## GEOLOGICAL SURVEY MAKES A REPORT

The topographic maps of the United States geological survey have gained wide popularity in the last nine years. Whereas only \$6,974 maps were distributed in 1895, there were 501,775 maps sent out in 1904. These were distributed as follows: Through retail sale, 47,906; through wholesale sale, 292,653; to libraries and institutions, 75,112; for official use, 57,117.

Although the retail price of each map is only five cents and the wholesale price but two cents, the considerable sum of \$5,974.36 was received for maps. This merely defrays the cost of the press work and does not pay for the paper on which the maps are printed or for the expense of distributing them.

The total amount received for publications of all kinds in 1904 was \$12,222.21 as compared with \$2,150.65 in 1895, notwithstanding the fact that many publications that were sold in 1895 are now distributed free.

It is only since the passage of an act of congress on February 18, 1897, that the maps have been disposed of by sale. They are sold at the rate of five cents a sheet of standard size.

When 100 or more standard topographic atlas sheets, or their equivalent in value in other maps, are ordered, a discount of 50 per cent will be made from the retail price; that is, 100 standard topographic atlas sheets will cost \$2. The order may be given for that many copies of one sheet only, or for that many different sheets, and unless otherwise stated, this discount will also apply to special, general and combined maps, which may be included in the order; or the larger maps only may be ordered; but in no case can orders be filled at the wholesale rate unless the sum remitted solely for topographic maps amounts to at least \$2. Prepayment is required and may be made by money order payable to the

order of the director of the United States geological survey, or in cash—the exact amount. Checks, foreign coin, and postage stamps cannot be accepted.

Ever since its organization in 1879, the United States geological survey has been engaged in making a topographic survey and map of the United States. The unit of survey is a quadrangle 15 seconds, 30 seconds, or 1 degree in extent each way, covering an area of one-sixteenth, one-fourth, or one "square degree."

The unit of publication is an atlas sheet 16 1-2 by 20 inches, and each sheet is a topographic map of one of the above areas. The scale of the full degree sheet is 1:250,000, that of the 30 second sheet is 1:250,000, and that of the 15 second sheet is 1:625,000. A sheet is designated by the name of some well known place or feature appearing on it, and the names of adjoining published sheets are printed on the margins.

The maps are engraved on copper and printed from stone, in three colors. The cultural features, such as roads, railroads, cities, towns, etc., as well as all lettering, are in black, all water features are printed in blue; while the hill features are shown by brown contour lines.

The contour interval varies with the scale of the map and the relief of the country. Maps of limited areas economically important are sometimes published which are not in conformity with the general scheme outlined above; these are called special maps.

Persons who wish to know what portions of certain districts have been mapped should ask for an index circular of the region in which they are interested. It will be furnished them, free of charge, on request. All correspondence should be addressed to The Director, United States Geological Survey, Washington, D. C.
