FUNERAL E. M. LYONS SUNDAY.

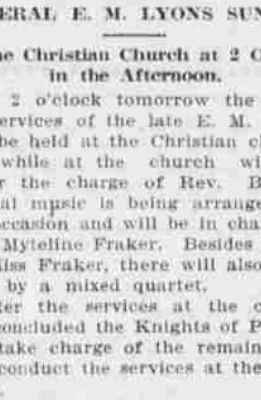
At the Christian Church at 2 O'clock
