GENERAL NEWS.

The passenger steamer Iowa, from Milwaukee to Chicago, is stuck in the ice two miles off the latter port, and has laid there helpless for two days.

The dead body of Enoch D. Jenkins, who had been murdered, probably for his money, was found 14 miles west of Ogden, Utah, covered with rocks.

The total number of American automobiles in 1903 was 14,000, valued at \$15,000,000. There are now in use 18,500, valued at \$22,000,000, the output of 50 manufacturers.

Capitalists will colonize in Southwestern Texas about 600 Japanese skilled in silk worm raising, and settle them on one family to five acres. All will engage in silk culture.

Trepoff, the new governor general of St. Petersburg, believes he has a charmed life. Four unsuccessful attempts have been made to assassinate him during the past three years.

John Harding, of Trenton, N. J., 42 years old, is rejoicing over the birth of a son, which is the second one born to him in two years. Three years ago he married a woman 23 years old.

Fifty vessels of all sizes and kinds are fast in the ice of Philadelphia harbor, and an equal number are stationary for the same reason, at various points between Boston and New York City.

A heavy, unexpected and sudden fall of rain quenched a fire at Birmingham, Ala., that threatened to wipe out the town, the department being almost powerless. As it was, \$240,000 damage was done.

Non-union miners of the Tuscon, Ariz., district have sued the United Mine Workers of America for \$146,000 damages, alleging that the order compelled the mine owners, by threats, to refuse them employment.

C. K. Beckwith, president of the defunct Citizens' National Bank of Oberlin, O., (swept through Mrs. Chadwick's operations,) is dead at the age of 63. He was really killed by charrin and worry over the Chadwick affair, which resulted in five indictments being returned against him.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

R. E. Clark was killed by a limb falling 50 feet and crushing his skull. He was working in a lumber camp near Harrisburg, Or.

The profits on the Astoria municipal water system for 1904 were \$11,082.02, and of that sum \$2900 is placed in the sinking fund.

Booker T. Washington, the great negro educator, will lecture in Spokane under the auspices of the Cottage Manual Training School.

Peter Thompson, fireman on the steamer Mayflower, stepped off the gang plank accidentally and in the dark, at Astoria, while going on board, and was drowned.

Jackson McMillan, of Garfield, has had his right leg amputated as a result of an injury to it, while playing base ball three years ago, since which time he has only walked on crutches.

Friends of Vancouver post favor appropriations amounting to \$655,000 for its improvement, and will ask that amount of this congress. It is possible that about one-third that amount will be secured.

Lottie Frazer, aged 18, daughter of Charles Frazer, living near Boise, took strychnine and died. She had been out without permission and when she returned her parents scolded her. The poison had been used in the house to kill rats.

"ADJOURNED" JURY

PIONEER STORY OF COURT
AT SWIFT'S STATION.

W. C. White Relates a Story of a Jury Called to Try a Murder Case, Adjourning on Motion and Going Home Until the Next Day—Judge Wilson Fined the Members \$4 Each and Gave Them a Thrilling Lecture on the Duties of a Jurymen.

W. C. White, now a resident of Foster, in this county, but who formerly lived in Pendleton and in the northern portion of the county, tells an interesting story of a session of circuit court held at Swift's station in 1882.

Mr. White was on the jury at the time and a murder trial from Umatilla Landing was called for the following day, at noon. The only means of travel at that time was by stage coach, and as the witnesses were coming from Umatilla by stage, the jury thought there would be nothing for it to do until that time. The jury had been called on the case and a portion of the testimony heard, when more witnesses were summoned from Umatilla.

While in the jury room discussing the case, the jury decided that as there could be nothing done further until noon the next day the members might as well go home and return the next day, when the stage came with the witnesses.

A vote was taken on adjournment, and all but one member of the jury voted to adjourn, without consulting the judge on the subject, and as the vote was almost unanimous, this one man did not hold out but said he would go home also.

Tom Ireland was foreman of the jury and declared the jury adjourned until noon the next day, and requested all the members to be on hand promptly.

Joseph Wilson was circuit judge at the time, and when he sent the bailiff to call the jury into court to be dismissed, for the afternoon, in order that they might be called on another case, for that day, he found the jury room empty and no jurors to be found.

Promptly at noon next day the members of the adjourned jury appeared in court and assembled for the further discussion and hearing of the murder case. Just as promptly Judge Wilson called the members before him and explained the gravity of their crime and after fining them \$4 each, gave them a lecture on the duties of a jurymen, which Mr. White says he very well remembers until today. He has not moved to adjourn a jury since.

MAKING WHIRLWIND OF TWIST.

Architect Becomes Confused on the Name of a Patron.

The following little incident which occurred in the office of Architect Troutman recently, goes to show that while the use of a synonymous term may be all right when an inanimate object is referred to, the same is not true with respect to personal names.

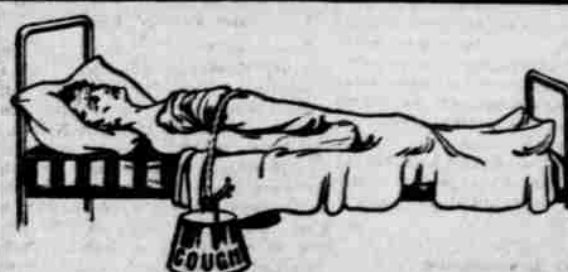
