GENERAL NEWS.

Twenty-six thousand aliens from Europe arrived at American Eastern ports during the week ending March 25.

The freight department of the Annheuser-Busch Brewing company, and 17 refrigerator cars burned. Loss, \$175,000, at St. Louis.

At Hollywood, a suburb of Los Angeles, Mrs. Sherman Pease was instantly killed and her husband seriously injured in an automobile accident.

Near Semlin, Hungary, a landslide buried a woman. A large number of men undertook her release, when another slide occurred which killed eight men and more or less injured 19.

All the Chinese commercial centers have been flooded with debased and counterfeit copper coins to such an extent that a financial collapse is looked for, as efforts are being made to retire it.

In East St. Louis an elevator fell six stories in the Lovington building. It was empty, but a counterweight broke loose and struck Herman Euler on the top of the head, killing him, and seriously injuring James Butler.

Investigation into the cause of Mrs. Stanford's death has been entirely abandoned without arrests being made, the police, detectives and relatives all being satisfied that death was entirely accidental, or at least unpremeditated on her part or anybody else's.

Judge Laurens Hawn retired from the office of probate judge of Leavenworth, Kan., a few days ago, after a continuous service of 22 years. He will make a specialty of probate law, in which he is probably one of the best vested men in America. In his long career on the bench he issued marriage licenses to 8549 couples and performed marriage ceremonies for 6204 persons.

Eva Thibault, aged 18, of Ravensdale, Wash., shot herself through the body with her father's revolver, and will die. Despondency because of the separation of her parents, disappointment in love, and shame because her father is a gambler and saloonkeeper, conspired to temporarily upset her mind. Her character is above reproach.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Mayor Williams, of Portland, was 82 years of age March 27. He celebrated by attending church three times. He was born in New York in 1853.

It is claimed that an anthracite coal mine has been opened on the west side of Mount St. Elias, Alaska, the product of which is 30 fixed carbon and which only leaves three per cent ash.

Peter Hemmestad died of consumption in the waiting room of the Union depot at Portland while waiting to change cars to the south. He was en route from Roseau, Minn., to Modesto, Cal., and entirely alone.

John Cunningham is under arrest for trial at Boise charged with setting forest fires along Goose creek, Idaho. He is out on bond for his appearance in the United States court. Cunningham claims to be the victim of rival stockmen.

E. F. Clappa, aged 47, shot and killed himself March 26 at his home at the corner of Brooklyn and East Fourteenth streets, Portland, rather than face death a few days later from tuberculosis. He was one of a family of 14 children, 12 of whom died of consumption. He leaves a wife and five children.

A GLANCE AT OREGON

M. H. LEE TAKES NOTES
IN WILLAMETTE VALLEY.

No Other Portion of Oregon Exhibits the Same Enterprise Seen in Eastern Oregon Counties—Roseburg, Eugene, Drain and Other Towns Are All Slow Compared to Pendleton.

Grant's Pass, March 25.—Left Pendleton at 11 p. m. and daylight found us at Roseburg. We had a number of Eastern people as fellow travelers, and they were in ecstasies over the scenery and it is truly grand this time of year.

In one place the mountains were covered with freshly fallen snow, down to within perhaps 150 feet of their base, and looked so "wintry" that one felt like buttoning up his overcoat, while along the road the grass was green, the birds were singing and the fruit trees in bloom, and all nature in her balmy springtime mood.

It has never been my fortune to see the Alpine mountain valleys, but judging from the pictures, our own Cascade gorge will, at least, compare favorably with them.

At this time of the year there are an unusual number of falls along the way, and almost every bold bluff has a fall, which we Oregonians pass by without comment, but which in some eastern state would be thought well worth a journey to see.

Strange as it may seem, it was not raining, neither foggy, but this fact to be a nice day. On nearing Portland I was surprised to note that the grass, grain and other vegetation is no farther advanced than in the vicinity of Pendleton.

Passing up the valley from Portland the different stages of forwardness of vegetation reminds one of a moving picture. First the swelling bud, then a few miles and the bud bursts forth; a few more miles and the leaves unfold; a few more, and the bloom shows forth, and the tree stands out in its complete spring raiment and ready for its summer work.

Last year was unusually dry and hay scarce, and the result is the cattle look very thin. As we approach Salem we notice indications of recent heavy rains; plows are idle in the fields and ponds of water are seen everywhere. The country traversed by the Southern Pacific is beautiful to look upon and I cannot help but think of what it was when the white man first came here and feel sorry for Mr. Lo in being compelled to relinquish it.

It is practically level, stretching far away to the east toward the Cascade mountains, intersected here and there by small streams and strips of timber. On the west at no great distance, it is flanked by a range of oak hills; along whose base nestle many farm houses. The individual fields look like potato patches as compared with Umatilla fields and there is a lack of the indications of vastness, rustle and money making, seen up there; but more of contented home life. These people are apparently here to stay, and they are using their holdings to make homes for themselves and little ones, while up there every man is straining every nerve to make more money to buy more land, and then more money for some more land, ad infinitum.

Many of the little towns along the road seem to be in very flat, wet locations and have a dingy, down at the heel look, but now and then one sees a clean, bright little place.

Eugene I found at the upper end of the valley, at the edge of the foothills and in rather a pleasant place; but I was disappointed in the town itself. It seems to be an aggregation of cheap little houses and does not show much indications of solidity. Of course, all my impressions are derived from what can be seen from the road.

From Eugene to Drain is through a rough, hilly, mountainous country, devoted largely to the lumber business; here being located some of the large Booth-Kelley mills and yards; but it seems queer that every place where there is a level spot large enough for a house there one will find an old shack, and frequently apple trees 25 or 30 years old, showing long occupancy.

One would think they would either dig out a bigger hole or go where they can get one without digging. Drain is a little village right down in a hole in the ground, and I can not imagine where the children can come from to support much of a school. It looks to a passing observer that the making of a Normal school of the one there and giving it state aid, is only to keep it from dying a natural death and furnish some teachers a job.

The country from there south begins to open up a little and at Yoncola, one sees nearly every hillside covered with prune orchards, which are just now out in bloom and these acres and acres of blooming fruit trees make a pretty sight besides the promise of substantial returns by and by.

The country for many miles through here consists of high, rugged chains of oak hills, with little hollows or valleys between; very much like many parts of the Willamette, but more rugged.

Where we first came to the Umpqua river the water was almost brick red, caused by mining operations further up. This is a mining country all through here. The canyon of the Umpqua for many miles is very much such a country as Meacham creek from Bingham on up.

I notice the hillsides are badly gulched, which would indicate that while they may not have cloudbursts, it does more than drizzle.

Oakland is a small town in the hills,

about like Pilot Rock, but to my surprise, nearly every house on her one main street is brick, so she must have backing, which one can not see casually, which should make a man cautious about his opinions.

Roseburg is an old town, and while it has many good buildings, there is an air of age and dinginess about it. This is Binger Hermann's home, and he is just getting back from Washington, and I find his people inclined to excuse, condone or defend him in his trouble. I do not take much stock in the soil around Roseburg, for I notice many little landslides, indicating that hardpan or bedrock is very near to the surface, and when it is wet it is very wet, and when dry, very dry.

Riddles is a clean, bright-looking little town in the upper Umpqua valley, and looks like it would be a pleasant place to live. The high hills or mountains come down near the town all around, and I am told deer can be found within a few miles most any time.

Although we are going up stream all the time, the valley widens out to something like a mile in width, of nearly level land, and is one of the prettiest valleys I ever saw, but one sees very few really good houses or barns. Night shut down on us before reaching Grant's Pass, so I will begin there next time.
