Fast and Long Distance Men Are on the Track.

Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 6.—The first day of the 72-hour 12-hour a day pedestrian race attracted a large crowd of lovers of sport and athletics to the old City hall today. The list of contestants and the auspicious conditions attended the opening of the race combine to give promise of a highly successful contest.

There are nearly a dozen fast men in the race, the number including Pat Cavanaugh, who won the last race held here two years ago; Gilbert Barnes, the G. A. R. champion, who finished second to Cavanaugh; Gus Guerrero, the Mexican, who created a record for the 72 hours by covering 417 miles at the Madison Square garden race of 1892, and E. C. McClelland, holder of the world's record for 25 miles.

SQUARE MILE FARM FAVORS THE FAIR

SENATOR GIBSON OF MONTANA AGAINST LAND GRABS.

Pleads With the President Against Passage of Proposed Law Permitting Homesteaders to Enter 640 Acres of Land in Western States—Means Land Grabbing by Companies and Will Keep Actual Settlers Away From the Land.

Senator Paris Gibson of Montana, in company with Guy E. Mitchell, secretary of the National Irrigation association, recently called upon the president to discuss the various measures before congress, affecting Montana, Colorado and South Dakota, and allowing a homestead entryman to take up a square mile of land instead of 160 acres.

Senator Gibson stated to the president that he believed a 640-acre homestead policy was one of the most dangerous and menacing pieces of legislation which had been suggested. He said that it was proposed to open up the rich Western lands in these large tracts and that it would result in the aggregation of great holdings, far worse than anything of the kind which had yet occurred.

No man can say at this time, Senator Gibson declared, what are purely irredeemable grazing lands, and what are agricultural lands. Great tracts of country are being cultivated today in small farms, which 10 years ago were looked upon as utterly worthless, and the womb of the future certainly contains even greater surprises.

Under increasing knowledge of conditions, improving methods of agriculture and the constant discovery and introduction by the department of agriculture of arid land crops, we are making wonderful progress, and why, Senator Gibson pleaded, should we check this great land producing development by bringing upon our western country the curse of further great land holdings.

No man, he stated, can as successfully farm a square mile as he can 160 acres and to give men 640 acres would mean that in most cases they would not try to farm it, they would not struggle with the soil and with new crops and succeed in growing anything upon it; it would simply support a few herd of cattle or a small band of sheep. Senator Gibson told the president that he spoke from a 20 years' residence and an active and practical farm experience in Montana.

Mr. Mitchell added that the objection of the National Irrigation association to the square-mile homestead policy was that very large areas of good agricultural land where 160 acres was ample for a home, would be included in the 640-acre homesteads, and he supported Senator Gibson's contention that with our present knowledge of western lands, a proper and intelligent classification is impossible.

He mentioned an instance coming under his notice last summer embracing some hundred thousand acres of high table land in the Cherry Patch ridge, a day's drive from Harlem, Mon., where the land had been grazed for 20 years, open to homestead entry, but with no thought of its being farming land capable of supporting families. Last season 10 acres were planted to various grains, flax, etc., and in spite of very late planting and an exceptionally poor year, excellent yields were produced without irrigation, an utter astonishment to the people of Harlem, and now the country is being settled up with the assurance of a large and prosperous farming community.

NOTABLE BIBLE CONFERENCE.

Foreign and American Students Are at Atlanta.

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 6.—Arrangements now making for the Tabernacle Bible conference and School of Methods, to be held in Atlanta next month, indicate that the gathering will be one of the most notable of its kind ever held in America. A number of distinguished speakers from many parts of the world will take part, among them Rev. F. B. Meyer of London, England; Rev. C. T. Schofield of Dallas, Texas; Rev. S. D. Gordon of Cleveland, O.; Rev. A. C. Dixon of Boston; Rev. J. M. Conkey, of Pennsylvania; Rev. W. E. Blackstone of Chicago; W. R. Moody, of East Northfield, Mass., and Rev. J. W. McCollum, of Japan.

The subjects to be discussed cover a wide field of Christian work. Among those to which particular attention will be given are: "The Coming of Christ," "Evangelism," "Missions," and "Prayer."

TWO MILLION CO-OPERATORS.

They Are Members of 2027 English Societies.

