SCHOOLS AT FAIR NOTES OF UMATILLA

NORTHWESTERN GRADUATES TO VISIT EXPOSITION.

Many Public Schools and Colleges Preparing to Send Their Classes to the Lewis and Clark Fair—Educational Exhibit Will Be One of the Most Elaborate to Be Seen—Many Foreign Educational Exhibits to Come to Portland.

Various cities in the Pacific Northwest are arranging to send the graduating classes of their high schools to the Lewis and Clark exposition, opening at Portland, June 1. Thus is the value of an international exposition as an adjunct to education recognized. The graduates will be afforded an excellent opportunity, not only to study the educational work of other states and foreign countries, but to see the products of civilization, the world over and to observe the customs and habits of life of many races that will be represented at the fair.

Relative to the educational exhibits of an exposition, its chief value is in the opportunity afforded for comparisons. A brief review of previous enterprises of a character similar to the Lewis and Clark centennial shows conclusively that the educational displays were productive of results that exceeded the most sanguine expectations of their promoters. The establishment of the school for industrial art at the South Kensington museum was the result of the Crystal Palace exhibition in London in 1851.

The educational exhibition at the Centennial exposition of 1876 led to the introduction of manual training into the public schools of this country—the institution of shopwork as a part of the curriculum of technical schools which has rendered possible the marvelous advance of the United States in arts and crafts.

The reorganization of primary education in France following the Paris exposition of 1875; the rapid growth of manual training and industrial art instruction as a result of the impetus given by the Chicago World's fair of 1893, and the action of the French government in arranging to send students annually to this country for the study and investigation of our industrial and commercial methods as a result of the United States educational display at the Paris exposition of 1900. These results prove that the influences of an international exposition are not to be underestimated.

It is not to be expected that every exposition will mark a noticeable change in educational methods, even in one department, but no one can anticipate the results of its influences.

Aside from the educational features of the Lewis and Clark exposition, the visiting students will find much to supplement their high school gleanings, in the displays of foreign countries in particular, inasmuch as these displays will be very instructive and will serve to bring the students in touch with nations, peoples and customs of which they have read.

The proposal of cities and smaller communities in the Pacific Northwest to send their high school graduates to the exposition is most commendable, and the example might well be emulated by every section that has a college, an academy or a high school. Hearty co-operation of the railroad companies in extending special rates for such excursions is assured.

Upon their arrival at the exposition the high school students will find the officials of the centennial excellent hosts. Every effort will be made to make the stay of these young visitors a pleasant one, and they will be extended numerous courtesies which will enable them to see the exposition to their best advantage.

About \$65.00 was subscribed in a short time for immediate use. A committee was appointed consisting of G. W. Kelly, John W. Lennox and Frank O'Connell, to secure and set out, shade trees along the streets.

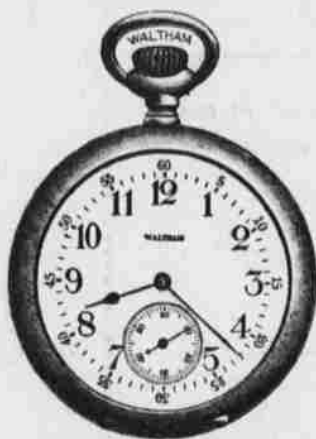
