and three cars. Christie was sober and the accident was wholly due to his own carelessness.

M. L. Causey, of La Grande, one of Grand Ronde's extensive fruit growers, will put in 9000 apple trees shortly, which will connect with the 220 acres he has in fruit trees now, which is one of the largest fruit tracts in the state.

George Beauchamp, one of the leading officers of the Salvation Army of Reno, Nev., committed suicide February 3 by taking strychnine in the presence of his wife and two young children. Beauchamp's bad health was the cause.

GOOD CONDITION O. R. & N. TRACK

WINTER WEATHER HAS FAVORED THE SYSTEM.

Very Little Snow to Block the Cuts—Nor Rains to Soften the Bad Places—Mountain Division Was Never in Better Condition—Extensive Improvements in View This Year—Roadbed Will Be Put in the Best Possible Condition to Meet the Heavy Traffic.

Pete Grant, division roadmaster of the O. R. & N. between Bingham Springs and Huntington, was in the city yesterday in the interest of his department. Mr. Grant is well pleased with the weather this winter, from a roadmaster's standpoint, as there has been so little snow and rain, that his division is in first-class condition, although this is the worst season of the year to damage track.

On the Blue mountains and on the range of mountains between Baker City and Huntington, where usually a heavy snow fall occurs, there is but very little snow and the ground has remained frozen most of the winter, thus preserving the track in good condition, as left last fall.

Between Baker City and Haines, is a stretch of track which becomes very soft in the winter and spring season, but this year it has remained firm and solid. Near Durkee is another piece of track which has given much trouble in the past, because of its becoming soft. This has remained in good condition this winter, also. The rotary snow plow has not been used so far this winter.

As to traveling the mountain division from Huron to Huntington the coming season, it is impossible to say at this time, as no gravel bed of sufficient extent has yet been found to warrant any preparations for the work.

An appropriation of \$2,000,000 has been set aside for betterments on the O. R. & N. system, this to include track improvements, new bridges and buildings and better yard and sidetrack facilities at terminal stations. Already the roadbed has been gravelled from Umatilla to Huron, and partly across Baker valley, but the improvements this year contemplate a complete graveling of the system from Huron to Huntington. If sufficient gravel can be found.

Every improvement will be made to insure the best possible roadbed to meet the unusually heavy traffic expected this season, and to bear the weight of the enormous engines that have been added to the equipment within the past two years.

FOR WHITMAN DEBATE.

Idaho Submits Important Questions for Coming Contest.

Walla Walla, Feb. 6.—The University of Idaho has submitted to Whitman college the question for the annual intercollegiate debate and Whitman debaters must make choice of sides by the first of the coming week.

The question submitted by the Moscow orators is: "Resolved, That whenever in the event of continued domestic troubles lives, or property are not adequately protected by a state, it is for the public good that the president should have the power to afford protection without the application of the state for federal aid."

No date has as yet been set for the try-out to select the Whitman team but it will be by the briefing system.

The try-out for the Pullman debating team has been set for next Tuesday evening.
