GENERAL NEWS.

The home of Manning Harris, a coal miner, burned at Edwards, Ill. Three children were burned to death and both parents badly burned.

Under the auspices of the colored republicans' club of New York City, an attempt is soon to be made to organize a colored men's national party.

New York City is showing all the preliminary symptoms of a tremendous political and moral upheaval—a reaction from the positive epidemic of crime—petty and great.

William R. Harper, president of Chicago University, is afflicted with a cancer and must undergo an operation. He is firmly convinced that he will die on the operating table.

The dowager empress of China has presented a life-size and magnificent portrait of herself to the American government through President Roosevelt. It will be hung in the National Museum.

C. H. Schindeldecker, a St. Paul, Minn., butcher, was cut in pieces with a cleaver in a back room of his shop, by unknown parties. Revenge is supposed to have been the motive, as there was no robbery.

At Huntington, W. Va., Rev. Washington Hagar, a Baptist preacher, was arrested in the pulpit, charged with passing \$2 bills that had been raised to \$10. He was conducting a revival when arrested.

When the official announcement is made that Adams is entitled to the governorship of Colorado, it is expected that 15,000 members of labor unions will greet him at the capitol building. It is proposed to assemble that number and march them through the building from one side to the other.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

A proposition to issue \$100,000 bonds for a high school in East Portland carried by a vote of 256 to 66.

Senator Foster is using his utmost endeavors to get an appropriation of \$300,000 each for the new federal buildings at Spokane and Tacoma.

In the Seattle courts Ed Goodrich was convicted of manslaughter for killing James Jones December 2. Jones was stabbed, and lived 12 days.

At Hillsboro, Paul Guertling, has been sentenced to the penitentiary for seven years for burglary. He robbed a store during January last. He is 19 years of age.

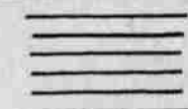
For the first time in 15 years the saloons and hotel bars in Vancouver, B. C., are open and doing business on Sundays—allowed to do so by a decision on a technicality.

Mrs. Ballington Booth, daughter-in-law of General William Booth, and one of the founders of the Voluntary Workers of America, will be in Portland and lecture twice on February 24.

The total tax collected on the 1904 tax roll to and including February 17, was \$191,254.36, which is about \$100,000 more than was taken in at this same date one year ago, in Multnomah county.

SUGAR BEETS IN
CROOK COUNTY

NEW DISTRICT IS HIGHLY
ADAPTED TO THE PRODUCT.

Colony of Mormons Now Prospecting for a Location—May Locate in Crook County and Engage in Beet Raising—Soil and Climate Highly Adapted.

The Bend country has a right to feel good over the prospect of the location of a colony of Utah sugar beet experts upon the irrigated lands in that district. Eight representatives of the proposed colony have been at Bend during the past week, and they express satisfaction with the conditions as to soil and climate.

P. C. Evans, a member of the party who was in Pendleton yesterday, said in regard to the sugar beet prospects: "The soil is right and the climate favorable to the production of sugar beets on the wide plain east of Bend, and I have no doubt the country in other directions is also suited to it."

"Eighteen inches depth of soil is ample for irrigated beet culture. Beets will stand more cold weather and more drouth than other ordinary farm crops. Beet sugar is more cheaply produced than cane sugar and it is a richer sugar, notwithstanding the popular prejudice and the market to the contrary. The tests at the Chicago and the St. Louis exhibitions showed its superior richness."

"The beet sugar industry will work closely all the resources of a country—will make full use of the soil, make business for merchants and mechanics and all activities of community life. The refuse pulp from the mill is a most valuable fattener of livestock, particularly the old animals with defective teeth."

"I am greatly pleased with the outlook here and expect to see a large beet sugar industry soon established."

LITTLE INJURED BY FREEZE.

Tests Indicate That the Fall Sown Wheat Is All Right.

