INDIANS RETURNED

CHIEF NO SHIRT BACK FROM WASHINGTON.

Party From the Umatilla Reservation Met Indian Commissioner Leupp and Are Delighted With Their Visit to the National Capital—Hope to Have Matter Adjusted on the Reservation—Met Other Indians in Washington and Found That the Umatillas Are Comparatively Well Fixed.

After a two weeks' visit in the national capital, Chief No Shirt and Sub-chief Umapine, of the Walla Walla branch of the Umatilla tribe, accompanied by Billy McKay and William Charles, their interpreters, returned home last night, delighted with their trip.

This delegation of Indians from the Umatilla reservation, was royally treated by the Indian commissioner and all are loud in their praise of him and express the earnest hope that he will listen to and heed their pleas for a regulation of affairs on the reservation.

Four visits were paid to Commissioner Leupp, two by Umapine and Billy McKay, before the arrival of No Shirt, and two by the entire party after the arrival of the chief in the capital.

Billy McKay, who was spokesman for the delegation, says that the commissioner took up their grievances in detail and promised to give personal attention to them.

As to the regulation prohibiting crossing of sheep and cattle over the reservation, the Indians hope to have this rule strictly enforced. The matter of giving a divorced wife half of the allotment of the husband, was also discussed and the commissioner promised to bring the matter before congress.

Billy McKay, who is an intelligent full-blood, well educated and speaking good English, tells of meeting Indians from many other states, including Utah, Wyoming and New York, and he says that from reports, the Umatillas are about as progressive and well advanced as any other tribe.

He met Senecas, Oneidas, Winnebagoes, Five Nations and other Eastern Indians, whom he says were in Washington, accompanied by their agents, on missions resembling that which called Chief No Shirt and his party to Washington.

The party was well treated wherever they went in the national capital. They visited the congressional library, the "zoo," all the parks, attended theaters and wild west shows and enjoyed a delightful visit and come home with a much wider and more optimistic view of the world and its affairs.

Commissioner Leupp promised to visit the Northwest this season if possible, and the Umatillas are hopeful that he will pay them a personal visit. Owing to the rush preceding President Roosevelt's trip to Colorado, they did not see the president, although they very much desired to visit him.

RATES YET TOO HIGH.

George H. Daniels Says Fares to the Exposition Should Be Lowered.

Portland, April 8.—George H. Daniels, general passenger agent of the New York Central railroad system has written officials of the Lewis and Clark exposition, declaring his intention of doing all he can to induce the trunk line passenger associations to reduce the rate.

Additional advertising for the exposition has been ordered by General Passenger Agent A. M. Cleland of the Northern Pacific in 23 leading daily papers of the East and Middle West. Souvenir cards will also be printed for use on the tables in all Northern Pacific dining cars, showing a picture of the Oriental exhibits building and containing a synopsis of the attractions at the fair.

Chicago merchants have decided to minimize as far as possible the commercial influence of the exposition in favor of Portland. They will send a party of representative merchants in a special car for a tour of the Pacific coast to spread the greatness of Chicago's trade reputation and try to arouse interest of Pacific coast merchants in Chicago's merchandise.

Frank V. Hibbard of Hibbard, Spencer & Bartlett, is said to have charge of the arrangement. The delegation will be out three weeks and visit 28 cities of the Southwest and the Pacific coast.

Royal Neighbors of America.

Iowa Falls, Iowa, April 10.—Delegates from all parts of Iowa are gathering here for the state convention of the Royal Neighbors of America. The convention will be formally opened this evening with the exemplification of the secret work of the new ritual of the order by the degree team of this city. The business sessions for the reception of reports from officers and committees and the annual election of officers will be held tomorrow. Indications point to an attendance of fully 150 delegates.

"Moonshiner's Daughter" Confined. Manager Taylor, of the Fraser, announces the coming of the "Moonshiner's Daughter" on April 11. This is not the same play which was seen here some time ago, under the name of the "Moonshiner." It is entirely different and this is said to be an excellent production.

NO PRESS MONOPOLY.

France Says Associated Press Has Lied to the Public.

San Francisco, April 8.—The Pacific coast bureau of the Scripps-McRae Press association, has issued the following statement in regard to a false report circulated by the Associated Press:

In a recent magazine article Melville Stone asserts that the Associated Press has special telegraphic facilities from the French government.

When our Paris correspondent submitted this article at the French foreign office it created the greatest amazement. Formal denial was made that the Associated Press had any exclusive privileges. Urgent rates exist, but are open, not only to newspapers, but to the general public and are used by all without prejudice.

The French foreign office makes the following official declaration: "Knowing that the American government treated the Scripps-McRae News, Publishers' Press, and the Associated Press on the same footing, the French government has observed absolute impartiality toward both associations in regard to all official courtesies, information and facilities whatsoever."
