GENERAL NEWS.

Alexander E. G. Gordon has been sentenced at Minneapolis to one year in the penitentiary for sending a threatening letter to Roosevelt.

The Grand Opera company opened the season in San Francisco, starring Madame Sembrich. The receipts of the first evening were \$85,000.

Miss Anna E. Miller repeatedly refused to marry J. H. Gregory, of Sisson, Cal. Gregory shot and killed the woman and then blew his own brains out.

It is stated that E. H. Harriman regards the "Northern Securities case" as a closed incident and will not attempt to reopen the controversy, through any excuse by law.

James Rathbun, a prisoner on his way by a Long Island railroad to Sing Sing, jumped from a train running 45 miles per hour, got up and ran, apparently uninjured, and has not been recaptured.

Long distance fast railroad runs have added a new "record breaker." Engineer Ward, of the Chicago & Northwestern, ran his train from Clinton to Boone, Iowa, a distance of 202 miles, in 138 minutes.

An hour after they were married, Z. T. Tracy and wife were riding in a buggy at Fresno, Cal. The horse took fright, ran away, the buggy was smashed and Tracy thrown out and killed. Mrs. Tracy was uninjured.

The belief is spreading throughout the peasantry of Russia that the self-styled "intellectuals" are trying to re-institute the old regime of serfdom, which was actual slavery. This belief is found to be a stumbling block in the way of all efforts at pacification of the agrarians by the government.

The Panama canal commission announce their intention of making a report at the opening of the next congress that will embody recommendations upon every phase of the work that can be foreseen, including the much-mooted one of tide-level or otherwise. In the meantime actual construction will be pushed as rapidly as possible.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

The penitentiary at Walla Walla now has 756 inmates—the largest number in the history of the institution. It was increased by 24 on April 4.

Representative Jones, of Washington, is maneuvering a plan to buy out the Colville Indians' rights to the southern half of their reservation, so it may be opened to settlement.

Lewiston is about to expend between \$80,000 and \$90,000 on an extension of the power system. The engineer in charge is Miller, who performed the same service for Pendleton.

It is generally believed in Washington that Senator Ankeny, of Washington, will upon the convocation of the next congress, be appointed chairman of the senate committee on irrigation.

Fred Tomlinson was drowned in Trask river at Tillamook. He was crossing the river by the cable ferry, when the cable broke, throwing him overboard. He is supposed to have been stunned by the blow of the cable.

The receipts of all the county offices at North Yakima have for the past several months largely exceeded those for the same length of time in the history of the county. This is considered over there as an index of general prosperity.

DON'T GO TO MEXICO

PILOT ROCK RECORD SAYS
STAY AT HOME.

Recites Instances of Hundreds of Thousands of Dollars of Umatilla County Capital Being Squandered in Adventures—Don't Believe in Following Up the New Frontier.

In speaking of the excursion of Pendleton citizens to Jallisco and the investment of Pendleton money in that Mexican town, the Pilot Rock Record closes a pertinent and timely article by saying:

The total investments by Pendleton people in the Mexico town of Jallisco is estimated at several thousand dollars and mostly by men who have never seen the sun-parched dunes on which the town of Jallisco is to be founded.

Thousands of dollars have been withdrawn from the legitimate channels of trade in Pendleton and squandered in wildcat mining schemes and real estate booms outside of this county.

Those who have remained home, looked after their farming interests and tended their flocks, investing their money in Pendleton or Umatilla county property, are the well-to-do citizens of the county today.

We cannot recall the name of one who has bettered his condition by leaving this county. We can name 20 who left this county worth from \$50,000 to \$100,000 who are now practically broke. From three to five hundred thousand dollars was withdrawn from Pendleton and invested in Port Townsend and Tacoma property, every dollar of which was lost.

Pendleton contributed its quota to millions that responded to the cry of Klondike, and to be invested in the exploitation of the precious metals and the general development of our northern neighbor. We do not know of any profits on investments up there being realized by Umatilla county citizens.

Later on the Sumpter mining boom struck Pendleton with full force.

Now it is Alberta, Canada, and Jallisco, Mexico, and both these places are drawing heavily on the brain, brawn and financial resources of the county. Yet the vital forces of the county were never more buoyant.

Crops continue good, 100 per cent of little lambs come forth annually to sun themselves on the sward, land and stock values have an upper tendency and the constant drain of the accumulating funds of the county by those engaged in outside investments is scarcely noticeable.

That "distance lends enchantment to the view" is abundantly shown in the restlessness of many of the good people of this county—some going to where snow is found five feet deep, others to the home of the centipede and tarantula.

Progress on the Portage Road.
By May 1st the road, though not completed until the 15th, will be in operation from Celilo to the Big Eddy, a distance of about eight and a half miles.

About 160 men are now employed and already is the incline at Celilo, 1100 feet long, completed and the rails laid, and workmen have started the incline at Big Eddy, which will be 300 feet long.

In the course of five or six days, grading, in the way of earth work, under Contractor Allen, will be done, while about three-quarters of the bridge work, under Contractor Tiller, is finished. Piling on the 6000-foot trestle, known as No. 4, is completed, and in a week the woodwork will be done. About 2000 feet more of trestle work, from the mess house curve to Big Eddy, is yet to be done.

In all, nine and a half miles of track is to be laid, some of course, doubling on the inclines. Already one and a half miles of steel about the center is laid.

Work has been somewhat delayed by the failure of the state to deliver the rolling stock by the first of April, as agreed. Fortunately the weather has been such as to favor work.

For a day or two progress at mess house curve, where for about a mile and a half the wind gets in its work with the sand, was retarded slightly, but not nearly so much as was expected since the wind has not been so heavy as in some years.

Flat cars have been secured from the C. R. & N. and are being brought over from Goldendale. Two are in the yards here now, having come up from Lyle by boat.

As to the boats to be used by the road, Contractor Charles Johnson is now at work on one at Celilo and has it half completed. He also has the contract for the one at Big Eddy.

Arrangements have been partially made for connections on the upper river, of which we expect to hear something when Captain Spencer arrives in the city tonight, as he is taking an active interest in that most important matter.—The Dalles Chronicle.
