## WOMEN'S APPEAL

### CZARINA APPROACHED IN INTEREST OF PEACE

The Wives, Mothers and Sisters of Russia Beg for the Intercessory Influence of the Czar's Wife to Mitigate the Conditions Which Beset the Empire and Which Bear So Heavily Upon the Women and the Poor.

London, March 13.—A dispatch from St. Petersburg says that the czarina has been much affected by an appeal sent to her by the women of Moscow. The appeal, bearing thousands of signatures, read in part as follows:

"We Russian women, mothers, wives and sisters of the warriors who are shedding their blood in the Far East for the beloved fatherland, address ourselves to you, O sovereign, believing that, with your mother's heart, you feel all the horrors of war, as we do. You will understand that a woman ardently desires peace. Peace is being violated, not only beyond the frontiers of our country, but even in the heart of the fatherland.

"We see with terror in the recent troubles the beginning of the calamities that may crush all Russia if the emperor does not seek, in unity with his people, to avert them. All the bases of life are shaken, and all moral foundations are trembling. Mothers whose hearts are saddened and their tasks made impossible. It is beyond their power, beyond all possibility to train children up on bases of unshakable truth and love of duty when the social life of the country does not rest on these for its foundation. The youth of the country, on entering life, constantly meet contradictions to what was taught them in their families. They thus lose all faith in the principles taught them, seek new faiths and fall into extremes. Our best forces are perishing. Mothers' hearts are breaking. They cannot remain silent. They feel that many more lives will yet be sacrificed, for what is happening is not spasmodic, but the result of earlier calamities.

"The emperor can still save Russia by his puissant will. Be our pleader and pray the emperor that he may listen to the voice of the country and the cry of its mothers. If the emperor leads the country into the paths of greatness, its women will help in the work of its organization by guiding their brothers and children into the new way and a life of light."

### ADDRESS MOTHERS' CONGRESS.

#### Roosevelt Will Speak Upon the Divorce Issue.

Washington, D. C., March 12.—This was another busy and interesting day for the delegates to the National Congress of Mothers. The morning was occupied with the presentation of detailed reports from the twenty states represented in the congress. No regular session was held today, delegates preferring to devote the time to recreation and sightseeing. The banner feature of the entire program is scheduled for this evening, when the delegates will assemble to listen to an address by President Roosevelt.

The address will, it is said, be devoted to the subject of divorce and its evils, and it is safe to say that the president will handle the subject in his characteristically straightforward manner. A few weeks ago, when the Protestant Episcopal bishops met in Washington, President Roosevelt was urged to use his influence to discourage the ever-growing divorce canker, and promised that he would do everything in his power to aid the ministers in their crusade. It is believed that the speech tonight will be the direct fulfillment of this promise.

London, March 12.—According to Bologna advices, the banns for the marriage of Signor Marconi to Miss O'Brien were published on Sunday at the city hall. The wedding, the local papers state, is fixed for next Thursday, the religious ceremony to take place at the Roman Catholic church of St. George in this city.

Miss O'Brien, who met her future husband last year at Adare manor, Lord Dunraven's seat in County Limerick, will bring him a dowry representing an annual income of \$20,000. After the wedding husband and wife will leave for New York, where they will remain until the end of April. They will then go to Rome, where it is reported they will be the guests of King Victor Emmanuel for a few days.

## THE FIFTIETH ANNIVERSARY.

### General Passenger Agents of North America Meet.

Pittsburg, Pa., March 12.—On March 12, 1855, just fifty years ago, the American Association of General Passenger Agents was organized in Pittsburg. Representatives were present from the comparatively few lines then in existence. Today more than 100 passenger traffic managers, general passenger agents and commissioners of traffic association, representing among them all the prominent railroad systems of the United States, Canada and Mexico, assembled in this city to celebrate the semi-centennial of their association.

The members of the association assembled at the Hotel Schenley shortly before noon and spent the remainder of the day exchanging reminiscences of the early days of the association and also discussing various matters of live interest to those engaged in their branch of the railroad business. This evening there will be a banquet, for which elaborate preparations have been completed. Geo. H. Daniels of the Vanderbilt system, Colonel James L. Taylor, who for years represented the Pennsylvania system in London, and a number of other equally well known passenger agents will respond to toasts.

### Pioneer Mission Worker.

East Orange, N. J., March 12.—Rev. James C. Hepburn, probably the best known foreign missionary of the Presbyterian church, received a flood of congratulations today on the occasion of his ninetieth birthday. Dr. Hepburn has a record of over forty years devoted to spreading the gospel among the people of the Far East, and enjoys the additional distinction of having been the first Presbyterian missionary as well as the first medical missionary to go to Japan.

### A. F. of L. Meeting.

Washington, D. C., March 12.—The officers and members of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor assembled for their annual meeting today at the general headquarters in this city. The meeting, according to official announcement, will be devoted almost entirely to business of a routine character, no matters of unusual importance or of interest to the general public calling for attention at the present time.
