SOUVENIR LETTER ALBUMS OF
OREGON.

After writing the letter you simply moisten the gummed edges and seal it exactly the same as an envelope. Address and stamp the outside cover. The receiver merely tears off the gummed edges at the perforation, which is readily done, whereupon he finds his letter with the different views of the most popular and interesting scenes in this state.

GENERAL NEWS.

Troy, Idaho, is to have a creamery. Linn county will have a wool clip of 500,000 pounds.

MONEY FROM WOOL

SALE OF WOOL PUTS
MONEY IN CIRCULATION.

May 22 to Be the First Sales Day in Pendleton This Season—Sale of Wool Means Much to the Merchants of the Interior as it Is the Day of Reckoning When Accounts Are Squared Up—Pendleton Draws Its Wealth From Wheat, Wool and Cattle.

From now until the first of July woolmen will have the stage in the Inland Empire. Shearing is now in progress in many of the stock counties of this state and along the Snake river in Washington and Idaho. During the next few weeks the theme of the sheepmen will be of the fleeces and clips, followed by discussions of the prices that will probably be paid on the sales days.

But it is not only to the stockman that the wool selling time is of interest, for it is of equal importance in the business circles of Eastern Oregon, especially to the exclusive stock counties of the interior. To the merchants of those counties the wool sales are full of meaning for they are followed by payments on long standing accounts, which makes it possible for the stores to reduce their overdrafts at the bank, thus in turn making money free in the financial world of the stock counties.

However, to Pendleton, being a wool market during a couple of months, it is but one of its features, one which is overshadowed completely when the grain begins to move a month later and Umatilla's 5,000,000 bushels is placed upon the market.

Though shearing is now generally on in most parts of the county no wool has yet reached the warehouses here outside of that from the Cunningham bucks, which were sheared several weeks ago. However, Fred Taylor, manager of the Furman warehouse, believes that by the end of this week wool will be rolling in from the Echo country, where they have been shearing for some time past, taking advantage of the favorable weather.

It is yet over a month until the first sales day is here, May 22, and if the present conditions continue, wool authorities say that practically all of the wool of the county will be on sale upon that date. However, such would not mean that all would be sold upon that day for some may hold in hopes of higher prices later in the season.

Of the wool buyers, Messrs. Clark and Green are now here and will make this city their headquarters during the rest of the season, while the remainder of the corps are still en-

gaged in the sunnier climes of California and Northern Arizona.

In speaking of the present situation this morning, C. H. Green, representing Koshland Bros., said:

"At present there is little doing except along the Snake in Washington and Idaho, and in parts of Eastern Oregon, where no sales days are held. In Washington and Idaho the market is open and no dates are fixed, while in Montana the same system is followed as here. In the southwest sales days are held in Arizona, but not in New Mexico."

WORK ON CELILO CANAL.

Major Langfitt Tells of the Progress on the River Project.

When seen last night at Lewiston, Major Langfitt, government engineer at Portland, stated that the canal project at Celilo was in very favorable condition and that the work will commence within a few weeks unless unforeseen delays occur.

"The right of way has been turned over to me by the state of Oregon," said Major Langfitt, "but on account of some slight errors it was necessary to return it for correction, but this will only require a short time. The right of way will then be forwarded to Washington and as soon as this is accepted the work will commence."

"At the present time there is an appropriation of \$330,000 for this work and this will perform a very important feature of the project at the head of the canal in the way of a rock wall and one gate. The completion of the canal will involve the expenditure of about \$4,000,000 and will require about four years, if no delays result from the lack of funds."

"The canal when completed will be about eight miles long. The plans and specifications for the work have been completed and the contract will be awarded as soon as the right of way is accepted at Washington."

"Work is now under way below Celilo at Three Mile rapids and this contract is nearly half completed. Much work will be needed on the Columbia river and Celilo and on the Snake river between Riparia and the mouth of the river, but appropriations have not been made for this work and it will probably require at least two years before these rivers are in good condition. The work on the Snake river from Riparia and the mouth of the river has been estimated at \$275,000, while no estimate has been made on the work on the Columbia."

"There is also an appropriation for work on the Snake river," continued Major Langfitt, "and this work will be commenced as soon as the stage of water, after the spring freshet will permit. A portion of the work will be done on the upper river above Lewiston and the balance between Lewiston and Riparia."