London, Feb. 6.—Some interesting particulars as to the growth of the co-operative movement in England in the past 10 years have just been published by the board of trade. Official returns relating to 2027 societies are dealt with. They show that the growth of the distributive and productive societies of all classes has been continuous. The present total membership is 2,085,731, compared with 1,245,066 a decade ago, an increase of 67.12 per cent. The total stock, loan and reserve capital amounts to \$185,316,550 and during 1903 they did a business amounting to \$495,050,745.

LIVESTOCK EXPERT WHO KNOWS ITS ADVANTAGES.

N. C. Maris Strongly Favors an Exhibit of Umatilla County Livestock, Knowing That It Cannot Be Surpassed by Any County in the State—Necessity of Getting Into the Circuit—Is Writing Up Butter Creek Herds for the Northwest Rural Spirit.

That the agricultural and livestock fair proposed for Pendleton will prove of great benefit to all interests concerned is the firm belief of N. C. Maris. Mr. Maris was for a time in charge of the C. B. Wade fine bred livestock and livestock exhibits. Since leaving here he has made his home in Portland, and is now connected with the Northwest Rural Spirit of that place. He was seen this morning at the Hotel St. George, and expressed the belief that Umatilla county should be proud of its livestock as well as its farming interests, because of the fact that some of the finest herds in the state are in this county.

"The main thing in regard to the fair," said he, "will be to have the dates so arranged as not to conflict with the other fairs on the circuit. Most of the large fine stock exhibitors like to cover as many places as possible, and will undoubtedly come here if there is no conflict. It costs them as much to prepare their stock for one fair as for a whole series, and when they are out they wish to exhibit at as many places as possible, thus winning more premiums and better advertising their herds. I believe the matter of getting into the circuit to be a very important one, and that it should not be overlooked by the men in charge of the fair."

According to Mr. Maris there is no doubting the fact that stockmen who attempt to build up their herds and make a specialty of good stock derive immense benefit from exhibiting at fairs, and he prophesies that the Umatilla county stockmen will do well by the proposed fair.

Mr. Maris will leave today for Butter Creek to investigate the winter feeding that is being done there. He is the traveling man for his publication, and is preparing illustrated articles on livestock subjects.

Mr. Maris has sold his herd of 25 registered Shorthorns which he has been wintering near Pullman, to E. E. Dent, of Cheney, Wash.

On the eighth and ninth of the month he will attend the meeting of the Inland Stockgrowers' association to be held at Pullman. During the session a local livestock exhibit will also be held.

PAINTERS AND DECORATORS.

Not a Meeting of Unions, But of Employers.

Milwaukee, Wis., Feb. 6.—The annual convention of the National Association of Master Painters and House Decorators begins here tomorrow and many delegates and visitors are arriving from various parts of the country. The attendance promises to be the largest in the history of the association's meetings. The sessions will continue four days and will be devoted to the reading of papers and the discussion of many questions of great interest to the trade.

The officers of the association, all of whom are already here, are President John Dewar, of Pittsburgh; vice president, Oliver S. Boss, of Chicago; secretary and treasurer, William E. Wall, of Somerville, Mass.

The local members of the organization have made elaborate preparations for the entertainment of the visiting members, many of whom are accompanied by their wives and families.

Discovery of a New Metal.

Rome, Feb. 6.—A new metal discovered by Signor Ugo Travaiglini and christened "Radioro," is attracting much attention in scientific circles. It is said to be non-magnetic, of small gravity, hard and malleable, and its discoverer claims for it a large commercial value. He has undertaken the task of coining medals and duplicates of ancient coins out of it for the King of Italy, and will shortly exhibit at Milan specimens of machine fittings and firearms of the same substance.

Journeyman Tailors Meet.

Bloomington, Ill., Feb. 6.—Upwards of 200 delegates are here from all parts of the United States and Canada for the biennial convention of the Journeymen Tailors' union, which will be in session during the next 10 days. The most important question that will be brought up for consideration is that of the removal of the headquarters of the union from this city to Chicago. The report of Secretary Lennon shows the affairs of the organization to be in a satisfactory condition.

St. Paul Poultry Show.

St. Paul, Minn., Feb. 6.—The most notable poultry and pet stock exhibition ever held in this state opened in St. Paul today under the auspices of the Minnesota Poultry association. The display of domestic poultry, including chickens, ducks, turkeys and geese, is larger than ever before and of an unusually high class. The most notable feature of the exhibition, however, is the department devoted to wild land and water fowl. The display of pheasants is the best ever seen in this country and includes rare exhibits of Chinese, Japanese, Golden Amber, silver and other varieties.
