GENERAL NEWS.

On the 37th ballot the republicans of the Connecticut legislature endorsed Congressman F. H. Brundage to succeed the late O. H. Platt in the United States senate.

Judge E. P. Gates of Kansas City, has enjoined Mayor J. H. Neff from signing a bill granting Hugh McGowan of Indianapolis, a franchise to supply the city with natural gas from Kansas.

Pelix Alora, a New Mexican ranchman, very wealthy, was dead in love with Mrs. Francisco Montero. In a fit of jealousy Alora shot and killed the woman and her husband, and then himself.

The McCormick family has voted \$1,000,000 out of the family fortune for an additional gift to McCormick Theological seminary, which was founded and endowed by the famous reaper manufacturer.

Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, chief of the bureau of chemistry, will continue throughout the summer his investigation of patent medicines of the country. The result of his investigations will be laid before congress next December.

Wealthy manufacturers and landowners in Russia have received authority from the government to equip and maintain private military forces for the protection of their property from the mobs and hordes of pillaging poor.

The earth opened at Joplin, Mo., and swallowed the \$8000 plant of the Holy Smoke mine, south of Carterville, reducing the mill to kindling wood and burying the debris 100 feet below the surface. A concentrating plant adjoining is threatened with engulfment. No one was hurt.

Canada's more or less boastful promises to maintain garrisons at Esquimaux and at Halifax, N. S., have fizzled, as only 100 recruits can be found for the service. The government withdrew the imperial troops a few weeks since and announced that both posts would be permanently abandoned.

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Rev. J. D. O'Brien succeeds Rev. Flohr as pastor of the Catholic church at Walla Walla.

The Washington Water Power Co., of Spokane, has increased its capital stock from \$3,500,000 to \$5,000,000.

The government has withdrawn from entry 414,120 acres of land in Montana in connection with the Milk river irrigation project.

A total of \$450 reward is offered for the arrest of the two robbers who took \$3500 from the Woodburn bank. There is almost no clue to them.

The condition of hop yards in the Willamette valley is generally reported much inferior to that of a year ago at the same stage of growth.

Mrs. Matilda Nelson of Seattle, who killed her young son with an ax while presumably insane, has made repeated and unsuccessful attempts to suicide.

Four men were caught on an ice floe while out in a gasoline launch off Cape Nome and floated helplessly for eight days without food before being rescued.

The state competitive drill of the Modern Woodmen was held at Spokane. Seattle won both first and second prizes, of \$200 and \$100, respectively.

After being out five hours the jury before whom John T. Dickens was tried at McMinnville for killing Marvin L. Potter, who seduced his daughter, acquitted him.

CUDTSEE A MAGNATE.

Ex-Sheriff of Seattle Head of \$100,000 Slaughter House Company.

Ed Cudtsee, ex-sheriff of King county, is on the high way to become a beef trust magnate. He is at the head of a stock company with a capital of \$100,000 which contemplates the erection of a slaughter house on the tideflats, says the Seattle Star.

An option on the site has already been procured, but its purchase has been held in abeyance pending the establishment of the new slaughter house district contemplated by the council. Cudtsee wants to be sure that he is within the safe zone before he goes ahead with the construction of his bovine annihilator.

L. R. Witt has already expended some \$10,000 on a slaughter house designed especially for the reception of sheep. The site is on Spokane avenue. The health and sanitation committee was loath to bring this establishment within the limits because Spokane is on that thoroughfare which is soon to be the main highway to West Seattle, but it voted to do so Wednesday night in view of the large expenditures already made.

It is liable to become as objectionable as the present slaughter houses. The location is outside the city limits, and Witt went ahead with its construction without securing assent from the city authorities. He was turned down by the latter and also by the Ballard city dads when he sought permission to erect a slaughter house within the limits.

Yacht Race Begins Soon.

New York, May 6.—Practically all arrangements are concluded for the ocean race for the German emperor's cup. One week from next Tuesday the 11 yachts entered, with flags flying and snowy canvas set as taut as a harpstring, will point their noses to the eastward and the great struggle for supremacy on the sea will begin. Lovers of yachting in large numbers have gone down the bay this week to view the several yachts that are entered in the contest. Among those that have attracted most attention are the foreign entries, including the German schooner Hamburg, Lord Brassey's Sunbeam, and the Earl of Crawford's big ship rigged yacht, Valhalla.

California Needs Schools.

San Francisco, May 6.—The Methodist ministers of San Francisco yesterday petitioned the supervisors that instead of appropriating \$20,000 to establish a separate school for Japanese pupils a suitable school be established in some central location for the aid of backward students of whatever parentage and nationality. The petitioners believe that such a course will result in the greater efficiency of the schools and also be of great advantage to a large number of young people other than Japanese who are backward in English branches.

Rudolph's Days Numbered.
St. Louis, Mo., May 6.—Tomorrow will be the last day on earth for William Rudolph, one of the pair of Union bank robbers and murderers of Detective Schumacher. The con-

demned man has been taken to Union and on Monday morning he will be hanged in the county jail yard there from the same scaffold used for the execution of his partner in crime, George Collins, a year ago. Rudolph continues to maintain his remarkable nerve and those who have seen him of him during his long imprisonment expect him to keep it to the last.

LAUNCHING OF THE ST. LOUIS.

New Protected Cruiser Takes the Water.

Philadelphia, Pa., May 6.—The new cruiser St. Louis was launched today from the Neafie & Levy shipyards. Miss Gladys Bryan Smith, daughter of James E. Smith of St. Louis, performed the christening ceremony. Not a hitch occurred in the proceedings and the St. Louis gracefully moved down the ways and into the Delaware as a bottle of champagne was broken by Miss Smith on the vessel's bow.

The keel of the St. Louis was laid in 1902. She is a protected cruiser, and with the exception of her sister ships, the Charleston and the Milwaukee, she is the largest vessel of her class in the navy. Her length is 424 feet; extreme breadth, 58 feet; mean draught, 22.6 feet; displacement, 9700 tons. She is designed to maintain a maximum sea speed of 22 knots with 21,000 indicated horsepower.

The St. Louis will carry 14 6-inch and 18 3-inch rapid-fire guns; 12 3-pounder semi-automatic guns; four 1-pounder automatics; eight 1-pound rapid-fire guns; four 4-inch field pieces, and 10 3-calibre machine guns, eight of which will be automatic. She will have 40 officers and about 625 men. The cruiser is now about 75 per cent completed.
