GRIP TIGHTENS ON HERMANN

CASE AGAINST CONGRESSMAN BECOMES SERIOUS.

Burning of 500 Letters Belonging to the Land Commissioner's Office is a Serious Crime—If the Letters Were Private, as He Claims, the Fines for Using Official Envelopes Would Amount to \$5,000,000—Chances for Hermann's Conviction Are Very Good.

The following Washington special to the Oregon Daily Journal, gives a synopsis of the case against Binger Hermann. The special says:

It is learned on excellent authority that the government attaches great importance to the fact that Binger Hermann, before retiring from the general land office, caused to be destroyed 500 letters books containing copies of letters he had written while commissioner, an average of 10 letters a day for his entire term. Hermann contends that these letters were of a private nature. The government has secured the testimony of one or more clerks who saw the letters in question which shows that many of them were in reply to letters which Hermann received making inquiry about public land business of one sort or another. This fact will be held out by the government to establish its contention that the letters were of a public nature and that the books destroyed contained government records, but it has further been learned that all the letters which the commissioner copied in his private books were sent through the mails under the government frank. Clerks and messengers who mailed letters did not place stamps on them, yet each envelope containing one of those alleged "private" letters bore on its face notice that there was a penalty of \$300 if used for private purposes.

If Mr. Hermann's contention is true, the government will show that he violated the postal laws and laid himself liable to a fine of \$300 for every private letter sent under his frank, and if all his letters were private, the maximum penalty should be imposed, which will never be done of course. Mr. Hermann would be fined \$5,000,000, for each letter book contained approximately 500 letters. But, if the government presses the case against Mr. Hermann for illegally using the government's frank on private correspondence, that charge will have to be brought in the District of Columbia, where the letters were mailed. This letter book incident, which for a time was set aside, now promises to play an important part in the government's case against ex-Commissioner Hermann.

MEMORY OF CHARLES DICKENS.

English Admirers Celebrate the Day of His Birth.

London, Feb. 7.—That the character and the works of Charles Dickens still has a strong hold on the affections of the English race was manifested today by the holding of literary and other exercises in many quarters to mark the anniversary of the great novelist's birth. The most notable of the observances was the annual dinner of the Box club, attended by many men of fame. The Box club, which was founded at the Athenaeum club in 1900, by a group of gentlemen who had known Dickens personally, has recently revised its constitution, and has largely extended its ranks. It was felt that the club—founded as a tribute of homage to Dickens, not only as a great author, but as a great philanthropist and reformer—should be more thoroughly representative, and thus more completely reflect the regard in which he is held by the English-speaking race. The membership has therefore been opened to those who admire Dickens from all points of view, and it now numbers over 200. The president is Lord James Hereford.

PROGRAM FOR ASSOCIATION.

Preparing for Editors' Convention at Guthrie.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 7.—The officers and members of the executive committee of the National Editorial association assembled here today to prepare a program for the next annual meeting of the association, which is to be held at Guthrie, O. T. The visiting newspaper men and the ladies accompanying them were given a trolley ride about the city this morning. At the state house they were received by Governor Hanly. The business meeting of the committee was held this afternoon at the Grand hotel. Tomorrow the committeemen will make a tour of the gas belt cities, visiting Marion, Anderson and Muncie, and returning to Indianapolis in the evening.

VIEWING THE PORTAGE.

Legislative Committee Look Over the Grades and Suggest Changes.

Today the legislative committee, consisting of Senators J. Bowerman and N. Wheelon and Hons. C. G. Huntley of Clackamas county, W. R. Newell of Washington, and John S. Ritchie of Marion, of the lower house, appointed in pursuance of a joint resolution of the legislature, paid a visit to the proposed route of the portage road between this city and Celilo, says The Dalles Chronicle.

Accompanying the members of the committee were Judge Mariner and Mr. Miller of Gilliam county, and Messrs. Judge Blakely, H. F. Woodcock, F. H. Taylor, J. M. Harper, H. L. Kuck, C. W. Dietzel, H. Weber, H. L. Jones, J. Worsley, F. H. Van Norden, A. Walther, G. E. Dunn and H. E. Smith of this city. H. B. Smith, clerk of the committee, represented the Telegram, and Messrs. H. E. Abry and Robert McClellan, engineers in charge of the work, accompanied the party with charts and maps of the road.

Near Celilo, the terminus of the road was viewed, where work in driving piles has already begun, and the beginning at the Big Eddy. It is proposed that the road leave the surveyed route about half a mile east of the Big Eddy and follow the hillside to Five Mile creek, where it can use the track of the Great Southern to this city. This will be a very feasible grade, will save extra handling of cargoes down the incline at the Big Eddy, and can be constructed at an approximate cost of \$30,000.

The plan apparently met with considerable favor by the committee, excepting one member who imagined the grade would be too steep for a railroad to reach the hillside from the level of the O. R. & N. Co.'s track. Senator Wheelon assured him that it had been surveyed, and he had the field notes of the survey in his desk in the senate chamber. This apparently satisfied him and we believe he will support the extra appropriation.
