Condon is After Water.

A contract for drilling the new city well was signed up last Saturday between Mayor Reischner and Recorder Goodwin acting for the city, and James W. Green, an experienced well driller of Portland.

The contract calls for a well 10 inches in diameter not to exceed 1000 feet in depth, except by special agreement, the city to have the right to stop drilling at any time that a sufficient amount of water is obtained. The price agreed upon is to be \$6 per foot to a depth of 500 feet, \$3800 for 600 feet, \$4700 for 700 feet, \$5700 for 800 feet, \$6700 for 900, and \$8000 for 1000 feet.

If the well is less than 500 feet deep when completed the city agrees to pay transportation charges on the drilling machinery from Portland to Condon, but if the well exceeds that depth the contractor stands that expense. Work is to begin at the earliest possible moment but must not be later than May 15, 1935.

Mr. Green's machine has a capacity of 2000 feet, and it is the intention of the city to keep going down until an ample supply for all city needs is secured.—Condon Globe.

New Interior Sawmill.

Herbert Halstead, manager of the Condon Lumber Co., reports that the engine, boiler and other machinery for the new lumbering plant which they will soon install on Thirty-Mile, has arrived in Arlington and will be at once brought out and put in place. A crew of 25 men have been at work at the mill site for the past month putting in a dam and getting frame timbers for the mill ready.

The company hopes to be turning out lumber early in June. The logging engine which Mr. Halstead purchased two or three years ago for use at the Lost Valley mill, but which was never put in commission, has been sent to a machine shop in Portland to be put in first-class repair and will be brought out and used by the company as a logging engine in the woods.—Condon Globe.

Hood River After Woolen Mill.

The business men of Hood River have done nobly, in five days having subscribed over \$15,000 of the \$20,000 block of stock they were asked to take by Messrs. Wilbur & Wright, the men who placed the proposition for a woolen mill before the Commercial club last Wednesday night. The committee having the matter in charge is confident that the remaining \$5,000 can be raised if each man who has the interest of the city at heart will do his best toward assuring the location of this mill here.

It is no bonus these gentlemen from Union are asking. They have made

a straight business proposition by guaranteeing to pay 8 per cent interest on the stock subscribed. A portion of the proposed site will be donated free by Mr. Wilson, the company agreeing to take power from him, and Mr. Bachelier of the Development company will give the remainder of the needed site for a consideration of \$1000 in stock.—Hood River Glacier.

Immense New Barn.

L. E. Caviness has just secured plans for a large barn which he will have erected during the summer on his Prairie Creek ranch. The barn will be octagonal in shape, 210 feet in circumference and 68 feet in diameter; the foundation being stone. The barn will be the largest in the county, accommodating 55 head of horses, and will hold 150 tons of hay. Mr. Caviness has one of the largest and best ranches in the county, consisting of 2500 acres.—Joseph Herald.

New Methodist Church.

A contract was let this week by the trustees of the M. E. church of Union for a church building to cost \$3300. A. W. Nichols was awarded the contract, work will be started at once and the building completed by October first.

The building is to be of brick, with stone trimmings and of modern design in every way—the finest structure of the kind in Grand Ronde valley.—Union Republican.

Ship Sheep to Alaska.

Frank Armstrong returned from his trip to Alaska Monday. He went as far as Seward and Valdez, and visited many intermediate points along the coast. Mr. Armstrong thinks Seward is the coming metropolis of Alaska and was well pleased with the place. He expects to ship a lot of mutton sheep to that point during the coming summer and drive them into the interior mining camps.—Condon Globe.

Will Make Brick at Grangeville.

A. F. Doull of Spokane, arrived here today. Mr. Doull has decided to establish a pressed brick plant here to cost from \$10,000 to \$15,000. The machinery will arrive soon and the plant will be installed without delay. The plant will be an important industry for the city.—Grangeville Free Press.

Big Payroll.

There will be about 100 men employed in and around the sawmills tributary to Union this season, and \$50,000 will be circulated among our people through the lumbering industry, this year.—Union Republican.

CHICAGO SHEEP MARKET.

Drop of 10 to 20 Cents Experienced Last Week.

The Chicago Livestock World says of the sheep market of the past week: A break anywhere from 10 to 20 cents was enforced in live muttons. Lambs with the wool on suffered most. It was a case of too many everywhere. Sheep were from 10 to 15 cents lower than last week. It was a slow, draggy market from the start. Nobody seemed to have any pressing need for anything and at noon considerable unsold stuff was still on hand.

Wool lambs sold mostly at \$7.00 to \$7.50, a top being made at \$7.60. As warm weather makes this stock dress poorly prices were raised sharply. Clipped lambs did not suffer as much, a top being made at \$6.50, with a goodly showing within a range of \$6.00 to \$6.30.

Good Horses in Demand.

S. Y. Evans, who was here in the interest of the A. C. Ruby company, says that the demand for really good horses was never better than at the present time. A good team of horses weighing 1500 pounds or more to the horse, will readily command \$700 or \$800 in the large cities.—Grant County News.
