GENERAL NEWS.

Admiral Dewey is too ill at his Washington home to be able to take a trip to Florida for the betterment of his health.

At 104 West Sixty-first street, New York, Miss Eloise Lee, aged 20, by her individual heroism saved the lives of six small children at a fire.

Water for household purposes is being sold by the gallon in some neighborhoods in the Hawaiian Islands, being scarce on account of drought.

Superintendent Dunn, of the Illinois Central, estimates the loss to that company by the dock fire at New Orleans at \$3,000,000. General Freight Agent Perkins says it is \$6,000,000.

Neldringhaus, the republican caucus nominee for United States senator in Missouri, unable to be elected on the 33d ballot, has released his friends of all obligations to vote for him. He only stipulates that they may not vote for R. C. Kerens.

Mary Dreible, 2 years old, born of Chinese parents 1000 miles up the Yangtze river, has been denied a landing at San Francisco. She arrived as the adopted child of Miss Carrie Dreible, a missionary, who is on her way home to visit her dying father.

Joseph McGrath died recently in New York city, aged 108 years. He worked as a stone mason until 87 years of age, and could do enough work to earn his living, until 10 months ago. He worked from habit, not necessity. He leaves over 200 descendants, and was Irish born.

The bricklayers of New York city, 5000 in number, may strike for an increase of wages from 60 cents to 70 cents per hour. During the busy season they work 12 hours per day, and being paid double for overtime, makes it possible for a good man to earn \$67.20 a week. They claim this is not unreasonable, as they only work six months in the year, on an average.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The English market for Oregon hops is seriously jeopardized by the hops being exported dirty and carelessly packed.

William Elliott is dead at Park Place, Clackamas county, aged 90 years. He had lived in Clackamas county 59 years.

John Peturi, a young laborer, was run over by a train in the suburbs of Seattle and his leg smashed. He died soon after the limb was amputated.

It is conclusively settled that the British naval station of Esquimalt, B. C., will be permanently abandoned and dismantled. The last war vessel left there February 27 for the China station.

Northwestern bank clearings continue to show gains on last year. Last week Seattle scored a gain of 17.7 per cent, the amount being \$2,716,810. In Spokane the amount was \$2,153,700; in Tacoma, \$2,449,883.

The Montana house has passed the Loper initiative and referendum bill, which it is known will pass the senate. It requires eight per cent of the voters of two-fifths of the counties to initiate, and five per cent of the state.

The newly created office of state engineer pays \$200 per month and expenses. Applications for the position are said to be "pouring in." The office will be filled by appointment, upon recommendation of Charles D. Walcott, director of the United States geological survey, Washington, D. C.

STORY OF CALLJU

BROKENHEARTED BOY DIED IN COUNTY HOSPITAL.

Had Written to His Parents for Help, But Their Answer Went Astray and He Died Thinking He Was Cast Off—Parents Did Not Know of His Critical Illness and Sent Him a Ticket Which Never Reached Him.

The most pitiable story that has come to light in Pendleton for many a day is developing out of the death of Charles Callju, a Swedish boy in the county hospital, several weeks ago.

The boy came to Pendleton in ill health in December, and as he was sick could not work to sustain himself, he sold his overcoat to buy meals with the proceeds of the sale, and then sought refuge in the saloons around town as the only place open where he could find a warm fire and a place to rest.

He was only 16 years of age and had been in poor health in Chicago, and his parents being poor and unable to send him to a climate suited to his weak lungs, he bravely started West on his own account, to make a living and improve his health.

When he finally was forced to ask the county for aid he burst into tears while being questioned by Judge Bean before he was allowed to go to the county hospital. Just before going to the county hospital, he wrote a letter home on the letter heads of the Red Front saloon, and his parents, thinking he would be found there, immediately sent him \$5 to tide him over until he was able to travel when they would send him a ticket and clothing. Before the answer came back from his parents he was sent to the hospital and failed to call at the saloon for his mail, thinking, of course, his parents would address him at the general delivery of the postoffice.

A letter came containing \$5, but as it was sent to the Red Front saloon he did not get it. In the meantime he was lying sick in the county hospital, wondering and wearing away his heart, because his parents did not write. They, in the meantime, were also heartbroken to think that he did not answer their letter and they immediately sent him clothing, money and a ticket home, but he died before finding that they had answered his letter. Their letters had gone to the Red Front saloon and the boy never knew what had become of the boy, so he died in the poor house, with his money and warm clothing lying in Pendleton awaiting his call. He also died thinking that his parents had forgotten him or had cast him off.

Ensign Helsing, of the Salvation Army, has just received a letter from the parents, in which they say the son wrote cheering letters to them about his health, even when he was slowly dying from exposure to the cold weather here, without sufficient clothing to keep him warm and no place to sleep.

He finally told them of selling his coat, and said he could not return to Chicago until May or June, as the weather was too cold for him to start with no overcoat. The parents ordered him a Christian burial here, and M. A. Rader buried the remains in Olney cemetery, the parents paying the funeral expenses.

Big Advance in Leather.

Philadelphia, Pa., March 1.—The Morocco Manufacturers' National association, representing 75 per cent of the producers of upper leather in the world, today put into effect a flat advance of 10 per cent in the prices of their product. As reasons for the increase the manufacturers cite the failure to reduce the tariff on hides, the constant increase in cost of raw material, and high wages. The advance will mean an increase in receipts of about \$3,000,000.
