EDUCATORS GATHER AT MILWAUKEE, WISCONSIN.

Will Discuss Many Topics of Ab-Twenty Superintendents Present.

Milwaukee, Wis., Feb. 28.—The Davidson theater, spacious though it is, was scarcely able to accommodate the scores of men and women who filled it this morning at the opening of the annual meeting of the depart-ment of superintendents of the National Educational association. Occu-pying seats of honor upon the stage ere such leading lights of the educational world as President Eliot of Harvard university, United States Commissioner of Education W. T. Harris, Superintendent Albert G. Lane of Chicago, Miss Jane Addams of Hull House, and Professor George E. Vincent of the University of Chicago. More than 20 states, including several of those south of the Ohio river, were represented by their state superin tendents of public instruction. Of principals and city superintendents there were several hundred in attend-

The session was called to order shortly after 8 o'clock by President Edwin C. Cooley of Chicago. After several selections of music and the exchange of greetings and responses. the convention listened to a review of the educational features of the Louisiams Purchase exposition. This feat-ure of the program, which occupied the entire forenoon, comprised a sym-postum of addresses and papers presented by Howard J. Rogers, chief of rector of congresses of the late world's fair, and several of his associates.

Means of increasing the efficiency

of our public school work was the general topic at the afternoon session. Prominent among those who took part in the general discussion were District Superintendent Albert G. Lane of Chicago, Superintendent William I. Crane of Marshalltown, Iowa, and Superintendent Carroll G. Pearse

of Milwaukee. An interesting program has been arranged for the open meeting this evening. William T. Harris, United speak on the subject, "Some of the Conditions Which Cause Variation in the Bate of School Expenditure in Different Localities," and "Group Morality—Children," will be the subject of an address by Professor Gee. E. Vincent of the University of Chi-
