GENERAL NEWS.

Nearly 7000 different books were published in the United States during 1904.

Sullivan, Drew & Co., wholesale milliners of New York city, have failed. Liabilities, \$441,000; assets, \$349,000.

Few people know that the lives of all great race horses are insured. On Sysonby \$100,000 is carried, and on Delit, \$50,000.

At Des Moines, Iowa, Charles Thomas was convicted of murder, being charged with poisoning Mabel Schofield in 1899.

The navy in the four years of civil war cost \$313,000,000, according to Mr. Gorman. The last four years of peace it has cost \$314,000,000.

A snow-shoveling trust exists in New York city, according to the World, which alleges that it cleared \$725 a day moving the snow that fell during January and February.

Fire caused a damage of \$10,000 to a private dormitory at Yale University, and another \$10,000 damage to the adjacent Sheffield Science Institute. It is believed the fire started from a cigarette stub.

ENFORCE THE LAWS

TREE QUARANTINE AND DESTRUCTION IN SIGHT.

Recent Enactment Provides for a Deputy Tree Inspector in Each County—Expected That Donald McRea Will Be Appointed in Umatilla.

From this year on, the laws in regard to the care of orchards and the quarantine of infected trees are to be more strictly enforced, according to Judd Geer, fruit commissioner for the fifth district of this state, who was in the city from Saturday night until Sunday night. Mr. Geer, who is a brother of ex-Governor T. T. Geer, is the fruit commissioner for the counties of Union, Walla, Umatilla, Baker, Grant, Harney and Malheur. During the past year he had the supervision of all the above counties alone, and found it impossible to do justice to so large a territory. This year a law was passed allowing a deputy commissioner for each county, the same to be recommended by the fruitraisers of the county, approved by the district commissioner and appointed by the county court.

Commissioner Geer came here Saturday from a visit to the Milton section, where he had gone for the purpose of conferring with the fruit men of that section in regard to the deputy for this county. One from that section will be recommended for appointment and in Mr. Geer's opinion it will be Ronald McRea. The appointment will be made at the July term of the county court, it being necessary to wait 90 days from the adjournment of the legislature before the act can go into force.

The duties of the deputy commissioner will be to inspect all orchards and trees of the county, to enforce the quarantine rules, and to compel orchardists to properly spray all infected trees. By having a commissioner for each county it will be possible for him to give his personal attention to the work, and it is believed the new law will result in great benefit to the fruitgrowing industry.

According to Mr. Geer more trouble is had from "door yard" trees than from any other source. Parties who are making a business of raising fruit and have their capital invested in orchards are willing to spray and to otherwise care for their trees, for in that way only can they succeed in the business. But people who have a few trees in yards, largely for ornamental purposes, are unwilling to care for them, and it is through these yard trees that much of the orchardist's trouble comes. In the future those who have yard trees will be required to care for them the same as do orchardists, and badly infected trees will be destroyed.
