DO THEY CARE FOR COSTS?

Now that the Baker county grand jury has indicted and the Baker petit jury has convicted saloon men in that county for the wilful, continuous and flagrant violation of the Sunday closing law, the saloon men and their mouthpieces, a few little lawyers, are prating about the awful cost of the trials upon the taxpayers.

This is a ruse of the lawyers and their guilty clients to create public sentiment against further prosecutions under the law.

If the saloon men really cared for the cost of city government would they not shudder to think that 99 per cent of the crimes coming before police courts and consuming the time of police officers originates with their useless and pernicious business?

If they were really solicitous about the "cost," would they engage in a business that causes 80 per cent of the cost of criminal cases coming before circuit courts? This word "cost" is used by them as a scarecrow, to check the prosecutions. The citizens should insist on the enforcement of the law, no matter what the cost. Money spent in the enforcement of the law, is spent in a sacred cause and no honest man regrets it.

Suppose officials should be as lax in enforcing the law against stealing as they are in enforcing the law against Sunday closing and selling liquor to minors? How long would the people stand for it? How long would it be until impeachment proceedings were instituted?

And yet this Sunday closing law was passed by the same legal body of legislators, is part of the same code, is printed in the same plain English, and yet the officials all profess to be doubtful as to who shall enforce it. Is there any doubt as to who shall issue an information and who shall serve a warrant when a horse is stolen, a house burglarized or a murder committed?

The cry of "cost" need not deter any officer from enforcing the law. The intelligent people of Umatilla and Baker counties are willing to pay the necessary costs, in order to preserve the sacredness and dignity of the statutes.

MORAL MAZAMAS NEEDED.

The Mazamas is a mountain-climbing society of Portland, whose recreation in scaling the highest peaks on the coast, for the pleasure and health it affords.

These mountain climbers have enjoyed more magnificent views of the majestic peaks and mountain ranges of the West than any other class of people. Their business in the summer time is to climb higher and higher and secure wider and clearer views of the surrounding country.

From Mt. Hood they have been enabled to see the glistening summits of Shasta, Adams, St. Helena, Three Sisters, Rainier and other glorious sentinels of the Cascade range.

They have learned that not half the grandeur of life is contained in the narrow valleys. In order to en-

joy the best part of life, one must scale a mountain peak and look over the narrow valleys to the beckoning sentinels standing everywhere around you.

Too many people imagine there is nothing beautiful or good to be found except in their narrow sphere. Let them become moral Mazamas, climbing peaks to get clearer views. They will find the world filled with glistening summits far above their sordid selves.

RECOGNIZES SOCIALISM.

Since the Oregonian has been hit hard by the result of the Chicago municipal election, in which the people endorsed municipal ownership of street car lines by 25,000 majority, it has recognized socialism as one of the problems before the people and resignedly decides to make the best of it.

It says the next great step is government ownership of railroads. This is a frank admission to come from such a conservative and old-fashioned newspaper. No one can imagine the mental spasm which such an admission must have cost, since the Oregonian has made such strenuous denials of the approach of socialism even within a few days before it finally accepted the inevitable and threw up its hands in horror after the Chicago election.

The intense light of progress may hurt the eyes of the Oregonian for a short time, but it will soon become accustomed to the radiance.

The East Oregonian has produced a sworn statement for advertisers, from the postal clerk handling the paper mail issued by both papers. It was in hopes this would be sufficient at this time.

C. E. S. Wood, in the April Pacific Monthly, makes a striking point when he says that political rottenness and political corruption were not banished from Oregon with the passage of the direct primary nomination law. The same politicians will be on the ground, the same game is to be played for, the same methods will be employed to gain power and offices and the people must be aware, now, as before. The primary law is only a means in the hands of the people by which they may guard against the politicians, if the people stay awake and "attend to their knitting."

There is a lot of truth in the statement of the Pilot Rock Record that thousands of dollars have been taken from circulation in Umatilla county, to be invested in wild cat ventures, in mines, townsites and colonization schemes, and that but few dollars thus removed ever come back.

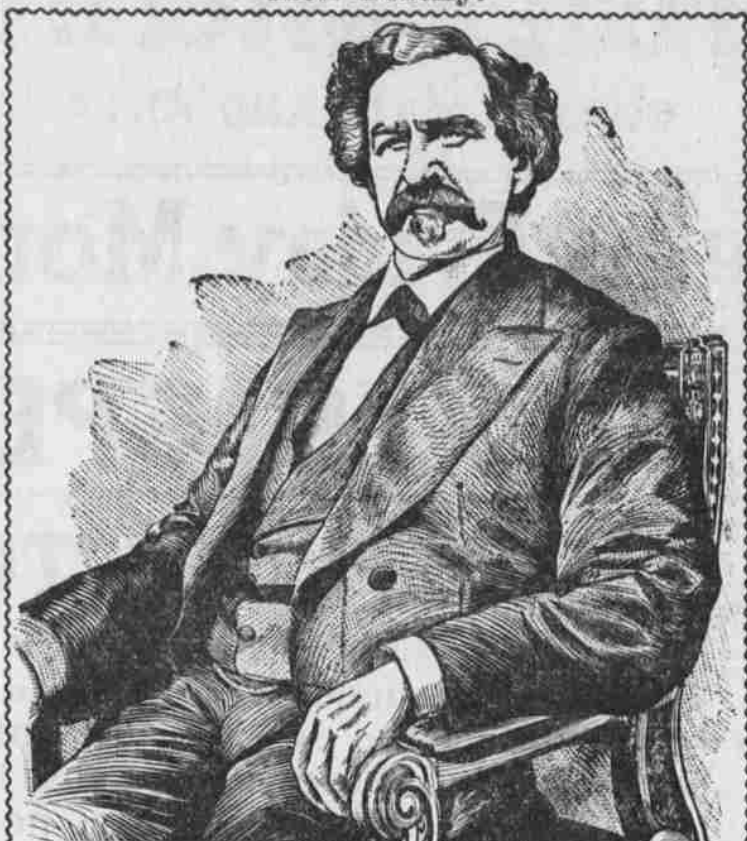