Numerous tests have been made by farmers living on the high lands northwest of this place, to ascertain if fall grain has been injured by the recent cold weather. One of those who have thus experimented is J. H. Huddeman, who farms extensively near Warren Station. Samples of fall sown grain were taken by Mr. Huddeman and thawed out to find out if the grain would continue to grow after thawing. It was found that it would.

Other farmers in that section have also done the same, with the same result, and in consequence it would seem that no bad result is to be anticipated from the cold spell. However, it will require a few weeks of mild weather to bring the grain out, before it can be definitely known how much reseeding will be necessary.

Soot as a Disinfectant.

Of the many cheap and simple disinfectants proposed for the use of the people one of the most effective is common soot. Soot is composed of pure carbon and is formed by the hot vapor of the hydrocarbon coming from burning fuel striking the cold walls of the chimney or stovepipe and condensing thereon. It is a very light, porous and impalpable powder and, like charcoal, which is the same element in a different form, possesses the property of absorbing and retaining a wonderful amount of gas. The great danger of disease about sewers, drains and other places is almost entirely due to gas given off by decomposing matter. If soot be sprinkled about these places it will absorb the foul gas.—London Mail.

Too Much Imagination.

The man who wears a rubber on the pedal attachment to his cork leg because the cork foot aches without the rubber is as unfortunate a victim as the Scotchman who fainted on account of the heat in church the first Sunday after stoves were set up, although a fire had not been lighted in any of them.

Dutch Cure For Lazy People.

The Hollanders are not fond of lazy people, and they have a very good way of curing persons who can but won't work. If a pauper who is able to work refuses to do so they put him in a cistern, to which a pump is attached, and turn on a stream of water. The stream flows into the cistern just slow enough to enable the lazy person by lively pumping to keep the water from getting up over his head.

SAVED LOCAL OPTION

JAYNE BILL DEFEATED IN
SENATE BY A SCRATCH.

Salem Journal Gives a Graphic Account of the Last Battle Over Prohibition—Pierce Led the Fight Against the Bill—Malarkey Championed the Measure—Kuykendall and Bowerman Changed Their Vote on Final Ballot, Thus Defeating It.

The Salem Journal, a staunch friend of the saloon men and consequently an advocate of the Jayne bill, amending the local option law, gives the following graphic account of the defeat of the Jayne bill in the senate on Friday afternoon. The Journal says:

The time of the senate was taken during the last two days in discussion of the Jayne bill to amend the local option law.

The senate committee on education, Haines, Loughary and Pierce, reported a substitute that left the original bill as it passed the house in unrecognizable form. It was the local option bill amended by its original friends.

On motion of Pierce the report on the substitute was adopted. Malarkey ably answered Pierce, who defended the education committee substitute. Malarkey then moved that the Jayne bill and substitute with amendment offered by Senator Coe be referred to the committee on judiciary. The judiciary committee worked nearly all night on a new bill, that was practically the Jayne bill with amendments to remove objections.

At 10:30 the bill was reported back by the committee on judiciary, and the second day's debate began by Malarkey. On reference to judiciary committee the Marion county senators voted against the report of the committee on education. At 11:15 the amendments of the judiciary committee were adopted, 15 to 14. Booth spoke and moved indefinite postponement. Bowerman and Kuykendall changed their vote and it was 16 to 13.

The ayes on killing the Jayne bill were: Booth, Bowerman, Carter, Co-show, Haines, Howe, Laycock, Loughary, McDonald, Miller, Nottingham, Pierce, Smith, Wheldon, Wright, Kuykendall, 16.

Noes: Avery, Brownell, Coe, Coke, Croisan, Farrar, Hobson, Hodson, Holman, Malarkey, Rand, Siebel, Tuttle, 13.

On the final vote Bowerman and Kuykendall changed on the ground that there were not enough votes to pass the Jayne bill as amended.

The most far-reaching political combination was made to defeat the Jayne bill. It was managed by the democrats in the senate with great skill. They had the aid of McAllister, the Ohio champion of the Anti-Saloon League, the prohibitionists and M. U'Ren, the author of the initiative and referendum.

All votes for the Jayne bill were republican.
