DO NOT NEED THEM

GAMBLERS NOT NECESSARY
TO WELFARE OF THE TOWN.

The Annual Report of the City Recorder Demonstrates This Proposition—The Surplus to the City's Credit Last Year Was \$8107.13, and There Would Have Been a Surplus of \$2311.63 Had Not a Single Dollar Been Received From Pendleton's Gamblers.

It has been steadily maintained by the friends of an open town, that Pendleton is dependent upon the revenues derived from gambling with which to meet its operating expenses and to make necessary public improvements. This the council virtually asserted at its meeting Wednesday, when it indefinitely postponed the macadamizing of the business streets.

The best refutation of the slander thus cast upon the fair name of the city is found in the annual report of Recorder Fitz Gerald for the year 1904, for thereby it is clearly shown that the revenues aside from gambling fines are more than sufficient to pay expenses.

"To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

"I hereby submit my annual report as recorder of the city of Pendleton for the year 1904; wherein it is shown that the receipts from all sources amount to \$38,731.66; that the operating expenditures amount to \$26,902.08, and expenditures for betterments and monies transferred to the sinking fund to be \$3782.45.

"That sewer warrants amounting to \$7000 were redeemed during the year, and \$197.83 of warrants issued prior to 1904 were paid."

"That a cash balance of \$1510.26 was carried over from 1903, and that the general fund cash balance now in the hands of the treasurer amounts to \$2419.56.

In the detailed report which follows, the total revenues are shown to have been \$38,731.66, of which \$14,697.54 was derived from saloon licenses; \$12,047 from fines, and \$12,147.03 from all other sources. An examination of the police court docket for 1904 shows that of the \$12,047 received from fines, the sum of \$5,622.50, less than one-half, was fines from gamblers and owners of slot machines.

The total operating expenses for the year were \$26,902.08, divided as follows: Streets, \$5932.44; interest on bonds, \$3059.45; interest on sewer bonds, \$401.63; police department, \$3983.77; city lighting, \$3534.50; fire department, \$2024.65; legal service, \$600; sewer operating, \$662.65; elections, \$45.25; cemetery, \$10.90; health, \$15.65.

Besides the above expenses the sum of \$3782.45 was paid out for betterments, thus making a total of \$30,684.53 paid out during the year for operating expenses and betterments.

This last amount, when taken from the total receipts, leaves a surplus of \$3107.13. AND THERE WOULD STILL HAVE BEEN A SURPLUS OF \$2311.63 HAD NOT A SINGLE DOLLAR BEEN RECEIVED FROM GAMBLERS.

Exhibit of Treasurer's Report.

The report of the city treasurer for March showed a balance of \$3746.29 in the treasury at that time, divided as follows: General fund, \$3083.80; called warrant fund, \$14.37; levee sinking fund, \$4488.94; general sinking fund, \$1159.13. The treasurer's report for last month is not yet in, but the records show that about \$1800 was netted during the month. THUS MAKING APPROXIMATELY \$10,500 IN THE CITY TREASURY AT THE PRESENT TIME, WITHOUT A SINGLE WARRANT OUTSTANDING ON ANY OF THE FUNDS.

With this amount in the treasury, and with no warrants to be paid, the city council at its last meeting indefinitely postponed the matter of macadamizing, which would have cost the city, according to the estimates of the street committee, \$1400 for the squares and \$6000 for machinery. As to their motives for so doing, the citizens of Pendleton may judge for themselves, with the above information for their guidance.

CONFERENCE IS ENDED.

Successful Meeting of Congregational Ministers at Ione.

Rev. T. R. Egerton, Mrs. S. A. Lowell and Mrs. Dan Kemler returned last night from the Mid-Columbia conference of Congregational ministers and churches, held Tuesday and Wednesday at Ione and report having had a most profitable and enjoyable meeting.

Churches at Ione, Heppner, Lexington, Freewater, Laidlaw, Ingle chapel near Freewater, Condon, The Dalles and Pendleton, had delegates present, and most encouraging reports from every section were received. Two new churches have been organized in the past year, and a healthy addition has been made to the membership in all the churches.

The officers elected for the ensuing year are as follows: Moderator, Rev. Howard N. Smith of Portland, Sunday school missionary, clerk, Mrs. Clark of Condon; registrar, Rev. J. L. Jones of Ione.

