### M'GUE WILL HANG

PROMINENT VIRGINIAN  
WHO MURDERED HIS WIFE.

The Woman's Jealousy at the Bottom of the Quarrel, Which Resulted in Her Being Shot—Defendant Was a Lawyer and for Years Had Practiced in the Court Where He Was Convicted.

Staunton, Va., Feb. 9.—Everything is in readiness for the execution here tomorrow of J. Samuel McCue, former mayor of Charlottesville, convicted of the murder of his wife. Owing to the prominence of the condemned man, and the general attention attracted to his case, there is a great demand for tickets to witness the hanging.

The crime for which the ex-mayor is to pay the death penalty occurred on the night of September 4 of last year. Mr. and Mrs. McCue had gone to church, returning home about 9 o'clock in the evening. Shortly afterward Mrs. McCue's dead body, clad in a night robe, was found in a bath tub filled with water. Mr. McCue told those who came in that someone had entered the house upon their return from church; that he had been knocked senseless and his wife probably killed. An investigation led to the arrest on the charge of murder of the man who only four days before had retired from the mayoralty of Charlottesville.

Mrs. McCue had received the contents of a shotgun in her breast, a sufficient wound to cause instant death, but in addition she had been struck a heavy blow on the head, cutting an ear nearly in two.

McCue at first laid the crime to a stable boy, and offered \$1000 reward for evidence to convict the murderer. The day after he offered the reward he was himself arrested for the crime. At the trial which followed several witnesses testified that the married life of Mr. and Mrs. McCue had been marred by jealousy on the part of the wife and that they were continually quarreling. One sad feature of the trial was the fact that McCue had for years been a lawyer at the bar before which he was tried and convicted, and had been on friendly terms with most of those identified with the trial.

IOWA RETAIL HARDWARE MEN.

Luthé, Des Moines; "Mutual Insurance," C. F. Carroll, state auditor of Iowa; "Mutual Hardware Insurance," C. F. Lanier, president Minnesota Mutual Hardware Insurance association. At the conclusion of the program of papers and reports the association listened to an interesting address delivered by Secretary M. L. Corey, of the National Retail Hardware Dealers' association.

#### TO DISCUSS PRIMARY REFORM.

Michiganers Maintain a State Political Science Society.

Ann Arbor, Mich., Feb. 9.—Primary reform is the principal topic of discussion before the annual meeting begun here by the Michigan Political Science association. At the opening session this afternoon H. A. Bull of Buffalo, N. Y., told of the workings of the New York primary law; C. E. Merriam of the University of Chicago, explained the Chicago primary system, and Prof. A. H. Tuttle of Ohio State university, spoke on the subject of the Bronson primary law in Ohio.

This evening the program will comprise the following papers: "Direct Nominations in Michigan," Roger W. Butterfield of Grand Rapids, and Sheridan J. Colby of Detroit; "Forty Years of Direct Primaries," E. L. Hempstead, Meadville, Pa.

#### BOOK BLESSED BY THE POPE.

Is a Manual of Instruction in Catholic Music.

New York, Feb. 9.—A letter from the papal delegate at Washington, Archbishop Falconio, has been received by Joseph F. Wagner, of this city, informing him that the holy father sends him the apostolic blessing for his efforts in the cause of plain chant.

Mr. Wagner published recently a complete and practical book of instruction in plain chant, a copy of which was brought to the attention of the holy father, who through the papal secretary of state, directed Archbishop Falconio to tell the publisher, "that the holy father accepted with pleasure this work on Sacred Music, the genuine culture of which he has so much at heart," and that as a sign of his appreciation he sends to Mr. Wagner the apostolic blessing.
