CHILD LABOR LAW

OF LIMITED INTEREST
IN PENDLETON CIRCLES

Only the American District Telegraph Service Might Be Affected, and It Will Not Be, for Reasons Given—The Law as Shaped Up at Present Contains Interesting Provisions, and Should Be Noted by Everybody.

In view of the fact that the amendments to the child labor law will soon go into effect, when the 90 days are up, its possible effect in local circles is a matter of interest. Thus far the only place where the new law has attracted any attention is in the A. D. T. service, and in this connection the following from a letter received by Manager Hatt shows its application there:

"The laws of Oregon, as amended at the last session of the legislature, prohibit the employment in telegraph or public messenger service of minors under the age of 14. The employment of minors under the age of 16 years is prohibited between 6 p. m. and 7 a. m., and the hours of their employment is limited to 10 in one day, and to six days in a week. Such minors are also entitled to 20 minutes for meal time at noon, and such meal time is not to be included as part of the work hours of the day."

According to Manager Hatt his force is so made up that the new law will not work any appreciable change. This is due to the fact that the boys who work at night are over 16, and the work is so arranged that those on duty Sunday do not work all of the week days.

NEW PLAN TO AID VERY POOR.

Transporting Thousands of London's Unemployed.

London, March 16.—The first floating labor bureau ever established will be on the steamship Vancouver, scheduled to sail from Liverpool to Canada one month hence. The vessel has been chartered by General Booth of the Salvation Army. It will sail under the Army flag, and carry more than 1000 workless Londoners to places in which work is awaiting them. Members of the Salvation Army's Canadian contingent—labor experts fully qualified to advise British emigrants as to conditions of work and chances of remunerative employment—will be on board.

Every emigrant who wants work will enter his name at the offices of the floating labor bureau, and any who are not able to secure situations before landing will be taken under the Army's wing to the Toronto head-

quarters. The emigrants, it is expected, will be chiefly unemployed clerks, artisans, unskilled laborers and domestic servants. Fifty families will be conveyed free of charge at a cost of \$10,000, but the remainder of the emigrants will pay the ordinary passage money.

NEW PRESIDENT FOR TULANE.

Dr. Craighead at the Head of Southern University.

New Orleans, La., March 16.—The inauguration of Dr. E. B. Craighead as president of Tulane university in succession to Dr. Alderman was a great day for the institution. Many alumni and friends were present from all parts of the state, together with distinguished educators from many parts of the south.

In addition to the inaugural address of the new president, there were addresses of congratulation by the faculty and student body of the university and in behalf of the visiting educators. The theater was elaborately decorated with the colors of the university and a lavish use of potted plants and cut flowers. This evening a banquet is to be given by the alumni association. Governor Blanchard and many other men of note have accepted invitations to be present.

DEATH HOUSE AT SING SING.

\$40,000 Building in Which to Commit Legal Murder.

Ossining, N. Y., March 16.—Work was begun this week on the new \$40,000 death house at Sing Sing prison. The present death house, which accommodates only thirteen prisoners, will be torn down, and the new one will have 40 cells.

The building will be the finest of its kind in the country. It will be constructed of brick and stone and will have a glass-covered court and promenade, where condemned men may take exercise at the discretion of the warden. No changes in the methods or appliances will be made in the new chamber. Under the present system a murderer is pronounced dead in seventy seconds after he is led into the room, and in the opinion of the officials this arrangement is as expeditious as it is possible to make it. The last man to be put to death in the present chamber will be Martin Ebeit, a young man of Mount Vernon, who strangled his wife with a shoestring and hid her body in a sewer. He will die on April 10.

Woman's Home Mission Society.

Houston, Tex., March 16.—The Woman's Home Mission society of the Methodist church convened in annual meeting here today and will continue in session over tomorrow. The large and representative attendance, together with the interesting program of reports, papers and discussions, gives promise of one of the most interesting and profitable conventions ever held by the society.
