GENERAL NEWS.

It is settled that the Zeigler, Ill., mine explosion which cost about 50 lives, was caused by the accumulation of carbonic acid gas, due to poor ventilation.

No change in the clerical force of the Panama canal commission has been made or will be made except as the future may develop necessities for changing it.

The most costly miter in the United States, which represents \$10,000 worth of jewels and precious stones, is worn by Bishop Horstmann, of Cleveland diocese of the Roman Catholic church.

The new federal army bayonet will be six inches longer than the one now in use. From being nearly "obsolete," the Russo-Japanese war has proven its up-to-dateness in the hands of up-to-date soldiers.

At Mingo Junction, O., the special train by which President Roosevelt traveled, ran over and killed Peter Hardy, aged 26. Hardy was attempting to pass between the cars of the special to board a freight on another track.

In the Chicago election Judge Dunne ran ahead of his ticket, all of whom were elected except the candidate for city attorney. John F. Smutski, the republican candidate for city attorney, was elected by nearly 15,000 majority.

Frank D. Comerford was recently expelled from the Illinois legislature because he could not substantiate charges of bribe taking against other members. He went home and on April 4 was re-elected to the legislature, his constituents thus vindicating him.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Of the 1904 tax of \$223,061.39 in Clackamas county, \$177,069.39 has been collected and cashed into the county treasury.

Hood River is experiencing a virulent attack of cleaning up alleys, streets and back yards, and is extending the war into drains and cesspools.

The body of John Litscho, who disappeared in January, was found in a hay loft at Hamilton, Mont. He crawled into the loft when drunk, probably, and was frozen to death.

The N. P. depot at North Yakima, 32x340 feet in length, was moved bodily 47 feet to the westward without disturbing the clerks and freight handlers who were transacting business inside.

Secretary of State Dunbar is sending out to state officers and certain county officials the new session laws of 1905. They will be furnished to private parties at \$1.40 each, which also pays the postage.

Customs collections in the Portland district amounted to \$57,573, as compared with \$50,923 in February and \$69,254 in January. The receipts last month were \$11,049 larger than in March last year, but fell below those of the same month in 1903 by \$10,220.

A disastrous freight wreck on the Union Pacific near Rock Springs delayed traffic 12 hours. Sixteen heavily loaded cars were derailed, owing, it is said, to a soft spot in the track. The fast mail and overland limited, west-bound, were behind the wreck and delayed.

Governor J. K. Toole, of Montana, has declared a quarantine against California, Colorado, Minnesota, Nebraska, Kansas, North Dakota, New York, South Dakota, Ohio, Wyoming, Washington and Oregon, where sheep scab is supposed to exist. Under the governor's order, the ban is placed on the importation of any sheep from the states quarantined against.

Interesting Letter From New York City

New York, April 5.—New York has never witnessed such a building boom as is now in progress. There are not so many office buildings going up as there were a few months ago, but the building of houses, especially in Brooklyn and outlying sections that can or will be reached easily when the numerous transportation facilities now planned are provided, is tremendous. Last year, up to this time, buildings of an aggregate value of \$10,000,000 had been planned in Manhattan and the Bronx. During the corresponding period of this year the total is \$23,500,000. In building operations last year was the biggest Brooklyn had ever known, the estimated cost of new buildings for the first 10 weeks being \$3,500,000. The corresponding figures of this year show the tremendous total of \$7,000,000.

In addition to private building, municipal improvements are being carried out on a large scale and with the tunnels being built by the Pennsylvania railroad, the Blackwell's Island and the Manhattan bridges, the vast scheme of the Rapid Transit commission and other corporate undertakings, it seems that no active man out of a job will have an excuse for not working.

No Law to Fit the Case.

A young man living in Brooklyn is seeking to have his legal status as a child fixed definitely. Recently he consulted a lawyer and asked him to begin action with the above object in view. He was advised that there was no law that covered his case, which is one of the strangest ever brought to the lawyer's notice.

The young man, who is 29 years old, lived for 25 years in the belief that his mother was his sister, and that her parents were logically his parents. As a matter of fact, he is the son of a man who for many years was prominent in Brooklyn politics, and held a number of offices 20 years ago. The deceit was practiced on him at the request of his father, and it was only when the latter died that the young man learned of his real status.

Will Collect a Big Fee.

Former Secretary of the Treasury John G. Carlisle has had much difficulty in collecting one of the large fees earned by him since coming to this city. In the case in which he was engaged to test the constitutionality of the law relating to duties on goods imported from Porto Rico and of the law under which duties were levied on goods entering Porto Rico from other parts of the United States, it was only after a long legal battle that the appellate division of the supreme court gave Mr. Carlisle a verdict for \$23,549. His original bill was \$25,000. His clients had refused to pay the fee, claiming it was excessive.

Will Recognize Osteopaths.

Osteopaths are now in a fair way to win their fight for recognition as regular practitioners. The judiciary committee of the state senate has reported the Davis bill providing for an examination of students of the science of osteopathy by a state board of examiners. A three-years' course is prescribed. The bill has been amended so that osteopathic practitioners cannot hold office as medical examiners or sign death certificates.

The bill was opposed by regular physicians at the hearings given, but their opposition was not nearly so vigorous as it has been for the past years.

Death of Colonel Latimer.

There has just passed away at his home in the Bronx Lieutenant Colonel A. E. Latimer, U. S. A., retired, once a roommate of General Phil Sheridan and well known as a brave Indian fighter.

Colonel Latimer was born in South Carolina, and while attending the United States military academy at West Point was a classmate of General Sheridan. Although a Southerner, he joined the Union army and served through the Civil war. In the first battle of Bull Run his company, by heroic fighting, helped to save Burnside's battery from capture. After the Civil war he served as major of the Fourth cavalry, and took part in some of the leading expeditions against the Indians of the Northwest.

Gigantic Idol.

Two miles from Kamakura and about 20 from Yokohama, in Japan, on a terrace near the temple, sits the most gigantic idol in the world. It is the brazen image of a deity, and dates from the reign of the emperor Shomu, who died A. D. 748. The dimensions of this idol are colossal. Its height, from the base of the lotus flower upon which it sits to the top of its head, is 63 1-2 feet. The face is 16 feet in length and 9 1-2 feet wide; the eyes are 3 feet and 9 inches from corner to corner; the eyebrows 5 1-2 feet, and the ears 1-2 feet. The chest is 20 feet in depth and the middle finger is exactly 5 feet long.

Cuba's Tobacco Crop.

Cuba's production of tobacco for the year 1904 was 416,000 bales, an increase of 74,000 bales over the yield of 1903. The production of tobacco in Western Cuba increased and that in the central and eastern parts of the island diminished. The United States took 197,000, a decrease of 9800 bales as compared with 1903. The value of exports was: Leaf, \$12,000,000; cigars, \$14,150,000; cigarettes, \$500,000; cut leaf, \$138,000. Although there were 52,000 bales less exported in 1904 than in 1903, the value last year was \$1,650,000 greater.

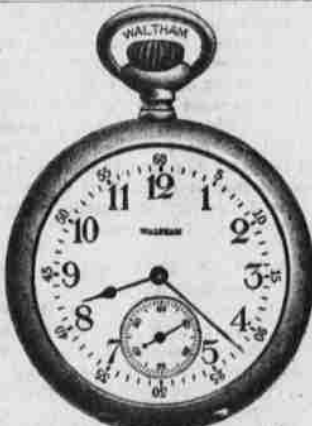
