

# AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

**New Farmers' Warehouse.**  
The building committee of the farmers' organization, which was appointed some time ago to prepare for building a warehouse in Kendrick, is arranging to have the matter settled at their meeting one week from tomorrow when it is expected that the contract will be let. The warehouse will be 24x150 feet in dimension with a concrete foundation and built of fire-proof material. The house will be built on the site of the old Farmers' warehouse, just west of the Kettentbach Grain company's warehouse.

The organization numbers among its members the leading and well-to-do farmers of this section and promises to put a different phase on the wheat market. It is said to be the object of the organization to put in a store here later on and as soon as possible to build a warehouse at Troy. From all indications the organization promises to prove a power in the future on the general business of this section.—Kendrick Gazette.

**Will Locate an Asylum.**  
Hon. N. M. Rulick, U. S. attorney general for Idaho, who has been in the city on matters relative to the Chinese deportation cases, will return to Boise this morning. Judge Rulick states that he learned at Boise that Governor Gooding and the commission appointed to select the site for the North Idaho insane asylum would arrive in Lewiston during the second week in April on the tour of North Idaho to select the site for that institution. The bill passed by the legislature appropriating \$50,000 for the establishment of the asylum also provided that the site should be selected by a committee appointed by the governor.—Lewiston Tribune.

**Permanent Withdrawal.**  
The first development following the withdrawal of 700,000 acres of timber land from settlement, located in the Lewiston land office district, was in the form of a transfer received yesterday, by which Major A. A. Perkins is ordered to report to Bozeman, Mont., at the earliest possible date.

The order does not provide for a successor to Major Perkins, which indicates that the withdrawal is expected to be permanent and the force of the Lewiston land office cut down.

It was also stated last night that it was expected that another clerk would be transferred within the next two months and the business of the land office here might decrease to such an extent that only the receiver and register would be necessary to transact the business.—Lewiston Tribune.

**Donate Site for State Capitol.**  
John Krall, through his attorney, Fremont Wood today, made a very attractive offer for a capitol building site, that is comparatively close in, and is one of the rightliest locations that could be made.

Mr. Krall offers to donate free 10 acres of ground, fronting on an extension of Jefferson boulevard and on the first mesa, back of the low land, near the east line of the government reservation. Ten acres would be a little more than four city blocks. Mr. Krall owns on all sides, and he said more land could be secured if desired. The commission has not yet had time to look over the site, as the proposition was not made until this morning.—Boise Capital News.

**New Deputy State Auditor.**  
Ezra Merrill, the efficient and popular deputy state auditor, has resigned, and George Lewis, of Bannock county, has been appointed to fill the vacancy. Mr. Merrill's resignation goes into effect tomorrow morning and Mr. Lewis will begin on Monday.—Boise Capital News.

**Injured by Blast.**  
A very serious and perhaps fatal accident occurred at Hood River this morning. David Sears, of Sears & Pawler, the orchardists, was assisting in blasting out some stumps, when a blast went off prematurely, bruising badly, breaking both legs and dislocating his hip.—The Dalles Chronicle.

**JUBILEE OF THE Y. W. C. A.**  
Its Organization Was Related to the Crimean War Beneficences.  
London, April 4.—There will be a notable demonstration at the Royal Albert hall tomorrow when the Archbishop of Canterbury and other distinguished persons, clerical and lay, will gather to celebrate the jubilee of the Young Women's Christian association.

Just 50 years have elapsed since the establishment of the association in England. It began at the period when a great impetus was given to all movements connected with women's work by Florence Nightingale's unselfish devotion to the sick and wounded in the Crimean war. During the absence from England of Miss Nightingale and her band of helpers, the idea occurred to the late Lady Kinnaird, a personal friend of the "angel nurse," that a home would be desirable for them on their return, and accordingly one was made ready. From caring for nurses to providing for other women in other fields was a natural transition, and the idea grew into the development of that remarkably interesting organization which has carried its operations into every part of the British empire, and into the United States and several other countries.
