THIRTEEN FAILED TO PASS. Names and Grades of the Successful Applicants.

Consternation is in store for the teachers who recently took the county examination here. The examination was an unusually hard one for them, and the completion of the examining board's work shows that nearly 50 per cent of those who took the examination have failed to pass.

One of the worst features of the whole affair is the fact that there is no redress for the rejected teachers, for they cannot be given permits to teach by the county superintendent. There is no show for any of them to secure schools any place in the state until after next August, when they may be re-examined.

Considerable hardship will also be worked upon the districts which will be deprived of their teachers by their failure to pass. While teachers may always be found to accept positions, it is often very hard to secure competent ones at this time of the year.

At 3:30 this afternoon the examining board finished its work and the following were found to have passed:

For first grade certificates—F. Grace Edwards, Mrs. Henrietta Reames, Kyle McDaniel, S. E. Darr and Harry Huber.

For second grade certificates—May Walker, Jennie Gaines, Ethel J. Galbraith, T. L. Childers, Juanita Engdahl, P. S. Rogers, E. L. Goodwin, Katherine Sharp, Grace Ray and Thomas W. Tandy.

For third grade certificates—J. B. Walden and G. Arthur Dillon.

The remaining 13 out of the 30 who took the examination, failed.

Of the first grade teachers, F. Grace Edwards passed the highest, with a grade of 93 and 5-16, while Mrs. Henrietta Reames was second, with a grade of 93 1/2.

F. A. Falkenburg, head consul of the Woodmen of the World, died this morning at Los Angeles after a lingering illness. He has been in Los Angeles for several weeks for the benefit of his health, but could not secure relief.

His home was in Denver, Col., where he was a most highly respected citizen. As an executive officer of the Woodmen of the World, he was one of the most aggressive and successful men ever holding a similar position. Under his management the order sprang from a small and weak body of men, to become of the world, with insurance orders in the world, with a most highly satisfactory financial condition, and an influence in the world of fraternity that is far-reaching.

The funeral will occur next Monday at Denver. The remains, accompanied by Mrs. Falkenburg and daughter, and also by representatives of both the Woodmen of the World and the Women of Woodcraft, leave Los Angeles in the morning for Denver.
