GENERAL NEWS.

Mexican soldiers had a two-day battle with Yaqui Indians, killing 40 and taking 137 prisoners.

The city of Philadelphia has elected a republican mayor by 155,860 plurality, and elected 19 of the 15 councilmen.

Martin Sitera, aged 14, an A. D. T. messenger at Omaha, speaks well and understands perfectly, English, Bohemian, French, German and Spanish.

Michael Glynn, weighing 599 pounds, fell dead on a New York street and all traffic was blocked until an ambulance with six men reached the scene.

The Indiana house of representatives has passed the Davis anti-pass bill, which prohibits the issuance of railway passes to any citizen of the state, by a vote of 35 to 9.

Colonel C. S. Arnold, of Atlanta, Ga., a veteran of the civil war and one of the best known insurance magnates of the South, committed suicide by blowing his brains out with a pistol.

At Buffalo, N. Y., live Patrick Moynihan and wife, aged respectively 97 and 89 years. They have been married 65 years, have nine living children and 86 grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Will Avis, a farmer, was shot and killed by his 16-year-old step-son at his home at Wickliffe, near Cleveland, O. Avis and the boy's mother had been quarreling and the boy took his mother's part.

Senator Caldwell, of the West Virginia legislature, says he will prove to an investigating committee certain charges he makes against Governor White, of that state, or he will move his own expulsion from the state senate.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Along the St. Joe river, Idaho, 10,000,000 feet of logs were cut this winter.

J. M. Hitt, superintendent of the Port Townsend schools, has been appointed state librarian of Washington.

The clergy of Spokane are laying plans for the establishment of a summer Chautauqua on the shores of Lake Coeur d'Alene.

J. L. Dewey shot and killed himself at Glendale, Or. He was despondent from losing his property and meeting with an accident by which he lost an eye and a leg.

The Washington legislature is entering upon a big fight over a local option bill, introduced by Representative Lee Johnson, of Yakima. It is a close copy of the Oregon law.

J. R. Clinton and W. W. Whipple, of Seattle, ask franchises of Astoria to enable them to operate an all-round electrical and gas business. They promise to put in a \$700,000 plant.

The following are the newly-elected officers of the Multnomah club at Portland: W. H. Chapin, president; T. M. Dunne, vice president; W. A. Robb, secretary; A. O. Jones, treasurer.

Gus Klopff, one of the best-known minor league ball players in the United States, has been appointed an umpire in the Pacific Coast League. Klopff has been playing professional baseball since 1888.

HARBOR TOO SMALL

BIG LINERS CANNOT LAND IN SEATTLE.

Startling Story Sent Out From Seattle Concerning Hill's Monster Vessels—While the "Minnesota" Was Loading Her Bottom Rested in the Mud of the Harbor—Officers and Sailors Secretly Quit for Fear of an Accident to Her.

A special from Seattle to the San Francisco Examiner says:

Now that Seattle has succeeded in getting James J. Hill to tie his big Oriental liners in its harbor, the Sound city finds that it has an elephant on its hands. Seattle's harbor is too shallow, even with much dredging, to allow the Minnesota to dock at low tide.

At Smith's cove, where Hill has built his big docks and warehouses, at the northern end of Seattle harbor, dredges have reached solid rock and can go no further. The Great Northern engineers have discovered this fact, much to their chagrin, now that it is too late.

When the Minnesota was loading at the dock before it left for the Orient at low tide it rested on the bottom. Because of this it now develops that the big freighter left Seattle for the trip across the Pacific in a badly strained condition. This fact accounts for the large number of officers and crew of the vessel that refused to make the trip on the new ship. These men did little talking when they quit their good positions, but now several of them have explained their fears. They say that when the Minnesota left Seattle all of its starboard pumps were working.

The seamen who quit their positions had no fear about the boat while on its outward voyage. It is on the return trip, when the mammoth freighter is light, that they fear that a serious accident might happen.

Since the fact that Seattle's harbor is dangerous for the docking of the two big liners that will ply to the Orient became known, it has developed that Hill's engineers are looking for another place on the Sound where deeper water may be had. Many places have been investigated, but only one is believed to meet with the approval of the engineers.

The place that has been measured, sounded and land adjacent surveyed, is Chukanut bay, about one mile north of Bellingham. Here is found a natural dry dock. All that is necessary for its completion so that it can hold the largest ships in the world is that gates be built across one end. The bay is a deep, long groove in the rock that extends into the land and is filled with water. The land around the bay is ideally situated for big warehouse and railroad terminals. The Great Northern has options on a large number of acres of land around the bay and its engineers are daily working in the vicinity.

Another thing that is believed helped to decide which place on the Sound would be selected for the new docks is that Chukanut bay is 100 miles nearer the ocean than Seattle, and, in fact, is the nearest point on the mainland that is at all suitable for the purpose.
