SOUVENIR LETTER ALBUMS OF
OREGON.

This is, without doubt, the latest invention in the way of a photograph souvenir and promises to become very popular.

The construction is similar to an envelope, when closed being about the size of an ordinary number six government envelope. Made with two sheets of letter paper and four sheets of views making in all eight different views in each booklet, and made in four different series or a total of 32 different views in the lot.

After writing the letter you simply moisten the gummed edges and seal it exactly the same as an envelope. The receiver merely tears off the gummed edges at the perforation, which is readily done, whereupon he finds his letter with the different views of the most popular and interesting scenes in this state.

GENERAL NEWS.

Henry James, the noted author, is at Portland. He is on a tour of the coast.

The Fins have agreed to raise \$2,000,000 to help Russia and to help enslave themselves.

A 200-pound man is suing a 100-pound woman in Portland for cruel and inhuman treatment.

Baker City will show a population of 6300. Baker City people who have claimed 10,000, are greatly disappointed at the result.

Army officers and veterinarians will meet soon at Ogden, Weiser, Portland and Seattle to inspect horses for the army in the Philippines.

Deputy Sheriff George Vance, of Olympia, shot J. L. Lusher at the Mutual Lumber company's mill at Bucoda, while arresting him. Lusher may die.

Walter Kent attempted to board a freight near Roseburg, Or., and lost a leg in the process. He comes from Butte, Mont., and has well-to-do relatives.

At a depth of 500 feet a flow of artesian hot water has been struck at Baker City. It will be used for heating buildings and the surplus for irrigation.

W. A. Fagen and H. Gorham, two sons of prominent families, came west, and losing their money in mining deals put poison in their whiskey and committed suicide at Denver.

Over four million acres of public land has been withdrawn from entry in Idaho as a forest reserve. Some will be restored to entry if found to be purely agricultural land.

OREGON DEVELOPMENT
LEAGUE APRIL 26 AND 27.

Portland Will Entertain the Commercial Bodies of the State in a Second Annual Gathering—Over 50 Clubs and Associates to Meet in the Metropolis—Excellent Program is Arranged for the Two Days' Session.

The complete program for the meeting of the Oregon Development league at Portland, on April 26 and 27, is as follows:

Convention called to order at 9:30 a. m.—delegates to arrive at 9 if possible to register and receive badges. A local reception committee will be on hand to welcome delegates.

Address of welcome, Hon. George E. Chamberlain, governor of Oregon.

Response by E. L. Smith, president Oregon Development league.

Report of league's work, Tom Richardson, secretary.

Addresses by Messrs. H. W. Goode, president of Lewis and Clark exposition; J. R. N. Bell, Baker City; Frank I. Vawter, Medford; B. A. Worthington, general manager S. P. and O. R. & N. Co., Portland; Charles V. Galloway, of McMinnville. (Subjects to be named later).

Brief discussion of papers. Adjournment at 12:30.

In the afternoon the convention will meet in sections devoted to the various industries of the state, enabling delegates to discuss subjects in which they are particularly interested.

The Willamette Valley agricultural section will occupy the Marquam Grand theater.

Good Roads section, Judge John H. Scott, Salem, chairman. Tower room of Portland Commercial club.

Dairy section, J. W. Bailey, Portland, chairman, ladies' dining room Portland Commercial club.

Fruit section, Wilbur K. Newell, Dill, chairman, Chamber of Commerce rooms.

Mining sections, W. S. Newbury, Sumpter, and C. C. Beckman, Jacksonville, joint chairmen, Black room of Commercial club.

At these sectional conventions a condensed but comprehensive report will be made for presentation at the general session Thursday morning.

In the evening reception in rooms of Portland Commercial club from 8 to 11 o'clock, for delegates, their families and friends.

Thursday, April 27.

Convention called to order promptly at 9 o'clock.

Reports of vice-presidents of the league.

Address by Hon. Jefferson Myers, president Oregon state commission of Lewis and Clark exposition.

Reports from all delegations represented.

All delegates will be guests of the Lewis and Clark exposition the afternoon of the 27th, leaving for the grounds at exactly 2 o'clock, as per announcement to be made in the convention.

The addresses on the program will none of them exceed 15 minutes in length, leaving time for the important business to be considered—a proper presentation of the various portions of the state through a league headquarters on the exposition grounds will receive attention. The sectional conventions will be intensely practical.

Special rates made by the railroads for this occasion insure the convention's success. On the O. R. & N. La Grande and points east will be one fare for the round trip; points between La Grande and Portland, one and one-third fare. Tickets on the Southern Pacific will be sold at one fare for the round trip from Glendale and points south; between Glendale and Portland, fare will be one and one-third. Rate on the Northern Pacific is one and one-third fare for round trip. These rates will apply on the O. R. & N. and Southern Pacific for trains arriving in Portland on Tuesday evening or Wednesday morning, April 25 and 26. On the Northern Pacific delegates may arrive either Wednesday or Thursday morning, April 28 is limit of tickets.

Now as to delegates. Every member of the Oregon Development league is entitled to name a delegation to include any desired number—the section convention should be borne in mind in appointing delegates so that men from the different industries are named. Every editor in the state is a delegate at large, because it is through the newspapers that Oregon will get her publicity. Where there is no organization holding membership in the league, the appointment of representatives devolves upon the mayors of towns and the county commissioners, and it is especially desired that several sections of the state not now affiliated with the league should organize and join us. Every possible permanent benefit should be secured as a result of the enormous western travel that is now a certainty.

RAISING KIDS IN FRANCE.

America Receives 9,000,000 Pounds of
Skins Annually.

Among the farmers of the more mountainous regions of France the raising of kids is an important industry. As the skins are used for the manufacture of gloves, softness, delicacy of texture and freedom from blemish are the principal qualities required in them, and great pains are taken to secure these essentials.

As soon as the kids are old enough to crop grass, or eat other vegetation, their skins begin to decline in quality, as with such diet the skin begins to grow coarser and harder in texture, thus losing its chief value. Hence the farmer takes his kids at an early age and pens them carefully on bare ground where they cannot eat, and where they run no risk of accidental injury from the scratches or bruises which would impair the value of the skin.

When the kid attains the age at which the skin is considered at its best for the use of the glove, it is killed, and the cured hide put away for sale to the traveling hawkers,

who buy and convey the skins to the great tanning centers of France. To America alone France exports nearly 9,000,000 pounds weight of kids every year.

Decrease in Births in Belgium.

While the population of Belgium is steadily increasing, its continual birth decrease is attracting attention. The table of births shows that in 1839 the

birth rate was 32.30 per 1000 of the population, while in 1902 it had dropped to 28.40. In nearly all the communes of 40,000 population or over the present birth rate is less than that of 1880.—James C. McNally, consul, Liege, Belgium.
