GENERAL NEWS.

The government realized over \$400,000 from duties on goods imported to exhibit at the St. Louis exposition.

E. E. Snyder, an Olin, Iowa, banker who assigned some time ago, has disappeared leaving liabilities of \$145,000 and an unserved warrant.

A bill has passed the Nevada legislature (which Governor Sparks declares he will sign) lifting all legal restrictions off gambling in that state.

A seat on the New York Stock Exchange has been sold for \$82,500. This is the high record price. The name of the purchaser has not yet been disclosed.

Ten thousand converts have been made in Philadelphia to the Christian religion, during the revivals in progress in different parts of that city during the past two months.

The first serious accident in the New York subway was the running down of one train by another, resulting in a rear-end smash. Thirty persons were crippled and cut, but none killed.

President William Harper, of the University of Chicago, recently operated upon for the removal of an intestinal cancer, has so far recovered that he will soon start on a trip to Europe.

All official meat and milk inspection is off in Montana for two years, as by an oversight the legislature failed at its recent session to appropriate funds to carry out the inspection law.

Twelve thousand children attended a special service at London, England, March 11, conducted by Reuben A. Torrey and C. M. Alexander, the Chicago revivalists. Five hundred of the youngsters were converted before leaving the building.

Lieutenant General Von Boguslawsky, retired, of the German army, and recognized as a thoroughly competent and erudite military critic, since the battle of Mukden, pronounces Oyama as a man of genius—in the Caesar, Napoleon, Frederick the Great and Charles VII. class.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

R. L. David, accused of a \$1200 forgery in Spokane, a year ago, is under arrest and in jail at Baker City.

At Mayger, Or., Lou Metcalf, a saw-mill hand, had an arm and hand terribly lacerated by a circular saw.

J. M. Snow, of Spokane, has been appointed by Governor Mead to be state highway commissioner under the new law.

Billy Ford, a Hood River candy-maker, is missing, as is also \$50 cash from the till of T. H. Williams, a baker for whom he worked.

As a result of the February teachers' examination held throughout Oregon, 22 received life diplomas and 21 state certificates for a period.

The sum of \$3,055,547.39 represents the total amount appropriated for the ninth legislature out of the general fund of the state of Washington.

H. A. Carpenter, aged 55, an inmate of the soldiers' home at Orting, Wash., fell 30 feet off a bridge in a gulch, breaking his neck and killing him.

Huntington & Co., have begun sheep shearing near North Yakima. The quality of the wool is unusually good and the staple long. The firm will shear 50,000 animals this spring.

Arrangements are being made to connect Cheyenne and Denver and incidentally the cities of Utah, with California and Oregon by telephone. Nevada and Idaho will of course figure in the combination.

TO EXTEND PORTAGE

BETTER LANDING PLACE
IS BADLY NEEDED

Big Eddy, the Present Terminal of the Portage Is Not a Safe Landing Place in High Water—The Portage Grade May Yet Be Extended to the Dalles.

Inspection of the Portage railroad by the members of the State Portage commission, executive committee of the Open River Association and interested rivermen is said to be for the purpose of determining whether or not the road shall be completed as already planned or effort made to unite with the people of The Dalles in bringing the terminals to that place.

Secretary of State Dunbar and State Treasurer Moore are known to have been disposed to oppose the project for extending the road when the appropriation was first asked from the legislature, while Governor Chamberlain has favored the idea. Now it is believed to be the object to induce the legislature, should an extra session be called, to make the desired appropriation of \$30,000.

Captain E. W. Spencer, who has been ardently in favor of terminals at The Dalles as more desirable in every way than the incline at the Big Eddy, accompanied the party. Captain Spencer is much interested in securing traffic for his steamer and it is probable that he may become interested also in operating boats for the upper river.

"Citizens of The Dalles are anxious to have the road built to a connection with the Great Southern and thence into The Dalles," said a Portland man to the Portland Telegram, who has been closely associated with the development of the Portage railroad project. "As an inducement to do this the town is willing to expend \$10,000 in building public docks for terminal purposes of the road."

"A mile and a half of track would have to be built to connect with the Great Southern, and another mile at the lower end of the line, and the officers of that company have offered through President John Heinrich to leave the matter of traffic agreement terms and operation entirely with the Portage railroad commission."

Governor Chamberlain is anxious that the road be extended, because it is realized that the Big Eddy is not a desirable terminal for boats and probably could not be utilized during high water. Undoubtedly the legislature, if assembled in extra session, will be asked to make the necessary appropriation.

TO DAM WALLOWA LAKE.

Six Ditch Companies Combine to Secure More Waters.

A few days ago the directors of the six ditch companies interested held a joint meeting to discuss the advisability of damming Wallowa lake. The board of directors of each company elected one delegate to form a committee of six with power to construct said dam, says the Joseph Herald.

The expense of constructing and maintaining the dam will be shared by each company according to the proportion of the quantity of water appropriated to each ditch.

At present it is proposed to build a dam about four feet in height to hold and store the surplus water for future use during the summer; no prior rights will be recognized in the storage water but all the ditch companies share equally, in proportion to their respective interests, in the water benefits to accrue from said dam.

The committee having the construction of the dam in charge are as follows: L. Knapper, H. B. Davidhizer, J. M. Mitchell, George Mack, J. H. Dobbin and O. T. Front, respectively representing the following ditch companies: Silver Lake, Farmers, Citizens, Silver Lake, Farmers, Citizens, Dobbin.

It is understood that the committee will engage a competent engineer to draw up plans and specifications and superintend the construction of the dam. The scarcity of snow in the mountains this year compelled the different ditch companies to formulate the above plan which will be of inestimable value to the ranchers in the valley.
