GENERAL NEWS.

Six British torpedo boats have been ordered from Gibraltar to the China coast.

It transpires that Grand Duke Sergius was murdered by Prince Obolensky, who was captured, fully identified, and is in prison unrepentant and defiant.

The smallest independent government in the world, without exception, is maintained on the island of Tavora, off the coast of Sardinia, and comprises its entire area. It has 60 inhabitants.

J. Pierpont Morgan recently purchased the manuscript of Charles Dickens' short story, "The Battle of Life." How much he paid for it is not stated, but in 1880 it sold for \$300, and in 1899 for \$2000.

In a survey of the Scottish lakes a depth of 1917 feet was reached in Loch Moay. This proves to be the deepest lake in the United Kingdom. Only seven deeper lakes are known in Europe, four being in Norway and three in Italy.

Miss Catherine McKinney, of Glen Gardner, N. J., who has just died at the age of 87 years, was engaged as a nurse for 65 years. She had a record of nursing 299 babies in Hunterdon and Warren counties, New Jersey. In a fall four years ago she broke her hip, and since that time has been an invalid, being confined to her bed most of the time.

A charivari party went to the home of Sam Vandembroek, at Lowell, Mich., who was recently married, and after making a hideous racket, demanded cigars. Vandembroek's reply was two shots from a revolver, which was without effect. The serenaders continued the racket, when Vandembroek fired his shotgun at them wounding five persons seriously.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

A strike of all employees of brewers in Seattle is probable.

At Baker City the 7-year-old son of the Hoopers fell into Powder river and was drowned.

Forty-one students will be graduated the night of May 2 from the Northwest Dental college at Portland.

The United States grand jury at Helena, Mont., has returned 35 indictments, of which 14 are for alleged land frauds.

John Otty, nine miles from Portland, was seriously and painfully injured by the premature explosion of a blast in a stump.

Hillyard, a suburb of Spokane, with about 4000 inhabitants, has decided not to annex to Spokane, but to incorporate independently.

At Vancouver, Wash., T. W. Padden and Charles R. Reynolds had a pistol duel. Reynolds is dead. Padden was wounded, but is expected to recover.

President Roosevelt was ill three days with a light attack of Cuban fever, and remained in his mountain camp on his doctor's advice. He has entirely recovered.

The independent prohibitionists of Portland have nominated the following ticket: Mayor B. Lee Paget; auditor, E. P. Northrup; treasurer, F. McKencher; municipal judge, E. O. Miller.

The supreme court has sustained the lower court, and Norman Williams, convicted at the Dalles of the murder of Alma Nesbitt, must hang. He claims to have had a straight presentment that the higher court would decide as it did.

HELP THE ACADEMY

PRESBYTERY INDORSES THE PENDLETON INSTITUTION

Recommends That the School Should Receive \$1500 From the General Educational Board for the Coming Year—The Erection of a Dormitory is Also Heartily Recommended—Closing School Year Most Successful in the History of the Academy—Funds Have Been Sufficient to Meet the Running Expenses—Churches Urged to Work for the School.

Pendleton presbytery, on Saturday evening, before the close of the business session, indorsed the report of the management of Pendleton academy and recommended that it be granted the sum of \$1500 from the general educational board of the Presbyterian general assembly for the ensuing school year that efforts must be made to erect a dormitory for the academy, for the accommodation of outside pupils and that the pastor of each church in the presbytery vigorously and actively work for the interest of the academy, the only Presbyterian institution between the Rocky and Cascade mountains.

The excellent report of the academy presented by the board of trustees, actuated this hearty indorsement of the presbytery and led to the recommendation for funds for the pursuance of its worthy work.

The year just closing has been the most successful from a financial standpoint, in the history of the academy. Although the institution received but \$1020 from the general educational board of the church this year, yet the income from tuition and the economy practiced in its management have enabled it to finish this year with no school debt, there being but a small floating indebtedness for work on the building and for apparatus.

The property is valued at \$15,000, the building is new and the school paraphernalia up to date and fairly complete, and the prospects for future work are exceedingly good, provided the ministers of the various presbyteries of Eastern Oregon heartily work for its advancement among their congregations.

Efforts will be made immediately to erect a dormitory for the accommodation of about 20 pupils, as many outside pupils have failed to attend the institution because of there being no suitable place to live while in attendance. The churches of Eastern Oregon are urged by the management of the academy to assist in furnishing students, in raising funds to assist in building a dormitory or in any other way possible.

This being the only school of its kind in the Inland Empire, the churches are urged to keep it before the public. Pendleton has shown a wonderful interest in the institution, having donated a large portion of the funds with which the building was erected, and having been loyal to it in every way, nearly the entire attendance being from Pendleton and the immediate vicinity.

"The school does not belong to any individual, but belongs to the Presbyterian church and it will be to the everlasting shame of the church if it should be forced to close its doors for lack of interest among its owners," said a prominent member of the presbytery Saturday.

Prof. W. H. Bleakney will make a canvass of the entire Eastern Oregon district at the close of the school year in listing pupils for the coming year.

While the school was founded by Presbyterians, it is not doctrinal or narrow in the least sense of the word, but teaches a four years' academic course, on the broadest and most advanced lines and appeals to all who desire a Christian influence for their children.

WANT MORE RAILROADS.

Oregon Development League Passes Resolutions.

Henry Hahn, of the Open River committee of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, submitted the following resolution at the recent meeting of the Oregon Development league:

"Whereas, Practically all of the railroad systems operating in this state are under one control and one management; and

"Whereas, For a number of years past but little additional mileage has been built in this state, and

"Whereas, A large portion of this state is now without proper transportation facilities; and

"Whereas, Said portions of said state have great natural resources and large bodies of unoccupied lands, which only need transportation facilities in order to be settled upon and developed; and

"Whereas, It is absolutely essential to the interests of this state and to all parts and portions thereof that such transportation facilities be furnished at once; and

"Whereas, On several occasions direct statements have been made that new roads would be built and extended into the interior of the state, as well as to the coast sections thereof; now, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the Oregon Development league, composed of members from all parts of the state of Oregon, does hereby express its regret that said roads have not been built, and does hereby earnestly request the said transportation companies to build railway lines and furnish transportation facilities to the portions of this state now without them."

Traveling men's day at Portland will be June 10. It is expected that 2000 will attend from Seattle and Tacoma.
