Telephone From Echo to Heppner. Asa B. Thompson and R. N. Stanfield of Echo, have been in Heppner this week supervising the construction of a rural telephone line, extending from Heppner to Echo.

The line is being constructed by the Echo Telephone company, and will be run from Heppner through the Blackhorse country to Sand Hollow at J. H. Edwards' place, thence down Sand Hollow to the forks of the creek, thence to Galloway on Butter creek, and from there to Echo, where it will connect with the Pendleton line already completed. There it will also connect with various other rural lines of the company, which takes in all the lower Butter creek country.

The holes for the telephone poles are now all dug and the work of erecting the poles and stretching the wires will be under way at once. When this line is completed the Echo company will have a system 200 miles in extent.—Heppner Times.

Returned From Panama. W. L. Jackson, the contractor, who left Dayton for Panama last March, to accept a responsible position with the canal commission, returned home last Tuesday. He was at the isthmus only 19 days, when he resigned, because the authorities compelled him to live in the city of Panama. He did not like the climate there, besides the cost of living was too high. He reports that there are about 4000 men employed, mostly Jamaica negroes—but very little work is being done on the canal proper in the shape of excavation. There are only four steam shovels at work at the big Culebra cut, and they are merely widening the canal to the proper width. Most of the work being done at present is preparatory to the real work to follow, building quarters for the laborers, etc. The rainy season had just commenced when he left.—Dayton Courier-Press.

Supposed Horse Thieves Escaped. The facts are simply that a supposed gang of men have been rounding up horses in Idaho and swimming them across Snake river into Oregon, and it was supposed that they would make an attempt to dispose of the horses or ship them.

Sheriff Brown had no warrant for the arrest of the men, but it was thought the Idaho authorities were after them, and as the two leaders Lang and Riley, have been up in Baker county for offenses of similar nature in the past year or two, he concluded to take a hand in the chase. The men got wind of the movement and hit the trail, leaving a bunch of horses behind them. They pretended to be buying horses in the neighborhood on both sides of the river, but

worked nights. Riley was the man under arrest here for forgery.—Baker City Democrat.

Will Run on Schedule. It has not been determined who will be in charge of the portage road. Members of the commission are now conducting correspondence regarding this matter, but are not yet ready to make any announcement. As soon as this step is taken, final arrangements for opening the road will be made at once.

The road will be operated under a regular schedule. The opinion has been generally expressed that trains on the road would run only as far as the traffic demanded, but it is the present intention of the Portage railway commission to establish a regular schedule. The equipment of the road consists of one engine, eight flat cars, four box cars, six stock cars, and one combination passenger and baggage coach.—The Dalles Chronicle.

Shearing in Morrow. Sheep shearing is now general throughout Morrow county, three crews being at work at different ranches, and it is needless to say that they are making the wool fly rapidly. Hauling to the warehouses here has also commenced, several six-horse loads having come in the past few days, and from now on to the middle of June there will be almost a steady stream of wool wagons. There will not be less than 3,000,000 pounds marketed at Heppner this year, as the splendid condition of the sheep has made a longer staple and heavier fleece than usual.—Heppner Times.

New Dipping Vat. An association of sheepmen commenced the construction of a dipping vat near the stockyards in this city the first of the week to facilitate the dipping of sheep under federal inspection. The vat will be 50 feet long, five feet deep and one and a half feet wide. It is estimated that there will be between 60,000 and 75,000 sheep pass through the vat as there has been about that number sold for shipment.—Heppner Times.

Gasoline to Kill Weeds. A man who claims to know, says that the best method of destroying dandelions, docks, plantains and other noxious weed pests is to fill any common oil can such as are used for machinery, with gasoline, then squirt a teaspoonful into the top or heart of the plant. It is claimed that there will be no resurrection of the plant after that. Coal oil is also good in the same way, but a larger quantity may be necessary.—The Dalles Chronicle.
