MOISTURE STATISTICS.

Different Crops Require Various Amounts of Rainfall.

Speaking of the amount of moisture required to produce certain crops the Inland Farmer of Spokane, says:

The amount of water demanded by crops under our system of cultivation is amazingly large. Dent corn used 309.8 tons of water (equal to 2.64 inches of rainfall) to produce one ton of dry matter. Potatoes used 422.7 tons of water (3.73 inches); oats used 474.4 tons (4.21 inches); and wheat used 453 tons of water (4 inches) to produce one ton of dry matter.

The importance of utilizing to the greatest possible extent all the rainfall is shown by the crop of wheat which could be produced if all the moisture were used instead of being allowed to evaporate from the ground or drain away, either by surface or under drainage. We shall use the ratio of 4 inches of rainfall to every ton of dry matter produced and the ratio of one ton of grain to 1.5 tons of straw. Forty bushels of wheat per acre would mean 1.2 tons of grain and 1.8 tons of straw, or a total of 3 tons of dry matter. Since one ton requires 4 inches of precipitation, three tons would require but (4x3) 12 inches of rainfall. Nearly every part of the United States has a greater rainfall than 12 inches. What then, is the reason we do not get larger crops? Simply because the water is allowed to evaporate or drain off. There are very few localities where the distribution of rainfall in time and amount is such as to permit fertile soils to produce the largest crops they are capable of bearing, and this being true, those soils which are able to store the largest quantities of rain in an available condition are likely to be the most productive and most profitable. So we see that the water-holding capacity of a soil is an important factor in determining its value.

PENDLETON AND LA

GRANDE WILL BATTLE.

A Good Hard Contest Is Expected and the Local Managers Are Not Optimistic—Line-up of the Pendleton Team in Full—Whether or Not the Salt Lake Team Plays Here Depends Upon the Weather at Spokane Today and Tomorrow.

Killed by Dynamite.

The body of Duncan McFarland, the miner killed by a dynamite explosion at Elk City last Saturday, was brought here last night and shipped to Spokane for burial today. The remains were accompanied by the wife and child of the deceased.

The exact circumstances of the accident are not known as McFarland never recovered consciousness to relate the story. It is known, however, that he was carrying a quantity of dynamite and caps to load the holes when in some manner the powder or caps were set off and the entire quantity was exploded. The body was hurled a considerable distance and was badly mangled by the explosion. McFarland lived seven hours after the accident but never recovered consciousness. The accident happened at the Hogan property where he was employed. Stites Journal.
