EXPECT TO PAY \$7,000 LATER

OPTION ON FAIR GROUNDS EXPIRED ON YESTERDAY.

By Agreement the Price of the Armstrong Site Will Not Be Advanced, and the Committee Will Have a Longer Time in Which to Raise Funds for Its Purchase—Will Secure the Entire Amount Before Any Payments Are Made.

Although the option on the Armstrong tract of land which has been held by the fair management expired yesterday, there is apparently little danger but that the land may still be purchased at the option price whenever the association is ready to complete the deal. This is the view of the matter taken by Frank Frazier, who has been devoting more time to the matter than any other member of the committee.

This morning the subject was discussed by Mr. Armstrong and the members of the committee, and while there is no longer any bargain between them, it is presumed that the track may still be had for \$7000 when the fair association gets in such shape that it can make the purchase. This idea is based largely on the fact that the land is more valuable for fair purposes than for any other.

The fair committee does not feel in a position to make the purchase of the land, or even to guarantee a purchase until the full amount needed for the association has been subscribed. For the last few days the soliciting work was abated until it was ascertained if an extension of the option could be secured. While this has not been definitely given, the committee feels sure enough of its position that it will again take up the subscription work and push it to completion. Most of the work from this time on will have to be in the outside parts of this county and in Morrow county, as the limit has been about reached for this place. A trifle over \$11,000 is now subscribed.
