GENERAL NEWS.

Sweden has rejected Norway's terms for a compromise, and the union is in great jeopardy.

Arthur E. Ireland, national organizer for the Federation of Labor, has been jailed at Arkansas City, Kan., for assault and battery.

It is now generally believed that barring accidents, providence and the Japanese, Rojostevsky's and Nebogoff's fleets will meet on or about May 5.

Four million feet of mahogany, quartered oak and birch lumber, valued at \$500,000, burned in the drying kilns of the Sikes company, furniture manufacturers of Philadelphia.

E. S. Benson, formerly of the Oregon Short Line, now auditor for the Harriman lines in Texas, has been tendered the position of auditor of the Panama railroad, and has accepted.

A fire of unknown origin is gutting the coal mine belonging to the Colorado Fuel & Iron company, at Picton, Col. The loss cannot fall to be enormous. The daily output of the mine for several years has been 500 tons.

Wash Parker, a farmer near Weed, Texas, was murdered for his money while returning from marketing his wool. A posse overtook him on the next day near Sacramento mountains and shot him to death. His name was Tom Gentry.

Representative Curtis, of Kansas, who is sometimes referred to as the "Indian member" of the house, has been at various times in his life a jockey, a hack driver, law student and politician. He is one-fourth Pottawatomie and is serving his sixth term in congress.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Plans have been accepted for a new court house at Wallace, Idaho. It will cost \$65,000.

In 1906 Palouse had 329 inhabitants. Now the place has 1805, a gain of 95 per cent in five years.

The prohibitionists of Portland are determined to put a city ticket in the field, though they may endorse Albee for mayor.

At Spokane, Harry Dittmer won the individual championship of the first Western Bowling congress tournament. His scores were 176, 228 and 202.

Mrs. Robert Bruce, of Billings, Mont., shot and killed herself when her husband and brother-in-law found her in a compromising situation with a gentleman "friend."

Edith Grant, a white girl, has after several years' search among the Indians of British Columbia, been captured and returned to white relatives. She is 11 years of age. The Indians had systematically hidden her.

A tunnel two and a half miles long and costing \$350,000, has just been completed at Vancouver, B. C., to connect lakes Beautiful and Coquitlam. It is part of a scheme for the development of 30,000 horse-power.

The old Nimms residence at Cosmopolis, Wash., will be moved intact on a pontoon made of scows, to Aberdeen, a distance of six miles, where it will be fitted up and used as a hospital. It cost \$20,000 14 years ago.

Rev. Daniel Bagley is dead at Seattle, at an advanced age. He was pioneer missionary, with headquarters at Salem, from 1852 till 1860. In 1860 he moved to Seattle, and was chairman of the commission which established the Washington State University. He was an itinerant preacher and colporteur all his life.