Rev. Richard Brown of Brainerd, Minn., was elected missionary for Eastern Oregon, and will preach in the Congregational church in this city morning and evening next Sunday, as he passes through the city on his way to his new field of labor. A resolution was adopted asking for, or recommending the appointment of a state evangelist, which matter must pass through several other conferences and stages before it is finally agreed upon.

The returning delegates are delighted with the meeting and the treatment received at the hands of the people of Ione. The conditions in

all branches of the church work are reported to be highly satisfactory and the conference adjourned with bright hopes for the future.

LIVE FARM PAPER.

Inland Farmer at Spokane Alone in Its Field.

Will F. Powell, manager of the Inland Farmer, a monthly magazine, arrived in the city yesterday evening in the interest of his periodical.

Mr. Powell states that his journal is the only agricultural paper published in a territory of 750,000 of people, who live in the most prosperous district of its size in the world.

"During the past year," added Mr. Powell, there has been wonderful progress manifested in all lines of industry as represented in the Inland Empire. Spokane, which is generally recognized as the metropolis of this particular region, is just now enjoying an unprecedented era of railroad building. The electric line, extending southward through the agricultural district, will cause the larger farms to be divided into smaller tracts, which in turn, will logically generate a marked increase in population.

"The new road to be built this year from Spokane to connect with the Canadian Pacific will open up some splendid country that will add to the timber and mining industries."

C. L. Smith, editor of the Inland Farmer is well known in Umatilla county, having addressed several farmers' meetings at Echo and Pendleton. He is a practical farmer and an intensely interesting writer on farm subjects.

CRACK CADETS COMING.

Military Body From State College of Washington Will Encamp at Lewis and Clark Exposition.

The cadet battalion of the State College of Washington will hold their annual encampment in Portland during the Lewis and Clark exposition. Four infantry companies, the signal corps and a band of 30 pieces constitute the battalion, whose entire personnel is 300. A special train over the O. R. & N. company's line has been definitely secured for the transportation of the organization.

The battalion will leave Pullman, Wash., either on the morning or evening of May 30, and will arrive in Portland in time for the cadets to make camp on the 31st of May. It is planned to have all in readiness for the opening day ceremonies, June 1, in which the battalion will participate.

Under the able instruction of Captain Edward Kimmel, U. S. artillery corps, the cadet battalion of the State College of Washington has become one of the most efficient military bodies in the Pacific Northwest. Captain Kimmel entered the artillery service some years ago as a private. He was graduated in 1898 and was then appointed second Lieutenant in the Philippines. Captain Kimmel returned to this country and was assigned to Fortress Monroe, where he was soon made a captain of artillery. He was brought to the college only by the persistent efforts of President Bryan of that institution, who desired to have a military man in command of the cadets.

Invent a Combine.

James Leverett and Shorty Leonard, the inventors, are tearing the old "self-feeder and hoe-down" to pieces this week, and have begun the erection of a new machine with several later improvements on the same. They expect to experiment with the machine they are now building in the harvest fields here this fall and if it works satisfactory a stock company will be formed here and the machines will be manufactured at Bickleton. Doubtless judges say there is but little doubt of these machines being a success—for the old one ran all right, but was not strong enough. —Kittkat News.

Professor Search This Week.

Mr. Markham, who is unusually kind in listening to and counseling amateur authors, immediately felt that one who has spent a quarter of a century on his product is rare, and he invited him to his study without delay.

"What is the nature of your work?" asked Mr. Markham.

"I have written the greatest book of the age," began the new author; "I have solved the mystery of the world. I know all about it. I am prepared to prove my statements. I know just why the world was made, who really made it, and I have laid bare the mysteries of creation. I—"

"My good man," said Mr. Markham, interrupting him; "if you have come to me for advice, let me tell you to take your manuscript at once and burn it. If you have solved the mystery of this world, you are its greatest enemy. 'Why,' continued the poet, 'if you have solved the mystery of the world you have robbed men of their greatest joy. You have left us nothing to work for, you have destroyed our ambition, you have reduced us to mere animals. Mr. Markham's visitor sat dumbfounded for a moment. The vision of his 25 years of labor flitted before him as he said:
