GENERAL NEWS.

James S. Graham, a Roseland, B. C. barkeeper, cut his throat with a razor, dying immediately. He was temporarily demented as an effect of grip.

The largest white sapphire ever discovered was found recently in Brazil. It weighs 1250 carats and is valued at 200,000 crowns—\$240,000 in Berlin.

It is believed that the president will appoint Charles W. Anderson, a colored lawyer of New York city, collector of internal revenue for the district of New York.

Francis T. Fox, a 12-year-old Chicago boy who is heir to \$50,000, was shot and killed. It was given out that he accidentally shot himself, but the police are investigating.

Cedric Ramsey, aged 12 years, fell off a harnessed horse, his foot catching in the harness. The horse ran away and dragged him to death. This was on a farm near Cheney, Wash.

According to the Northwestern Miller, Illinois, Indiana and Ohio produce \$9,000,000 bushels of wheat per year, which is over one-eighth of the entire crop of the United States.

David Flaherty, a well known mining man of Spokane, while walking on the cinder path reserved for the use of bicyclists, was run into in the dark by a bicyclist, and killed by sustaining a blow which brought on hemorrhage of the brain.

A Gladstone Dowle, son of Alexander Dowle, has selected, near the city of Mexico, a site for what may be called a branch Zion. Should Zion City, near Chicago, be abandoned, it is probable that the Mexico location will succeed to the former's prestige and most of its habitants.

The body of Charles Kimer, of Edwardsville, Pa., was found on the railroad track. It is presumed that he fell from a train. Kimer's father was burned to death nine months ago, his brothers, Morris and Alfred, were killed in the mines; another brother, Edward, had both legs crushed on the railroad; still another, Wesley, was crippled for life by an accident, and even Charles, who was killed, lost a leg in a railroad accident some time ago.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

A Chinese laundry at Arlington was raided by the police and found to be a cover for an opium joint. Three white men who were smoking opium, and the proprietor, were run in.

D. L. Bowen has sued Sheriff Shutt, of Morrow county, for \$10,000 for alleged false arrest and imprisonment, which took place January 5 last. Bowen was in custody two days.

Two men were killed and six persons injured by the collision of a freight and express train on the Northern Pacific at Bearmouth, Mont. The killed were W. F. Wilcox and J. L. Billham.

Dr. W. Van Osdel, pastor of the First Baptist church at Spokane, makes public the assertion that outside of the "red-light district" in that city there are between 900 and 1200 "mistresses."

At San Francisco Captain A. W. Hobtorn, of the schooner Fortuna, committed suicide in his cabin by shooting himself through the heart. Hobtorn had been despondent for some time. He was 42 years old.

The Seattle Times has been an organ of anti-republicanism ever since Colonel Alden J. Biethen bought it in 1896. Its issue of March 4 made a square flop into the republican party, without any change of ownership.

CIRCULAR ON IRRIGATION LAW

RECLAMATION DEPARTMENT HAS BEEN MISUNDERSTOOD.

Government Will Take Up Projects That Are Largely Owned by Private Parties if Owners Will Organize and Insure the Return of the Government's Money in the Required Time—Impossible Schemes Will Not Be Undertaken.

Owing to the public impression that has gone out to the effect that the reclamation department will not undertake government projects where the land is largely owned by private parties, the following timely circular on this subject has been issued by the department:

Washington, D. C., Feb. 27.—The relation between public and private enterprise has been the subject of some controversy since the passage of the reclamation act. It was assumed by many that the reclamation engineers would confine their operations to developments which offered no attractions to private enterprise, such as the construction of storage reservoirs on overappropriated streams, or the building of canals to divert the water from unused streams into rivers where scarcity existed.

In other words, that the reclamation service should be confined to operations which would tend to the general amelioration of conditions existing in the arid regions, without coming into commercial relations with the land or the people benefited by its action.

While this would be vastly more satisfactory to those charged with the execution of the reclamation act, it would not carry out the provisions of the law that the amounts expended should be repaid by the lands benefited. This provision of the reclamation act makes it the first duty of its executives to select for its operations feasible projects, in which the owners of the land can afford to repay to the reclamation fund the actual amounts expended in their reclamation.

The fact that the funds used under the reclamation act are relieved from interest charges makes many projects feasible which could not be profitably carried out by private enterprise, but this is more than offset by the perennial hopefulness of the private promoter. Every possibility of irrigation development in the arid region has been exploited at some time by somebody, and if it should be held that the reclamation service should not interfere with private enterprise, it must either cease its operations or confine them to projects so utterly chimerical that there would be no human possibility of the return of the money expended.

While it should be the policy of the service to co-operate with and assist all legitimate private irrigation development, it should not allow a false sense of fairness to deprive any community of the opportunity to effect its development along the broadest possible lines, and it would be anything but fair to such a community to decide that an attempt to irrigate its lands had created a mortgage upon them, and that they must be left to be exploited for private profit, regardless of the wishes of those most vitally interested.

It is the rule that wherever the reclamation service has started its investigations, it has found some part of its project overlapping lands which are being exploited by private enterprise. In such cases if there is a reasonable probability that the enterprise will be carried out, its lands should not be included, unless their exclusion would cripple the project, and in this case some equitable arrangement should be made with the interests involved.
