GENERAL NEWS.

During 1903, 50,000,000 feet of American lumber were imported into Canada, and during 1904 140,000,000 feet, and now the Canadian Lumbermen's association clamors for an import duty.

The last Argentine rebellion was a complete failure. The only item of unusual interest relating to it was the sucking of a bank at Mendoza and theft of its available funds, amounting to \$300,000.

The president has signed the bill authorizing railway construction in the Philippines, and conferring on the Philippine government the authority to guarantee bonds to the extent of 4 per cent of \$20,000,000.

Gordon Paddock, the American consul general at Seoul, Korea, affirms that American interests in Korea are greater than any European country, and only equalled by the Japanese, who are very far in the lead.

Dr. L. L. Seaman, testifying before the house committee on military affairs, said: "One per cent of sickness is fatal in the Japanese army; 70 per cent of sickness in the American army during the Spanish war was fatal."

F. A. Falkenberg, of the National Fraternities organization, and head of the Woodmen of the World, is dangerously ill at Los Angeles. It is not believed that he can possibly recover. He is being kept alive by stimulants.

The 16th ballot in the Missouri legislature for United States senator resulted: Neidringhaus, 50; Cockrell, 33; Kereus, 11; Pettijohn, 2; Plunkelberger, 1; Gardner, 1. There were 25 pairs. No prospect for an election can now be seen.

Murder was not punishable with death in Colorado until 1871. From 1871 until 1887 capital punishment prevailed. It was then abolished for two years, but re-enacted in 1899. The law passed six years ago has been in the courts (its operation suspended) until the supreme court sustained it February 6.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Ten maques have been rounded up by the Lewiston police and made to leave town.

The new Elks' building at Portland is expected to be ready for occupancy August 1 next. It is five stories high, cost \$100,000, and stands at the corner of Seventh and Stark.

There seems to be no doubt about Representative Jones' bill creating two United States judicial districts in the state of Washington becoming a law, and going into effect July 1, 1905.

Mrs. Marie E. Saylor, of Portland, disappeared at Skamokawa, Wash., New Year's eve. Her body was found February 6, lodged under a snag, in 20 feet of water. Her drowning was undoubtedly accidental.

W. L. Hays, a rancher living near Everett, Wash., was drying out powder and dynamite when an explosion occurred, by which Hays lost a foot and sustained a fracture of an ankle and compound fracture of a leg.

With \$4,000,000 capital and the progressive spirit of J. A. Moore behind it, a movement is now on foot for the construction of a street railway system to enter into competition with the Seattle Electric company.

As the result of a supreme court decision, the Great Northern has just paid its back taxes for 1903 and 1904 into the treasury of Kootenai county, Washington. The total was \$78,840, of which \$10,314 was penalty and interest.

GOVERNMENT AID

GEOLOGICAL SURVEY WILL ASSIST THE STATE.

If the State adopts the Cole Irrigation Law the Government Will Join in Topographic and Hydrographic Work, With the State Expending an Equal Amount with the Government—Streams and Surfaces Would Be Measured and Reclamation Work Facilitated.

That the government is willing to help place Oregon on a practical basis for modern irrigation is proved by the fact that the reclamation service will expend an equal amount with the state, each year in topographic and hydrographic work, measuring streams and surfaces, with a view of determining the water supply, reservoir possibilities and other practical features.

John T. Whistler, engineer in charge of the reclamation service in Oregon, has received the following message from the headquarters of the department at Washington:

"Washington, D. C., Feb. 5, 1905.

"John T. Whistler,

"Pendleton, Oregon:

"The geological survey will expend annually in Oregon, the sum of \$15,000 for topography, \$15,000 for hydrography, or any less amount provided the state of Oregon will expend an equal amount on the same work.

(Signed.) "WALCOTT, Director."

This means that, provided the legislature passes the Cole irrigation bill, which provides for the measurement of streams, that the government will heartily join in the work of measuring streams, making topographic surveys, and conducting an active campaign to determine the feasibility of irrigation plans in different parts of the state, and to place the state in a position to be reclaimed with the greatest possible rapidity and with the least possible water. This is an additional inducement to pass the Cole irrigation bill.

CLASSMATE OF VAN NUYS.

Japanese Graduate of Wabash College a Censor Before Port Arthur.

Rev. W. L. Van Nuy, pastor of the Presbyterian church in this city, has received the information that a former classmate in Wabash College, Miki Harasawa, a Japanese, who graduated from that institution, has been a press censor before Port Arthur, during the siege, and is now at the front, with the army in Manchuria.

Harasawa was an intelligent Japanese and made rapid progress in his studies, and on his return to Japan, entered the service of his country as censor.

In the meantime he wed the only daughter of a wealthy Japanese merchant, and according to the custom of the country, Harasawa took the name of his wife, his full name now being Miki Harasawa Yamaguchi, the latter being his wife's name. It is custom in Japan, that where the bride is the only daughter of a family, the groom must take her name. Where there is more than one girl in a family, the bride takes the name of her husband.

NEW EVANGELICAL MEETINGS.

Commence February 15 at the Presbyterian Church.

Dr. W. S. Holt, state missionary for the Presbyterian church in Oregon, has arrived for the purpose of completing arrangements for the evangelical meetings which are to commence on February 15. The meetings are to be conducted by Rev. Thomas Needham, who at present is holding evangelical meetings at La Grande. Rev. Needham is assisted in his work by Clifton Powers, tenor singer of New York, who has charge of the musical part of the meetings.

Mr. Needham is one of the evangelists under the direction of the Presbyterian church, and works along the lines that have accomplished such wonderful results in Denver and Southern cities this year. He was one of the evangelists in the Pittsburgh campaign last year in which 6000 people were added to the members of the churches of that city.

Cattle Company Organized.

The Sunny Slope Cattle & Land company, Limited, with headquarters in Boise, has been incorporated to carry on business of raising livestock in Boise county and elsewhere.

The company is incorporated for \$50,000, divided into 500 shares of the par value of \$100 each, of which \$25,000 has been subscribed by the directors of the corporation for the first year as follows:
