GENERAL NEWS.

The Connecticut state senate has killed a bill to establish the whipping post in that state for wife beaters.

The net earnings United States Steel corporation for the first three months of 1905 are over \$26,000,000. For the corresponding period of 1904 they were \$13,208,336.

Wireless telegrams from Great Britain to vessels at sea cost 15 cents a word, the minimum being \$1.60 for each message. The rate for 10 words and upward is less than for cablegrams.

During 1904 \$25,175 persons sailed for Europe from America, and American tourists in Europe are said to have spent \$131,516,200 on their tours, which amount includes ocean steamer fares.

James Hazen Hyde has relinquished his control of the Equitable Life, after a bitter fight made by stockholders who feared his foolish extravagances would sometime wreck the organization.

It is conceded that the most formidable and pressing issue confronting the British government at the present time is the Irish question, precipitated at this juncture by the threatened famine in the west of Ireland.

Near Huntington, W. Va., 23 men are cut off by fire from the exits of a coal mine, and 10 are reported dead, though little is known of the actual conditions in the mine in which the men are known to be entombed.

Emeralds are worth much more than diamonds of the same size, and their value has increased 130 per cent during the past five years. Colombia, South America, furnishes a large majority of the emeralds mined. Most of the remainder come from India.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Barnes, Warden & Co., of Portland, have the contract for wiring the government building at the Lewis and Clark fair, for \$7633.

Carroll B. Graves, late of Ellensburg, now of Seattle, is expected to succeed James F. McElroy, as general Western attorney for the Northern Pacific railway.

The work of grading the first 22 miles of the Spokane & Inland railway (electric) has been let to Porter Bros., of Spokane, to be completed within three months.

Steel rails, piles, lumber and rock to the value of \$36,000, have just been contracted for at Portland, the same to be used in the jettying the mouth of the Columbia.

The Grand Trunk railway sought a land grant of 15,000 acres to the mile from the coast eastward through British Columbia, and that government flatly refuses to grant the subsidy.

Alexander Glenn, one of the best known and most accomplished bandmasters in the Northwest, is dead at Astoria, of pneumonia. He leaves a wife and 12-year-old daughter.

Up to the close of business March 15, \$1,735,744 of the last tax assessment had been collected in Multnomah county after the rebate had been subtracted. The elections exceeded expectations.

At Butte, Mont., Paddy Rogers shot and killed George Burke in a saloon. Rogers ordered George Reynolds to get down and pray at the muzzle of two revolvers. Reynolds had rheumatism in his knees so bad he could not kneel. Burke interfered in his behalf and was instantly shot dead. Rogers escaped.

AFTER MANY YEARS

VETERANS OF THE CIVIL WAR MEET IN PORTLAND

One a Citizen of Umatilla County for the Past 21 Years, the Other of Portland for Many Years—They Soldiered Together in the Eleventh Michigan Cavalry for Four Years.

A. S. Quant, postmaster at Alba, Ore., returned yesterday from Portland and left this morning for home. Mr. Quant has been in Camas Prairie for the past 21 years and knows practically every one in the southern end of the county. While in Portland Mr. Quant ran across an old comrade-at-arms. The story of their meeting is told by the Oregon Daily Journal as follows:

"A strange and pathetic scene was witnessed at the Union depot early yesterday morning as the passengers were alighting from the Spokane train. The principals were two aged veterans of the Civil war, who laughed with tears of joy streaming from their eyes as they clasped hands for the first time in 40 years.

"The men were H. F. Marble, residing at 301 North Fourteenth street, and A. S. Quant of Alba, Umatilla county, who parted company at the end of the Civil war and have not seen each other since. From 1861 to 1865 they rode side by side in the Eleventh Michigan cavalry, and side by side through many battles.

"At the end of the war they parted and lost all trace of each other. Several years ago Mr. Marble came to Portland, where he has since resided. Some time later, by chance, he heard of a man named Quant who was a prominent merchant and postmaster at Alba. As the name was uncommon and the initials identical with those of his old comrade he wrote to the Quant at Alba to inquire if he was his friend. Within a few days a reply was received from his comrade of the war.

"Mr. Quant came to Portland yesterday; as he alighted from the train Mr. Marble recognized him, and as he looked about Marble spoke to him.

"Don't you know me?" he asked. "They grasped hands and stood facing each other; they forgot where they were and looked over the heads of the crowd of curious people gazing at them to the tented fields of '65. Then they hurried off, arm in arm, to the home of Comrade Marble."

RAISING EMANCIPATION FUND.

Baptists Labor to Lift Their Church Indebtedness.

For the past four Sundays the worshippers of the Baptist church have noticed hanging in the vestibule of the church a peculiar looking placard, which reads:

"The 'Emancipation Fund' is now \$400.00.
\$406.09.
\$753.59."

This is not self-explanatory, and many will be pleased to learn its meaning. It means that the financial secretary and his assistants are making a still hunt among the membership to free the church from indebtedness. Not all the members have yet been seen, but those who have are responding loyally, and the prospects are fair for lifting this burden of debt. At present the fund amounts to nearly \$800, and is growing daily. The pastor has made no reference whatever from the pulpit to this matter. The last number on the chart indicates each Sunday the amount subscribed to date.

The Army in the Telegraph Business.

Advocates of the public ownership of public utilities will find arguments in the scale of rates for social messages over the Alaskan telegraph lines of the army signal corps, which went into effect on March 1, says Collier's. In that vast wilderness the government will transmit a limited number of such messages at 50 cents for 10 words or 25 words for \$1. A corporation in control of this system would charge at least five times the price. The signal corps is operating a complete system of telegraph lines reaching every military station and every important settlement in Alaska. Its web covers 2865 miles, including 2261 miles of cable, 1497 miles of land lines, and 107 miles of wireless. The last item takes the place of a cable across Norton Sound, which had to be abandoned on account of the irresistible crush of the ice pack. It is the longest commercial wireless line regularly working in the world, and it has been completely and uninterruptedly successful. The army system, in Alaska, is not only complete in itself, but it is connected by its own cable with the general system of the United States at Seattle.

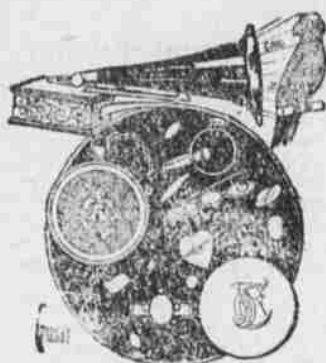
