

AMONG THE EXCHANGES OF THE INLAND EMPIRE

First Through-River Freight.

C. F. Allen, lessee of the steamer Mountain Gem, fully realizes the importance of the open-river-to-the-sea project, and it is learned that he is planning to show his view of the importance of the portage road by sending the Mountain Gem to the portage with the first cargo of freight ever handled from the upper river.

The portage will be completed at some date in May and the river will be at the best stage of water the latter part of that month or early in June. The trip over the section of the river between Riparia and the portage can then be successfully run, and Captain Grey is thoroughly informed regarding the stream. The trip will be one of great importance to the industrial development of the Inland Empire region, as it will demonstrate that the open river and independent transportation is a practical thing.

It is said to be the plan to load the boat with wheat at Lewiston and have a boat from Portland in readiness at the lower end of the portage to move the cargo on down to the Oregon metropolises without delay. The big fair in Portland will then be in progress, and there is no question but a big passenger list can be secured to make the important journey and join in celebrating the event.—Lewiston Tribune.

Increased Postal Business.

A comparative statement of the business of Baker City postoffice for the year 1904 and 1905 shows a decided increase. The receipts from stamps, second-class postage and box rents for 1905 totaled \$16,229.93 for 1904, for the same period, 1905, \$16,521.87. The money orders issued for the year 1904, ending March 31, totaled \$12,958.49, and for the same period 1905, \$12,159.98. During the same period there was a large increase in the amount of money orders paid out at this office and the only conclusion to be drawn from these figures is that there has been an increase in population in Baker City and Baker county.

Some of the increase in the post-office business has doubtless been due to the issuance of orders to Japanese sending money to their home government for war purposes, but the large increase in money orders paid

at this office will overbalance that item.—Baker City Democrat.

Eight Thousand Head of Sheep Sold.
During the past week J. M. Yates, who was here in the interest of Tim Kinney of Rock Springs, Wyo., succeeded in purchasing about 8000 head of mixed yearling sheep, which will be shipped east at an early date. The sheep were bought of W. H. Mason and K. F. MacRae of Dayville, and F. H. Seis and J. C. Oliver of this part of the John Day valley.

The sheep from the Dayville country will be driven to Shianko and those from this part of the valley to Baker City, where they will be shorn before shipment.—Blue Mountain Eagle.

Magill Ranch Sold.
While in this city early this week a deal was practically closed whereby the large cattle ranch of Dave Magill, a prominent stockman of Izen, changes ownership, the purchaser being H. H. Trowbridge, who is also engaged in the cattle business in that locality. The health of Mr. Magill during the past year makes it necessary that he retire from the cattle business. This being the case, he decided to dispose of his ranch interests also. He is undecided as to where he will make his future home or what business he will engage in.—Blue Mountain Eagle.

White Salmon Orchards.
Fruit Inspector Ingram spent three days last week in and around White Salmon inspecting different orchards. He reports that most of the orchards are in good shape, but that some few have been neglected, and these orchards are a menace to all the others. Mr. Ingram is determined that only first-class fruit shall be shipped from White Salmon, and such orchards as are not properly cared for, will be properly taken care of at the owner's expense.—Hood River Glacier.

Fruit Prospects in Idaho.
A. F. Hitt, the new state horticultural inspector and pure food, dairy and oil commissioner, is now located in his office in the old Masonic block. He said this morning that the outlook generally for a big fruit crop is very bright. In a few localities the peaches have been damaged by frost, but generally speaking they are in prime condition so far.—Boise Capital News.

How It Looks to a Baker Man.
"It is immigration and not irrigation that we need so much here in Baker county," said M. S. Bond, yesterday, while talking to a group of friends. Mr. Bond is a practical and successful farmer and knows whereof he speaks.

"This county never looked better than it does today. Crops are in a splendid condition and we have had plenty of rain and it does not matter much whether we have rain or not. We can raise crops by the right kind of work. All we need here is farmers to work, not rain, not windy Oregonians and not even irrigation so much—dry farming and hard work are doing the business.

"I came here five or six years ago with \$495. I suppose I could sell out today for \$20,000. I know very well I would not take that for my holdings. Other Missourians are now coming into the country which is now coming to the front. Within a radius of 10 miles of Baker City there are as fine ranches as can be found anywhere, and there are 10,000 acres at least, of government land that I consider today worth \$25 per acre. I am cultivating nearly 1400 acres myself and own, with members of my family, something over 2000 acres. "Give us more progressive farmers and we will make this county bloom like a rose garden."—Baker City Democrat.

Water Power for Electric Plant.
John H. Emery, president and general manager of the Gold Coin Mining company, will put a crew of 10 men to work in two or three days on the Solomo ditch, on More creek. The ditch, which is 7000 feet long, will be enlarged. It will furnish water power for an electric plant to be put in to run the hoist and mill at the mine. The mill will be constructed the coming summer. Work will be resumed in the mine as soon as supplies can be hauled there, which will be in about a month if the weather continues as it is at present.—Idaho City World.
